

To raise awareness about people who live on the streets, the Scouts hosted a homeless night. I packed up some warm clothes, a blanket and a sleeping bag. I also took my warm fluffy boots, a hat, gloves and scarf to prepare for a cold night. We met at the Scout head-quarters (HQ) where we were sleeping outside. There was a plastic groundsheet laid on the grass to stop the damp on the ground coming through and one above us to keep the rain off. Our Santa at the Mill event attracted 75 children to see Santa and pass on their wish list. Santa and his helpers had been busy preparing gifts in anticipation of seeing more than 100 children as had been the case in 2023, so he was left with a number of presents to take back to his base. The wet and windy weather on the day was certainly a factor in the drop in numbers; unfortunately there were a number of other commercial fake Santa events which may have had some impact.

The treasurer has reported a profit of nearly £400 on the event which will go into the Mill conservation fund. Whilst all income is welcome, any events we organise to raise funds will only generate a fraction of the money we need for big conservation projects; amongst these is the repointing of the mill brick work, which will cost over £50,000. Although the mill is not in any imminent danger, we were very concerned to discover that during the heavy rain recently we found water running down the inside of the wall on the SE side. We traced that back to the wall where the first external iron band is situated. If we fail to get the repointing done the structure will deteriorate eventually to the point where it becomes unsafe and public access has to be denied. We were pleased to have secured grants of £7,500 from Essex Heritage Trust and £1,000 from The Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings Mill fund. We are awaiting the outcome of a number of other funding applications, including the Stansted Airport Community Fund Flagship award which, if we are lucky enough to be successful, would be worth £50,000.

AUBREY BUXTON NATURE RESERVE

December saw wet and relatively warm conditions with hardly any frost. The three main ponds in the reserve are now full and all of the other ditches and depressions are full of water, providing multiple locations for our frogs and toads to breed. Given the number of frogs that were present in the reserve at the end of the summer I am expecting to see lots of frogspawn anytime from the end of January or early February.

The saturated ground has led to a few trees being partially blown over in the high winds at the end of December and the volunteer group have been making these safe as well as laying a new anti-slip surface to the lower boardwalk. Despite the damp conditions underfoot the reserve still offers a wonderful space to enjoy nature. It is a good time to look out for treecreepers as they are more easily seen without the foliage on the trees. These active little birds will be seen close to the bark gradually working their way up the tree trunk in a spiralling climb looking for insects, spiders and grubs.

IN MEMORIAM DOREEN PEGGY HONOUR 19th July 1933-19th November 2023



Peggy Honour, née Powell, was born in north London in 1933. As a child in East Barnet during the Second World War she remembered seeing a red glow in the sky and being told that it was London burning in the Blitz. She went to live with an aunt in Northampton for about a year during the war but returned as the threat decreased.

She finished her education at Watford Technical School on a commercial course which gave her secretarial and bookkeeping skills which she used in a number of early jobs. Much later it was also very useful when she set up in business with her husband, Derek who she married in 1956. They moved to Stansted shortly before their first son, Keith, was born in 1958, buying a house in Blythwood Gardens. They lived in the road for more than 60 years during which time they became actively involved in numerous aspects of village life. Early on, Peggy joined the Evening WI in Stansted, going on to serve in various roles including President. She was a WI member for more than 60 years and made many friends there. She was on the Stansted carnival committee for a few years and was involved with stalls and floats over a long period. Particularly memorable was Peggy dressed as the March Hare on the WI Alice in Wonderland float. She also plucked up courage to sing occasional folk songs in village concerts.

Peggy served on Stansted Parish Council for 14 years. She chaired the finance committee for a while and later the windmill committee. The windmill became a particular passion of hers. She worked as one of the Millers, welcoming visitors, helping to raise funds and organising the annual windmill fête. She later became one of the trustees of the mill responsible for its maintenance and preservation. She was in that role when extensive restoration work was carried out in 2010 which, amongst other things, enabled the cap to turn again to face the sails into the wind. As members of the Essex Windmills Group, she and Derek visited numerous mills around East Anglia and they would often find a nearby mill when on holiday.

