

Please note that from Sunday 3rd September, the time of the meeting for worship will be 10.00am.

'Refrain from making prejudiced judgements about the life journey of others. Remember that each one of us is unique, precious, a child of God.' This extract from one of the Advices in Quaker Faith & Practice is on the same lines as the Biblical instruction to deal with the beam in our own eye before worrying about the mote in someone else's.

Nevertheless, we are all guilty to a greater or lesser extent. Encouraged as we are by the media to build up public figures, stars and workers for good causes into sort of icons, then – surprise, surprise – some investigative journalist finds that they are not perfect after all and because they turn out to have feet of clay all the good and interesting things they have done are forgotten and wiped off the slate.

There are two interesting, and now famous, examples which have worked the other way round. The book 'Schindler's Ark' told the story of a German involved with the Nazis and running businesses that used slave labour. But, because of his relationship with the regime, he was able secretly to save hundreds and hundreds of Jews from the gas chambers and to improve the conditions of his workers.

The other example, much more recent, and perhaps even braver, was Paul Rusesabagina, the manager of a luxury Government-used hotel in Kigali, Rwanda. He was used to smoothing the way of important visitors, arranging for deals to take place, bribing the right people, etc. Yet, when the Government-sponsored Rwandan massacres took place, he managed to hide away and save well over a thousand people at great risk to himself and his family. His story is told in the book 'An Ordinary Man' or the film 'Hotel Rwanda'. As George Fox famously wrote: 'There is that of God in every man.' I reckon – if there are pearly gates – they will be wide open and welcoming for Paul Rusesabagina.

For many years now the members of the congregations of Stansted Methodist Church and Stansted United Reformed Church have passed each other on Chapel Hill on their way to their separate church services. It is hoped you will come along and celebrate this special and historic occasion with us (more details below).

The people of the two churches feel that this is much more than simply two churches coming together to worship. They feel that by uniting in this way they are following God's will for the churches and that a new church is being created in our midst with shared gifts, talents, skills and resources; a church looking forward to the future that awaits it and ready to meet the new opportunities God may offer us. We trust you will rejoice with us and hold us in your thoughts and prayers as we move forward on our journey together.

Departure Lounge

Whether you take a holiday at this time of year or not, August is definitely the holiday season. For me, this is a legacy from childhood, when August was synonymous with six weeks off school - a word that conjured up buckets, spades and ice cream cornets. I remember resenting fiercely the signs that went up in some shops before the month was even halfway through, saying 'back to school'. I did not want thoughts of buying new books, pens or uniform to intrude on this sacred space, this special 'time out'. I knew it would come, but please, not yet. Knowing that the holidays would end gave the time a frame, making it precious because it was limited.

In the departure lounge in any airport, you will see many thousands going on holiday. At this time of year, departures from airports soar like the planes themselves, and staff are busier than ever. On the other side of the same building, travellers return, with suntans, silly hats and odd shaped parcels – the picture or urn from that market that won't fit in the case.

Yet Departure and Arrivals halls also tell other stories – of those who leave for longer periods, to make their home elsewhere, to leave for an indefinite period. There are those who come having broken off ties with all that is familiar, fearful yet also hoping for a new start. Holidays are not the same as longer term comings and goings. Their appeal lies at least partly in knowing (or assuming) that we will return – to our own beds, to the friends and even the work we left. Refreshed, we hope, but safely back.

Inevitably, those other kinds of departure are in

my mind this month. In most parishes, there is a kind of lull in the summer. Committees and other groups don't meet, magazines do double issues. And then it picks up again - the holiday period is over. This year is different for us, because when it picks up again, we will be going on without Andrew, the Rector. Most of you have travelled with Andrew for longer than I have, and we each have our own version of what this has meant. For me personally, Andrew's leaving is a great sadness. It has been a privilege to have started my ordained ministry in his company and under his tutelage, and I will miss him. So this particular summer is one of change, not just a temporary cessation of activities. Departures may be times of sadness, but they also offer a chance to be grateful for shared experience and growth. Go well, Andrew, and thank you.

