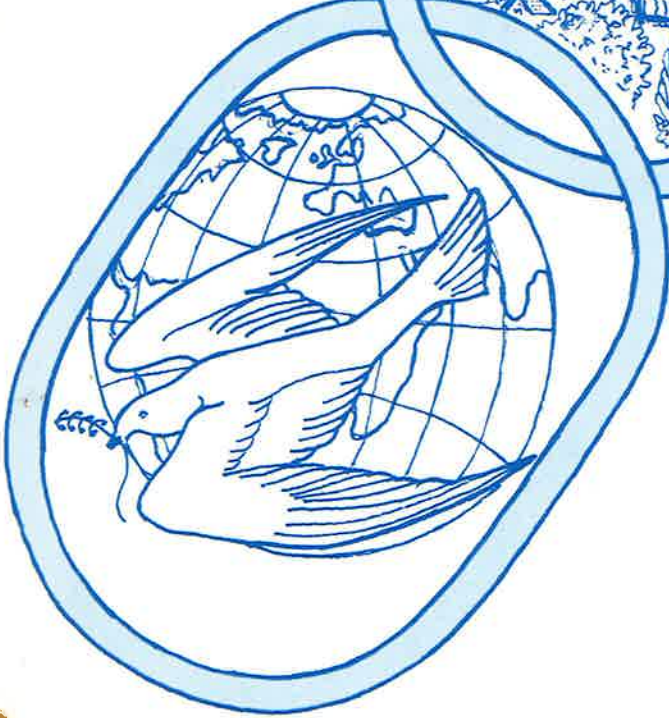
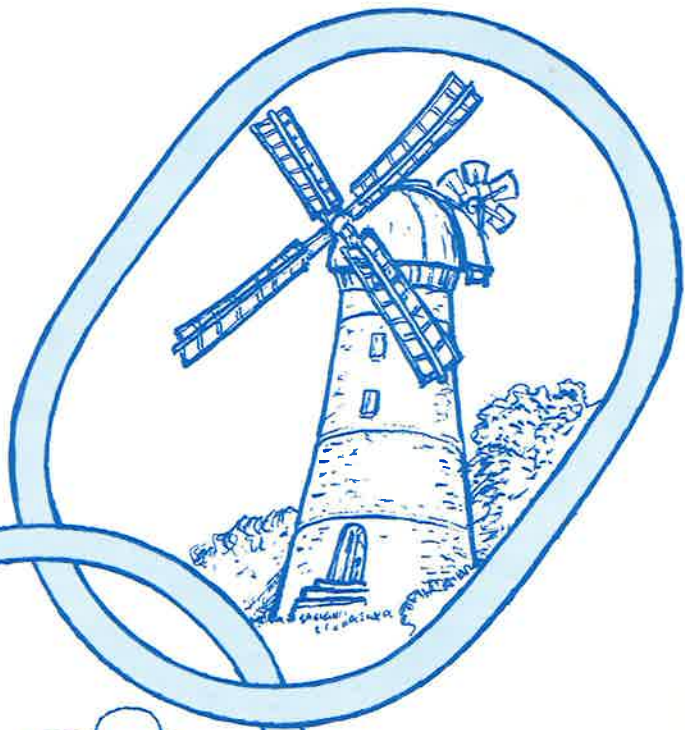

# United Reformed

## LOCAL DIMENSIONS HAVE GLOBAL POSSIBILITIES

I was struck by a statement made at the U.R.C. District meeting the other evening at Fenstanton. A Ghensian visitor said "Local dimensions have global possibilities." That little spot on which you stand, is, in fact, a spot on a meridian or line of longitude which extends around the world. I remember well the excitement with which I stood on that Prime Meridian Line at the Greenwich Observatory, the beginning of the modern systems of world geography and navigation. Greenwich may not be the centre of the world in any real sense but think of the global dimensions which begin there!

Any line, even the boundary lines of your small plot on earth, can be extended into infinity. When my wife and I visited Hampshire recently we saw Jane Austen's House in the once-remote village of Chawton. We saw the small "pie-crust" writing-table on which this tiny lady wrote novels which have indeed gone from local dimensions to global acceptance and appreciation. One might speculate also on the fact that her novels dealt with very homely themes and characters.