Peggy was a founding member of the Stansted Mountfitchet Local History Society, serving in various committee roles, including chair, and was a member for about 13 years in all. She wrote some articles for *The Link* magazine, contributed stories for a children's story page and assisting her husband Derek as editor. She supported other organisations too, such as attending WEA evening classes and the Stansted Music Festival. She did not drive so was regularly seen walking round the village, in the shops and library.

Derek and Peggy set up D Honour and Son Landscape Ltd in Stansted in 1978 and its vehicles can be seen around the area to this day. In the early years, Peggy provided all the office support, answering the phone, typing and doing the accounts. She later had help with this as the business grew but her meticulous record keeping ensured a sound basis for the business. My brother, Keith took the landscaping business forward and when they eventually retired, Peggy and Derek made the most of it with cruises. After their first trip up the coast of Norway to Spitzbergen, Peggy in particular, was hooked. In the garden, Peggy took part in the British Trust for Ornithology annual garden bird watch and loved sitting watching the comings and goings of birds in the garden with a cup of tea in her hand. In later years they greatly enjoyed their fish and chip group of old friends who met for lunch, usually in The Cock pub.

After Derek died in 2018, she moved to Mumbles, by Swansea and the Gower Peninsular, to live near me. She passed away peacefully on 19th November and is greatly missed by her sons, their wives and her five grandchildren.




Volunteers Wanted



It was established in the 1890s by the Gilbey family of Elsenham Hall. The local area had many lavender fields and before manufacturing jam, the factory produced lavender water. In addition to the fascinating views of the jam factory and its employees from the early days to its final closure, Mike handed round examples of packaging, including the distinctive pots used for *Gentleman's Relish*, or *Patum peperium*.

Our December meeting took the form of a festive afternoon tea provided by members of the committee, two of whom also provided the entertainment: a tribute to the much loved Joyce Grenfell. Judy Colliver performed two of her monologues. The first was *Useful and acceptable gifts*, the first that Joyce Grenfell wrote, based on the character of a WI speaker suggesting gifts that could be made at home using re-cycled items. The second was set in a nursery school. I gave a brief overview of Joyce Grenfell's life and work and the members heard two of her *songs Old Tyme Dancing* and *I'll See You Today*. Our children and young people have many reasons to feel stressed, from performing well academically to societal pressures to fit in, to dress and look a certain way, heightened by what they see on social media. 



Over the Christmas period the team helped to put up the Elsenham Christmas tree; this was a fantastic morning helping all the local volunteers.



The wet weather and wind have caused the crew to respond to a variety of incidents. In the midst of Storm Henk in January the station was extremely busy. We were even called back to our own station after a concerned resident reported a potentially hazardous tree on our own station ground. The crew closed the area and were thankful to a local tree management company for coming out as an emergency and taking the tree down safely. The crew have also been attending a lot of incidents involving cars being stuck in flood water and we would like everyone to take note of this safety statement:

- Keep an eye on weather reports for flooding in your area; do not travel in heavy rain unless essential
- Do not ignore road closed signs
- Never attempt to cross or drive through floodwater if you do not know how deep the water is. Just two feet of water will float a car
- Never try to swim through fast flowing water or floodwater; you may get swept away or be injured by an object in the water
- Do not assume fords are safe to cross just because the road is not closed. Always look at the river level gauge and use your common sense
- Floodwater may be contaminated. Never allow children or pets to go near or play in floodwater
- Prepare a flood kit in case your home floods or you are trapped in a vehicle for any period. This should contain a change of clothing, wellies, waterproofs and blankets, a torch, charged mobile, medication and a first aid kit and a list of useful numbers, including flood alert lines.

PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

...with news of our part-night lighting trial, support now being offered to Stansted businesses, our plans to boost biodiversity across the village, the search for a site for much needed almshouses and the publication of parish councillors' attendance at meetings since April 2023



Lighting trial gets under way

s we moved into the new year, our contractor was busy

converting the last of the 88 village street lights scheduled to be switched to part-night lighting as part of a three-month trial announced by the Parish Council back in September.