I have been in and around the Church of England long enough to know that rectors come and go. The Church goes on, and the time of journeying together becomes part of shared history, just as it does when friends move away. One chapter ends, we look to the next. And so, no doubt, it will be for us. The Church of England has two words for the time when a church is between incumbents -'interregnum' and 'vacancy'. Both are pretty inappropriate. For the next few months, it will be the rectory, yes, but not the Church that is 'vacant'. One of the things I enjoy about being in this place is that the Anglican Church here has a life of its own that does not depend on the clergy. And so it should be. Yet we do need to consider how we view this coming period of waiting for a new incumbent. Is it a sort of

Sideways Pre-Nursery School

Earlier this year the unthinkable happened and Helen Pawsey, 'Auntie Helen' to many generations of village schoolchildren, retired. It is with considerable sadness that we learnt that the Committee of Sideways had concluded that without Helen's inspiration and experience, Sideways was not a viable concern. Accordingly the Committee had decided to close the school. For the Hall the closure of Sideways, one of our oldest tenants, had particular sorrow because of the loss of such an old friend.

There will be no successor to Sideways and therefore all its toys and equipment are to be disposed of in the very near future.

Fundraising

The Jazz Evening in March raised over £700, which was a very healthy outcome particularly given that we unwisely held the evening in Lent when at least two renowned partygoers had foresworn alcohol for Lent!

What we have been doing recently

At the beginning of June we tidied up the storage areas in the Hall, disposed of various items, catalogued the rest and generally tidied up. We are currently in the process of identifying the owners of the catalogued items so that we can discuss long-term arrangements for their storage.

Redecoration

We have arranged for the Hall to be redecorated in August so that we have a cheerful and pleasant facility to offer for hire whilst we consider the next stage of refurbishment.

Refurbishment

We launched two unsuccessful initiatives earlier this year. First we asked the village, via 'The Link', whether there were any generous architects who might be prepared to give us the benefit of their thoughts on how we might refurbish the Hall. The result was a deafening silence.

Next we asked our users, through the pages of our Newsletter, what improvements they would like to see. This time the silence was broken by one thoughtful response.

Disappointing though the response was, it did at least provide us with the perfect answer to complaints about any changes we make to the facilities: "You were asked, but declined the opportunity to say your piece," The irritating thing is that we have lost four or five months whilst we waited for these initiatives to bear fruit. We are now planning to commission an architect to give us ideas of what we might do with the hall to improve the facilities and to maximise the use that we can make of the space. Once we have completed this process and reached some preliminary conclusions on the best way forward, we shall publish our ideas and seek opinions on them. If this form of consultation does not produce a response, then we will have to consider simply imposing our ideas.

Village Summer Play Scheme

The Village Play Scheme is due to run from Monday 31st July to Friday 18th August. The Hall is booked from 9.30am to 4.00pm each day. Rachel Butterworth is running the Play Scheme for the Parish Council. Further details may be obtained from Ruth Clifford, the Parish Clerk, on 813214.

On Sunday 18th June, Arthur Douglas of Bentfield Road was presented with a Special Papal Blessing. It was also Arthur's 85th birthday. Arthur is a very much loved member of the parish family at St Theresa's Church, who although not being in the best of health is a dedicated member of the Church and is unfailingly cheerful and helpful to all who come through our doors. After receiving the blessing, Arthur wrote this piece for our Newsletter. For us it sums up everything about Arthur, which has made him the great, though humble, loving man that he is.

At a very early age my parents died and I was adopted into a non-catholic family. This came about like this. On the day they buried my dear mother, the Catholic priest offered his sympathy to a family who were burying their six month old son. The priest said to the family: "On this sad day you are burying a six month old son, and I am looking for a home for a four year old boy who has been orphaned." That family became my foster family and they supported me in the practice of my Catholic faith even though some of it seemed a bit strange to them. I was also helped in my personal development and faith instruction by the local Catholic school and Miss Delaney.

At the age of 18, this lad from the industrial area of Lancashire found himself in the snow capped peaks of the Arctic Circle in Norway, land of the midnight sun. When the shooting started there were many silent prayers in the trenches and some unusual expressions of faith, but also lots of good humour too. When I was 21, I enjoyed the warm sunshine of India and Burma, and felt the hostility of the Japanese as well. My mind returns there occasionally (especially at Mass), and I think of the time I helped dig a trench for a fallen comrade in a remote jungle, said some prayers, and bade "Farewell mate". I was part of a Gurkha Division and only saw a Catholic padre occasionally when Mass was celebrated in the jungle. Yet, all the time, my Catholic faith was a part of me.