Think of the son of a village carpenter who never wrote a book, never ran for office, but in three years told some simple tales of nameless travellers, farmers, housewives, fishermen and the like. These stories are now known to the whole world, east, west, north, south, developed, undeveloped and the man who told them is, beyond question, the most influential Person of history.

One of the commonest beliefs (Oh yes, we all have BELIEFS!) held by folk today is that "There's nothing I can do about it." The world seems too complex, too far beyond our power to change or to control. THE FACTS ARE COMPLETELY OTHERWISE. On the one hand you have an obscure Russian emigre named Marx, working in the library of the British Museum, or an ex-corporal named Adolph working amongst the disaffected German workers while on the other hand you have a few monks on the small and desolate Isle of Iona, Branmer writing a prayer-book, Wesley on horseback, Robert Raikes (we'd forgotten him rather, hadn't we?) and his ragged school in Gloucester, Wilberforce and Shaftesbury against the British establishment, down through William Carey, Livingstone, Grenfell right through to Barnardo and Sue Ryder and the ten pence and pounds given for Oxfam or Christian Aid. It is clear that we all DO have

power to change and to direct the course of world affairs even though we remain "ordinary" citizens while some become "extra-ordinary" citizens.

### P I L O T S

What is Pilots?

Pilots is a non-uniformed organisation sponsored by the United Reformed Church.

It is for both boys and girls aged 7 - 14 approximately and began in 1936 as a joint venture of the Congregational Union of England and Wales and the London Missionary Society. Most children in Congregational Churches then supported the missionary ship "John Williams V" which sailed among the islands of the South Pacific. It was natural to build a children's organisation around the idea of a ship. Pilots retains the nautical image to provide a framework within which the activities can take place, and to link children with the whole Church and its mission in the world.

Children become 'Deck Hands' as soon as they join the company. Upon completing certain requirements they are enrolled and become Ordinary Seamen. Upon enrolment a Pilot is given the Pilot Badge, which carries the emblem of the World Council of Churches. Before enrolment they learn the significance of the emblem.

Pilots meet in the Stansted U.R.C. Lecture Hall as follows:

Age 7 - 12 on Monday evening from 5.30 pm to 6.45 pm

Age 13 - 15 on alternate Friday evenings from 6.45 pm.

THE UNITED REFORMED CHURCH GUILD has been in existence for a number of years. It is a social gathering and is open to all. We call these services Requiems. On Tuesday 4th November we will be having a Requiem in St. John's Church at 7.30 pm and you are invited to hand in the names of those you want remembered during the service. I would also like to remind you that you may ask for a Requiem at any time to pray for your departed loved ones.

## ST EDMUND'S FAMILY DAYS

As October has arrived again, we welcome another year's series of St Edmund's Family Days, so named because, when they started eleven years ago, they were held at St Edmund's College in Ware. During term time, on the first Sunday of every month, families congregate together for a sociable and informative day. People start arriving at 10.30 am, to be welcomed with coffee and biscuits. At 11.00 the children all go off to be cared for and entertained while their parents attend a stimulating session with an invited speaker. A committee of lay people, with Fr Tim Firth, the Diocesan Secretary, and some nuns to help, choose subjects of interest to the parents, and then "press gang" experts in the field to come and talk to us. We have welcomed many well-known speakers, including Bishops, Rabbis, Trade Union leaders and others of widely disparate vocations.

At about half past twelve a buffet meal which has been provided by the parents is supplemented by hot soup and coffee provided by the nuns - friendships are renewed, the morning's session is discussed and so on. The lunch break flies by, and then the children go back with their minders, whilst discussion continues for their elders.

The day culminates in a lovely friendly Mass which, in summer, is held out of doors. There is lots of singing and our local pair, Mary Warnett and Jan King, provide a superb guitar backing! Usually the children dramatise the day's gospel story very convincingly.