AJ Lighting has been paying regular visits to Stansted Mountfitchet since October, replacing traditional bulbs to energy-efficient LED ones as well as fitting timers to allow for lights to be turned off from midnight to 5am.

With each visit, more of the

village's streets have been incorporated into the trial which, as a result, has got under way with a rolling start. "You may notice for the first week or two the lights may come on at odd times," explains Andy, our contractor. "But this will only be temporary and happens because sensors in the lights need to assess and adjust to the existing day light hours."

The Parish Council maintains 242 street lights and switching to LEDs and installing timers will cost less to run and be less polluting. Converting the lights has been paid for with

> £34k provided by the district council from their Zero-Carbon fund. This grant was conditional on streets in Stansted being switched to partnight lighting.

The part-night lighting scheme is still at a trial stage. Main thoroughfares will continue to be lit all night as will the take a few twitchells. And wherever you are in the village between

midnight and 5am, the scheme has been planned so you will never be out of sight of an illuminated light. But you are welcome to let us know of any areas where you believe a re-think is needed. You can do so by emailing info@stanstedmountfitchet-pc.gov.uk or calling our office on 01279 813214.

Grants for business at the Exchange


Andy Schmiedecke, Business Support Officer at Uttlesford District Council, will hold another advice drop-in from 10am-1pm at the Mountfitchet Exchange on February 9th.

The drop-ins no appointments needed, by definition! kicked off at the end of 2023. They have been organised to make it easier for firms in Stansted to apply for grants to support their businesses. Andy and his team at the district council are keen to make local entrepreneurs aware of three avenues of funding available to them:

- Business Start Up Grants: These are worth between £500-£2,000 and can be applied for if you have been trading for less than two years
- The High Street Premises Enhancement Fund: Between £500 and £5,000 is available to improve or repair your shop front
- Low Carbon Workplace Grants: These see £500-£5,000 distributed to small- to medium-sized firms adapting their operations to reduce their carbon footprint.

The drop-ins also provide an opportunity to point local businesses in the right direction for training and for advice on everything from how to set up your own enterprise to how best to compete for local government tenders.

The drop-ins are the result of discussions between members of the recently formed Economic Development Group into how best to support businesses in Stansted. The group consists of members of the Stansted Business Forum, the Stansted Mountfitchet Parish Council and Uttlesford District Council. For the bugs & the bees

Another Parish Council project gathering pace in 2024 is our commitment to deliver a more bio-diverse habitat for the village.

Many of nature's pollinators are under threat both locally and nationally. Climate change and industrial farming practices being two culprits. The Parish Council wants to change this. A long-term plan is soon to get underway to create patches around Stansted where the likes of beetles, butterflies and bumblebees can thrive.

The project hinges on the successful use of wildflower planting and rewilding at eight locations around the village between 2024 and 2028:

Pennington Lane 2024-2025
High Lane knight sign 2024-2026
Walson Way Green 2026
Foresthall Park Suds 2025-2026
Memorial Gardens 2026-2027
Recreation Ground 2027-2028
Forest Hall Road 2027

Elms Farm Park Dependent on land handover

At Walson Way Green and Foresthall Park, rewilding will take the form of self-seeding. So certain plants such as thistles and nettles don't crowd out other varieties, these will be weeded out. A curated look will be maintained by regular grass cuts by the council contractor. Elsewhere, a native mix of annuals and perennials will be sown. Certain spots the Memorial Gardens, the Rec will also see the likes of poppies, English bluebells and snowdrops sited.

Rewilding and wildflower sowing are horticultural practices that take time to bear fruit excuse the pun. In fact, even though quotes are in from contractors to prepare the land, and work at Pennington Lane could start this September, it could be two years before a new habitat is established.

In the meantime, we would ask for residents' patience while nature takes its course to grow a brighter, greener future for Stansted.

Almshouses site search

In January the Parish Council met with representatives from Bloor Homes. Among topics raised was the potential for siting almshouses on land to the east of High Lane, or north of Walpole Meadows, the latter being a site where the developer plans to construct up to 350 homes.