In later life I called on this faith again and again during my wife's long Alzheimer's illness over ten years. And I am not afraid to say that when things got very bad indoors, my back

garden became my Garden of Gethsemane. There I'd pray for the strength to return indoors and sort out whatever confronted me. My prayer was: "Lord, help me get through this day. I will deal with tomorrow when it comes." My wife died on Christmas Eve 1995 aged 78 years, bless her.

When Fr Joe started the parish Care Group, I helped as best I could and enjoyed visiting people in their homes or in the local Nursing Homes. Now it is my turn to be on the receiving end of medical treatment. I spend four and a half hours on a dialysis machine in Broomfield Hospice two to three times a week, and I will do so for the rest of my life. In the hospital there is plenty of time to reflect, and pray. There is much common sharing with the sick and the nursing staff. Life has indeed come full circle. After I laid my foster parents and beloved wife to rest, I went to Knock in Co Mayo where my grandparents and father came from. With the help of Mgr Grealey, then in charge of Knock Shrine, I found the church in the village of Bekan, where my grandparents were married.

UTTLESFORD DISTRICT COUNCIL

Post Office

Anyone who has patronised Y&Z Minimarket will have seen that construction work is well under way for the new post office. It is scheduled to open on 4th September. Security work is an important part. Staff training is planned for August. Disabled access is something still under discussion. So in little over a month's time we will once again be able to carry out full postal transactions again in the village and will no longer have to traipse miles to collect an undelivered letter or package.

Airport Expansion
Have you browsed the new website;
www.stanstedexplained.info

That's where you can find out what is going on about the airport and the latest planning application to grow beyond 25 million passengers. You can look in on a whole week of public meetings held in early July and more on what's known as a webcast. The meetings were viewable live at the time and are now archived. If you can look in, you will see that well over a 100 people came along and made their views known. Concerns about noise, traffic, air pollution, water use, global warming, community breakdown in some villages, hopes for more employment and BAA giving their reasons for further growth.

I gave a spiel mainly on global warming and the cost of the airport to local taxpayers. You can read what I said on the blog on the website and can even listen to me being interviewed on what's known as as a podcast. This is all very innovative stuff for Uttlesford. It is a sign of a real determination to demystify the planning process by making it much more open to the public. As to the outcome of the planning application, which may come as early as September, I feel that it's far less a foregone conclusion than it was three years ago that permission will be granted by Uttlesford District Council. It's far more certain that we will get our post office back!

Recycling

The rollout of the wheeled bins will take place in the week beginning 14th August. The first collection will be the week beginning 21st August. Stansted is in phase IV of the programme. Dunmow and Felsted, which were in phase I, have reported big increases in recycling. What we are trying to do with our recycling strategy is:

- Improve the district's recycling performance
- Reduce waste to landfill
- Maximise recycling credits and minimise landfill taxes and penalties
- Raise the understanding in households of the environmental and economic benefits of reuse and recycling.

Naturally, there are legitimate concerns about the changes to recycling. That is why officers have been visiting residents who have either applied for exemptions or for assisted collections. The Council has a recycling hotline on 01799 510344 to deal with any questions that people may have.

Policing in Stansted

Together with Parish Councillors Ruth Rawlinson and Valerie Trundle I met Sergeant Tim Enstone who heads up the neighbourhood police team at Stansted Station. He believes that the changes made will be positive for the village. He doesn't believe we have a huge crime problem but we do have a nuisance youth problem. There is 24 hour policing cover from the station. The designated neighbourhood community officers for Stansted are PC Clive Meakins and PC Joanne Jeggo. Currently the station is not open to the public, despite the Chief Constable's assurances. Unlike Dunmow and Saffron Walden police stations, we currently do not have any civilian assistance. This is something I will be taking up at the next South West Area Panel, where Inspector Shaw will be the main speaker.

Airport postscript

As Alan has mentioned, the public engagement week was a successful innovation for the Council. It gave objectors and supporters of full use of the runway to make their case to members of the Development Control Committee. I took the opportunity of speaking in the slot reserved for District Council members. As a regular commuter to London I questioned whether the infrastructure could cope with such a significant expansion. I also drew attention to the problem Stansted has with fly parking. I quoted one of our MEPs, Andrew Duff, who had written to me stating "With Luton and Stansted, our region risks becoming one of the biggest polluters in Europe ... Airports can only expand if carbon dioxide emissions are not increased and other EU environmental controls, such as those on noise, are strictly met."