Many couples look forward to a day which they can share with other adults on a mature level, confident that their children are also enjoying themselves. Several families from Stansted join the others who converge on the mellow buildings, lovely parklands and warm hospitality of the Convent at Hertingfordbury for these popular monthly occasions.

The theme for the next Family Day on the 9th November is 'God and the Washing-up Bowl' with Fr Tim Firth as the speaker.

But how many people know that there is in Stansted a collecting centre at 43 Silver Street where people can bring the things that Mother Teresa asks for? Such things as children's light-weight clothing (particularly baby clothes); old tights and stockings (which are used to fill pillows and as bandages); used stamps that are trimmed, sorted and sold; old sheets that can be torn up and rolled into bandages or made into cot sheets or nappies; and oddments of wool or jumpers that can be unravelled and knitted into squares to make blankets.

And perhaps not many people know that, for those who would like to help, there is a working coffee morning on the first Monday of every month from 10 am to 12 noon at 43 Silver Street where we sort the things that have been brought to the collecting centre and make them ready to send away.

Stansted Methodist Church is one of the nine churches comprising the Bishop's Stortford Methodist Circuit, which extends from Bishop's Stortford in the South to Ickleton in the North. ## THE VEXED QUESTION OF MICROTECHNOLOGY

Report on a One-Day Conference arranged by the  
Quaker Social Responsibility and Education  
Committee

The majority of those attending were involved in some way with the application of microtechnology and because there were several facets to be considered were divided into six discussion groups according to their special interest. The following is a summary of the main conclusions and areas of difficulty identified by these six groups.

Employment: While acknowledging the very real problems there was optimism for the future. However, the rate of change will be a crucial factor and it is necessary to differentiate between short term tactics to cope with present difficulties and a long term strategy in order to create the type of society we want. At present the concept of "work" is central to our lives. Before extensive changes can occur education will be necessary to change our attitudes and expectations. Change hurts because our ideas are rigid.

Privacy: There is a tendency to store all information obtained because it is cheap and easy to store but difficult and expensive to collect. Although this has definite benefits there are risks. The risks include misuse of information and the difficulties of correcting inaccuracies. The latter could be helped by individuals being aware of their own record but there is no legislation to prevent the misuse of information except in relation to credit. There is an EEC convention which the UK hasn't signed and it was suggested that we might urge that this be done. It was also suggested that we support the setting up of a Data Protection Agency although one friend did point out that the creation of a government sponsored body with knowledge of all data bases may be the greater danger.

Education: While this group accepted that people must be educated to accept change we have already found this difficult to do and it is impossible to do it quickly. Microtechnology is a good tool but this group was less optimistic about the values held by society and the capacity of human beings to accept rapid change.

Medicine: Microtechnology is not just computers and information gathering. It is now possible to perform operations without a surgeon and there is enormous potential for preventive medicine but advances are resisted by some members of the medical profession. It is very important to understand and reassure those whose jobs are threatened. The changes that are already possible as the result of microtechnology would have massive implications for the organisation of society. Governments, aware that we are not yet ready for

such changes, divert expertise to projects such as space explorations and military equipment. Change will come, however, and we must decide what values we want our society to express.

Attitudes of Labour and Management: Many workers see micro-chips as a threat but they are merely a tool and there is no evidence that they will cause long term unemployment. It is important that we seize the opportunity they present of doing away the difference between skilled and unskilled work.

Applications and Effects: People think changes are coming too fast and that they are powerless. There are also dangers that modern technology could be used in the political field to introduce instant opinion polls and majority voting. There is a great deal of resistance to change both by the informed and uninformed, but used wisely the benefits of microtechnology could improve the quality of life.

In a general discussion it was agreed that as Christians we believe in the value of each individual and that efforts must be made to ensure that this belief is taken into account when new technology is introduced. Shortly after the conference members of the Committee were meeting with representatives from other Churches working in this area.

This is my unofficial account and if there are any questions I will be glad to help if possible or put people in touch with those who can.

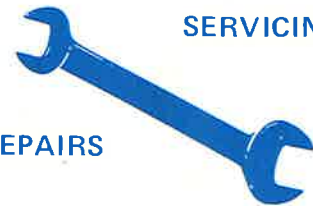