"The talks were positive," says Maureen Caton, Parish

Council chair. "Bloor have said they'd consider allocating a spot for almshouses as one of the project's community gains. But they made it clear they can't make a definite commitment at this stage. And we have a few concerns ourselves. The Walpole Meadows site may not be sustainable due to its

distance from village shops and services."


The Legacy East Almshouse Partnership (LEAP) holds the sum of £800,000 for the construction of almshouses in Stansted. These proceeds from the sale in 2013 of the village's previous almshouses on Church Road are in danger of being spent elsewhere if a new site cannot be found.

As we go to print, we have heard that LEAP are in discussions regarding a potential property in the village.

Stansted has had almshouses since 1882, and sadly they are a community resource needed now as much as they ever were. An increasing number of older people now reach retirement without having been able to buy their own property during their working lifetime.

That is why the Parish Council is keen to hear from anyone in the community who may be able to offer a site for 4-6 almshouses. The sites mentioned in relation to Bloor and Leap are only possibilities at this stage. So if you know of, or could even offer, a suitable alternative spot of land, please email maureencaton@stanstedmountfitchet-pc.gov.uk

Roadworks & the Parish Council



There is no statutory duty to consult with Parish Councils on road works. A listing on the Live Traffic map on the Essex Highways web page is typically the first warning the Parish Council gets of a closure being requested and granted. Roads not named on the map have not had permission for closure. A closure cannot continue beyond the specified date, though a workteam may complete before this time. Also, work may start by a day or so prior to the date on a permit.

Stansted has been under a siege of road closures of late.
Silver Street, High Lane, Church Road, Chapel Hill have all been shut for periods during the last 12 months. Currently, there's a four-week blockade of the B1383 by Affinity Water. Understandably the inconvenience caused by each closure prompts many a resident to ask, can't the Parish Council do something?

Unfortunately, not a lot. Permits to close roads are signed off by Essex County Council. They maintain they have little grounds to refuse a request by a company to shut a road. As the lowest tier of local government, the Parish Council has no statutory power to challenge closures. We do try to inform the community on our website and social media channels on an impending closure as soon as we can. And where it is not possible to give advance warning, we endeavour to provide the most accurate information on the timing of a closure and any diversion route.

But we are reliant on accurate information being provided to us. A case in point here is Affinity Water's B1383 roadworks. Both residents and the Parish Council received conflicting messages on the timing, location and scale of the closure. We can only cross our fingers there will be less road digging in 2024.

Councillors' attendance record

At the end of last year, our Parish Councillors decided in the interest of openness, their record of attendance at meetings should be published twice yearly.

The percentages explained

Under the Local Government Act 1972, council members must attend at least one meeting in six months of the Full Council or a committee of which they are a member if they

are to continue to serve in their role a bar which all 14 of our Parish Councillors comfortably have met.

It should also be noted that a councillor must be physically present at a meeting for their attendance to be recorded. This means the figures exclude occasions when our councillors may have made use of Zoom software to follow a meeting. As such, the figures may not in all circumstances reflect an individual's efforts to contribute to the life of the Parish Council.

Similarly, some members serve on working groups that meet during the daytime or evenings to research particular issues. Again, the figures below do not reflect such commitments. Neither do they capture the attendance/work undertaken by, for example, the Chair, during their frequent trips to the office during the working week on council business and attendance at meetings with other partners such as the District Council.

Finally, parish councillors receive no allowances nor payment for carrying out their duties, unlike councillors at the district and county level. Their work representing the community is entirely voluntary.

DISTRICT COUNCIL UPDATE



The last time I wrote here about life at Uttlesford DC was in September 2023. Since then, residents were asked in the weeks running up to Christmas for their views for the decades-awaited Local Plan. I have no knowledge of what comments residents submitted. What I found disappointing was that residents were asked to comment on an outline list of schemes that did not include any mention of well over 1,000 homes given planning permission near Great Dunmow at the end of October.