IN MEMORIAM

Ken Sell 1918-2006

My father represented part of a vanishing generation, a world we will not see again. He was born in Newport, one of a family of four. His father worked at the railway station as a signalman. As a child walking down the High Street he would be expected to doff his cap if he met the squire from Shortgrove Hall. The Sell family had long been resident in Newport. He used to mention his great grandfather 'Stoney' Sell born in the reign of King William IV who was still alive when he was a child. It was a standing joke in the family that he would always remind his daughters-in-law that the leper stone on the B1383 was built by the Sell family. His was a country upbringing; pheasant and rabbit would supplement the family larder.

His could have been a simple life, but he was destined to live through extraordinary times. He had joined the Territorial Army before the outbreak of the war. Called up to serve in the Royal Regiment of Fusiliers when war was declared, the British Expeditionary Force, of which he was a member was sent to France in 1939. We have a copy of a photograph of a picture which appeared in Picture Post of Ken marching with his regiment up the Maginot Line. He was wounded on the beaches at Dunkirk in 1940 and was evacuated on a fishing smack. He regained consciousness at Dover; he hadn't had his boots off for three weeks. Subsequently he served with the 8th Army in North Africa. The family still have a German army officer's field glasses. The end of the war found him in France, Belgium and Germany. He was there at the liberation of Belsen concentration camp and was also present at the subsequent war crimes trial. He was also a patient in the same ward as William Joyce, 'Lord Haw-Haw'. It had been a difficult war for my father. Like many others, he was always reluctant to talk about what he had witnessed, but there is no doubt that they left their mark.

After the war he returned to Civvy Street. It was through Newport that he met Jane Suckling. Although Jane lived in Haverhill, she spent a lot of time at her aunt's in Newport. They married in 1949. Early married life was spent at Chertsey; this was followed by a move to Bishop's Stortford. In 1958 now with two young children Geoffrey and Christopher, Jane and Ken moved to a new bungalow in Millfields, Stansted.

Ken spent much of his working life at the Fire Service Training School at Stansted Airport. He was responsible for the maintenance of the fire engines. Always a very practical man, this suited him. Work was important to him. In the winter of 1963, with snow deep on the ground, he walked six miles to work. In 1976 he was the proud recipient of the Imperial Service Medal awarded by Her Majesty The Queen.

In his spare time he developed a keen interest in bowls. He was a long-standing member of both Thaxted and Stansted Clubs. Another interest was wine making. Every year he would make gallons of wine. Friends and family consumed much of it. He would scour the countryside for nettles and other ingredients. His wine featured on an Anglia television programme. In retirement he was a volunteer driver at the

Day Centre and also a guide at the Windmill. He was always on hand to do jobs at his sons' flats.

He was a devoted family man, and was pleased to welcome the arrival of his daughters-in-law Sophie and Marife. He enjoyed the company of his two eldest grandchildren, Fides and Voltaire. Although he took pleasure in the births of his two youngest grandchildren Edward and Billy, his health had begun to decline. He spent his twilight years being very well looked after at Stanley Wilson Lodge, in Saffron Walden.



Our speaker this month, Canon John Howden, may be known to some of you as it transpired during his talk that he was for nine years the Warden at the Retreat House at Pleshey. His title of 'Life with Auntie' did of course refer to the BBC and so it was quite surprising to learn of all the other things he has done. Born in Iran of missionary parents he came back to England after the war at the age of five years and initially after school trained in architecture in London. From there he went into theatre work, doing scenic design as well as a few ' bit parts'. He met his wife to be in a summer season at Newquay, but they didn't marry until they met again two years later. After marriage and the birth of two children he became ordained at Salisbury and had a parish in Kent.

His introduction to broadcasting came via Radio Medway, where he did 'Thought for the Day'; a two minute long spot. On moving to Banbury he did a Sunday programme which lasted for an hour. Gradually the radio work took over and he spent eight years as Sports & Arts producer for Radio Humberside, where he met Kate Adie, Michael Buerk and Desmond Lyneham amongst others. On going down to London to work for the BBC, he moved to Essex, living in Stock. We were pleased to hear that the famous 'Woman's Hour' programme is considered to be one of the best to work on.

He conducted a small survey on our habits of radio listening - it showed that about 80% of us listen to radio and the majority of our group to Radio 4, though quite a few listen to local radio stations. He played examples of the many amusing errors that happen in live radio broadcasting and particularly in interviews. The art of interviewing is to allow the other person to get a word in! Phone-in radio was in fact instigated by local radio and could be very embarrassing when interviews are carried on late at night, and people will say almost anything. There were some amusing examples of radio announcers 'corpsing', being unable to get the words out because of giggling - often John said they didn't know themselves why they laughed.

During this time he had been a non-stipendiary priest and then decided after several years to go back into the church full time, which is when he became Warden at Pleshey. Now retired he lives in Writtle, but remains very active giving talks and still preaching.

Members were asked if they would like a theatre trip to Harlow to see Bishop's Stortford Musical Theatre Company's production of '42nd Street' in November. It is hoped to arrange a coach as well. Plans are also afoot to go to the Newmarket Races next year on 'Ladies Day'.

paid to farmers for milk and the threat this gives to doorstep deliveries. We have sent a card to the Prime Minister to support this view, and hope that he will take note of the WI!



Nature Notes

The wild flowers have been going through a purple patch this month, particularly on some of Stansted's waste ground, with fine displays of willow herbs, mallows, orchids, centaury, knapweed and thistles. Even the sinister deadly nightshade is doing its bit with its dark purple trumpet-like flowers. Conditions seem to have suited the plant life this year and there are already signs that there will be an abundance of berries, nuts and seeds this autumn.

Nowadays, roadside verges are havens for wild flowers, and walks along our local country lanes can be a real joy at this time of year. If you happen to be a passenger in a car queuing at the roundabout just before the motorway where Birchanger Lane and Dunmow Road from Stortford join the A120, you could see masses of orchids and the intensely pink flowers of centaury on the gravelly verges. On the road to Widdington, two to three hundred yards after leaving the main Newport road, there are several broomrape plants growing. Broomrape is parasitic, feeding on the roots of other plants. It is a brown, spiky plant which looks a bit like a dead orchid and is easily overlooked.

The other night a bat made frequent passes just above my head, presumably picking off some of the flies that would have been circling in the little thermal of warm air rising from my body. All our bats are protected species and one sometimes hears laments about the loss of their traditional roosts in barns and hollow trees. I am not sure that they are that choosy about their accommodation, provided that there is a good supply of flying insects in the vicinity to feed on. From time to time a pair of bats have taken up residence behind the UPVC soffits under the eaves of our house, and I know of several other such instances in fairly modern houses. I have had an interesting report of a house that has had two or more bats living under the eaves over recent years. This year the numbers have increased dramatically and one evening over 50 bats were counted flying out before it got too dark to see properly. They leave the roost over a period of several minutes during the late evening and return in a long line before dawn, as in the nature films. One wonders why and how they have gathered like this. There must be a food supply not too far away, which has possibly only recently appeared. Perhaps

I am constantly learning something new, either from observation or from the experiences of others, and with this in mind I suggest that anyone interested in natural or local history might like to join in a walk of three to four miles just to see what we see, and share any specialised knowledge. If it is found to be worthwhile we can arrange further walks or outings throughout the changing seasons of the year. You are invited to turn up, suitably attired, to set off from the Memorial Gardens, Chapel Hill, at 3.30pm on Sunday 6th August.





LARGER FLEAS HAVE SMALLER FLEAS UPON THEIR BACKS TO BITE THEM!



Well it seems like I've hardly finished removing grass seeds from dogs' paws than the other scourge of the summer is back. Fleas! I was happily stroking a rather nice Springer the other day, congratulating the owner on going a whole week without having to remove a grass seed from one paw or another when I felt a curious tickle on my hand. I looked down to see a small brown flea, and I could have sworn it smiled at me before 'pinging' off somewhere, which of course set me off itching for the rest of the day!

Fleas are a common problem in many species of animal and there are many species of flea. Dog fleas can live on cats and hedgehogs and other animals, cat fleas can live on dogs and rabbits and birds and so on and until recently I used to tell owners "Don't worry, fleas can't live on us, we haven't got the right sort of blood to enable them to reproduce". However, I was reading an article in a veterinary journal the other day and it seems I now have to change my advice. New research has shown that the flea species pulex irritans, which can infest dogs, cat and humans alike has been found in the UK. It was known to exist in other parts of the world but was not thought to be common in the UK; however a recent survey has found it to be present in increasingly larger numbers. Although the human flea is still not common, it can carry some pathogens, which may cause disease in humans and we should therefore be more thorough with our flea control.

So, the golden rules for flea control:

- 1. Get your flea control preparations from a vet. We can sell products that are more effective than supermarket and pet shop products
- 2. Treat all the animals in the house on the same day

- 3. Follow the manufacturer's instructions and repeat the treatment at the correct intervals
- Treat the environment as well as the animals
- Don't panic!

Other points to remember are that washing your pet or its bedding does not kill fleas it just makes them clean fleas! You will need a proper flea preparation to actually kill them. Flea powders, sprays and shampoos are all rather outdated now. The most effective products are the 'spot-on' products where you just apply the product to the skin on the back of the animal's neck.

If you need any advice about flea treatment, pop into the surgery or give Angela a ring. She or one of the nurses can talk you through what is most appropriate for your pet. We've stocked up on all the most effective flea products so we won't run out over the summer. There are even some preparations that are combined flea and worm 'spot-ons' so you can do two jobs in one. If you are still worried, book in to see one of the nurses and she will even apply the treatment to your pet for you. So, there are really no excuses now.





THE NOSTALGIA PAGE

We are giving Dick Pollard's entertaining reminiscences of Stansted's carnivals a miss in this issue in favour of an abridged account from the Herts and Essex Observer of 11th May 1935 in which the Jubilee festivities are described. We are grateful to Mrs Foster of Bentfield Bower for the loan of her copy.

STANSTED JUBILEE CELEBRATIONS

The whole day's programme went with a swing, the organisation being such that there was practically no hitch throughout. The proceedings starting fittingly with the merry ringing of the Church bells from 9 to 10 am followed by the ceremony of the planting of the oak tree on the Recreation Ground by Mr Arthur Findlay, Chairman of the Jubilee Committee, assisted by Mr James Friend. A large crowd, among which were many members of the committee, watched the planting and when Mr Findlay had declared the tree well and truly planted in commemoration of the King's Jubilee, three cheers were called for by Mr Findlay and were heartily given.

The Thanksgiving Service at St Paul's was relayed in St John's Church, the Memorial Ground and the Congregational Church, the reception in each place, where there were large attendances, being exceptionally clear.

At 1 pm the Carnival procession assembled in Lower Street and Stansted surpassed itself in an array of colour and original decoration and costumes of every description. There was a large number of entrants in all classes, the children especially having availed themselves with great delight of the chance of 'dressing up'. The procession made its way to Hargrave Park along the gaily decorated route, via Chapel Hill followed by a crowd larger than any seen in Stansted for many a long day - all entering with abandon into the spirit of the day's festivities. The ground having been eventually reached, the judging was completed.

The sports were an attractive feature and there were many entrants in the varied programme of children's races. The judges of the children's races were Mrs E Cawkell, Miss Harper, Messrs R Vercoe, C G Mason, W Gold and H Caton and the Starter was Mr A Johnson. Their part in the races being practically over, the children trooped off eagerly for their teas which were provided for the boys at the Assembly Room, Working Men's Club and for the girls at the Silver Street Schoolroom. Members of the committee and other volunteers helped with the serving of the refreshments.

In the evening various races for adults were run and an exciting tug-of-war resulted in a win for the Fire Brigade. There was also a boxing display, the combatants being
1) W Worton v K Florey, 2) Leslie Treacher v J Turner
3) H Turner v B Turner 4) W Rush v W Ratcliff (in fancy dress). The Fire Brigade's skilful display of various drills was an interesting feature.

After the presentation of the prizes in the evening for the various classes of fancy costume and the sports by Mrs Arthur

Findlay, Mr Findlay spoke a few words remarking that this was the end of a perfect day and he wished before separating to ask everyone to recognise the work which had been put in by the Jubilee Committee. It was impossible to mention all the names of the helpers, there were about 50, but two names stood out: they were those of Miss Molly Gold and their Secretary Mr C F Wells. To Miss Gold was due their thanks for the idea of the procession and the sports and also the dance which was being held and she had been principally responsible for their organisation. Mr Wells throughout the organisation of the whole thing had put in splendid work for weeks past. Mr Wells had been a most industrious secretary. The Vicar deserved a special word of thanks for the fine way he had acted as announcer. Thanks were also due to Mr P H Newbound for the use of the Park.

Miss Molly Gold presented Mrs Findlay with a bouquet of irises and carnations expressing thanks for her help in presenting the prizes. Mrs Findlay replied and called for a specially loud cheer for the work Miss Molly Gold had put in and also for Mr Wells for all that he had done to help to give them this memorable day. "We must be thankful" said Mrs Findlay "that we have such people in Stansted to organise and carry out such a programme."



Up until this moment I have been sitting watching Wimbledon on the television and trying to stay cool. Then I realised I have things to do – namely remind you that there will not be another 'Link' before October and I must, therefore, tell you now what the History Society has in store for you when our new programme starts on Thursday 7th September at 8.00pm.

We are looking forward on that evening to hear Glyn Warwick tell us of the Stansted War Memorial and the men who fought in World War 1. We have been commemorating the 90th anniversary of the Battle of the Somme this year and there will be a lot of interest in this subject. At the following meeting on 5th October our old friend, Robert Barltrop, will be talking about the Circus. He has many relatives in the circus profession so that we should be hearing the 'inside story'. The remainder of the year's programme will be available on the Membership Card at our first meeting.

In the meantime, I hope that you will be enjoying the summer and a bit of a break and we all look forward to seeing you in the new autumn season.

SSE Endorses Call For Aviation Policy Rethink

Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE) has given its endorsement to a national campaign calling for the Government's aviation policy to be scrapped which was launched on 27th June by AirportWatch – the alliance of national environmental campaign organisations and airport campaign groups.

The Rethink! campaign highlights the fact that the Government's drive to triple air transport activity by 2030 will accelerate climate change, damage the countryside and inflict traffic and noise misery on communities near to airports.

At Stansted, for example, BAA has recently applied for permission to increase the number of permitted flights on the airport's single runway and for the removal of any limit on passenger numbers. Such a move could see the current 22 million passengers a year more than double in the future if the application is approved by planning authority Uttlesford District Council. This would significantly worsen the pain already experienced by people across Herts, Essex, Suffolk and Cambridgeshire as a result of the airport's operation. However, it is not just these counties, which are threatened as a result of the Government's expansion policy, but communities across the UK.

The timing of the campaign is significant since the Government is set to review its 2003 Air Transport White Paper this autumn. Rethink! aims to pile on the pressure by stimulating members of the public to raise their concerns through a simple online letter to Transport Minister Douglas Alexander, accessible at www.rethink.airportwatch.org.uk.

Said SSE's Campaign Director, Carol Barbone: "The Government's aviation policy is out of date and out of touch and the sooner the Transport Minister-recognises that only a thorough rethink will do, the better. The more pressure that can be applied by people taking part in the letter writing initiative, the more the Government will have to take on board the need for a whole new approach to airport expansion."

The ten demands of the Rethink! campaign are as follows:

- 1. Rein back expansion so it is consistent with climate change targets. Aviation emissions must be reduced in line with national carbon quotas.
- 2. Revise demand forecasts. The review must recognise that rising oil prices will limit demand for air travel and growth forecasts should be revised accordingly.
- 3. Remove the tax-breaks the aviation industry enjoys. The aviation industry currently enjoys effective subsidies worth £9 billion in the form of annual UK tax exemptions through **not** paying fuel tax or VAT. These tax exemptions are likely to be removed by 2030 and growth forecasts should be adjusted accordingly.

- 4. Reassess air freight. Air is the most environmentally-damaging way of transporting goods, yet substantial tax breaks artificially inflate demand. The concept of Air Passenger Duty should be extended to freight to correct this.
- 5. Reduce the noise suffered by local communities. Almost half a million people suffer noise at or above recognised annoyance thresholds, and under White Paper proposals that number would rise to almost three quarters of a million. The review should commit to reducing both noise levels and the number of people exposed.
- 6. Respect the country's heritage, biodiversity and ancient woodlands. The review must abandon proposals that will destroy irreplaceable habitats and buildings.
- 7. Revisit rail. The review should examine rail as a substitute for short haul flights.
- 8. Revise the economic assessment of the aviation industry. The review should be based on an independent, factual assessment of aviation's contribution to the economy.
- 9. Review the big expansion plans for the UK airports. A mere progress report is not enough the review needs to be a fundamental rethink of aviation policy.
- 10. Rethink! the approach. Aviation policy must change business as usual is not an option.