Gove controversy

Meanwhile, a related controversy broke out in the first week of January when the District Council's primary opposition group convened an Extraordinary Council meeting for mid-January to address a letter from Rt Hon Michael Gove, the Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing & Communities, etc, in which he raises questions about UDC's ability/intention to deliver a new Local Plan by a government imposed deadline. All I will say in response is that 2024 seems to be shaping up to be worse than 2023 for political madness!

Motion adopted to clean up waterways

Getting down to the basics of life, District Cllr Geoffrey Sell and I put forward a motion at December's Full Council Meeting on the topic of sewage. The motion addressed the dumping of raw sewage into "our precious rivers and chalk streams" and that the Environment Agency has showed "totally unacceptable performance on pollution for most of England's water and sewage companies".

The motion "called on the Prime Minister and the Secretary of State for the Environment to strengthen the legislation on the discharging of raw sewage into our rivers" and to bring in "prompt prosecution and fining of all offending companies".

Geoffrey and I were delighted when the motion, which also requested the government to bring forward the date by which companies are required to reduce their discharges by 50% by some 20 years, was approved unanimously.

The motion authorised the Chief Executive and the Leader of the Council to write to the Secretary of State for the Environment and to our local Member of Parliament to take forward the Council's requests.

The inspiration for the motion came out of a visit in early December to Stansted Sewerage Works with Cllr Sell, together with an aspirant MP called Smita Rajesh. The purpose of the visit had been fact finding about the ability of the works to cope with a growing population in Stansted. We came away feeling that the works' operator may need to speed up plans to upgrade the place. This prompted us to submit the Council motion.

Car park consultation

Finally, be aware that UDC will imminently be reviewing public car parks how they are used and what they cost. Please take part when invited by UDC. The Consultation ends on February 2. You can leave your thoughts at uttlesford.gov.uk/car-parking-consultation



IN THE GARDEN

In her book of Flower Fairies, Cicely Mary Barker illustrates Spring with, among others, The Celandine Fairy who sings: Before the hawthorn leaves unfold, Or buttercups put forth their gold, By every sunny footpath shine The Stars of Lesser Celandine. In February these beacons of spring will once again be giving us a foretaste of the abundance that nature has in store as the year awakens.



In our gardens, the snowdrops will be giving way to crocuses and early daffodils, hellebores, hardy cyclamen and dwarf iris. Now is the time to plant more snowdrops and winter aconites as this should be done 'in the green' before the leaves die back. Overcrowded clumps of existing plants can be lifted and divided at this time too.

February is the time to prune late-flowering shrubs such as buddleia, hardy fuchsias, lavatera and santolina, and to cut back late-flowering group 3 clematis. This includes the viticella, texensis and orientalis varieties where all growth should be cut to 25-45cm from the ground, taking each stem back to just above a healthy bud. As with all plants a good feed and mulch after pruning protects the roots and encourages fresh healthy growth. Pot-grown shrubs benefit from a good organic feed right now. Remove as much soil as possible from around the base of the shrub then replace and top dress with plenty of fresh compost, ideally incorporating a slow-release fertiliser. Although bare-root shrubs and trees can be planted any time during the dormant period between November and March, the optimum moment for planting occurs during February just before the soil begins to warm up, provided the soil is neither frozen nor waterlogged. Daylight hours become appreciably longer throughout February, beckoning us to get out and enjoy our gardens once more.



Weight Loss

It is that time of year again; either buy larger trousers or try the latest fad diet to regain our svelte tummies. Diets come and go, and for many years we were encouraged to follow the low-fat diet. People made every effort to buy low fat foods, but clearly, this dietary advice did not work. As a nation, we grew steadily fatter. The best diet completely depends on you, not the latest fashion. There are three main keys to losing weight: have a compelling reason, know thyself and learn the true meaning of the word *diet*.



A compelling reason is far more than the desire to be slim. Often the reason will be medical – lose weight or you will not live to see your grandchildren. The reason is completely personal to you. No one can give it to you. Know thyself: people are very different from each other. Some really suit the discipline and guidance of a Slimming Club. I am writing this as volunteers work to clear fallen trees and boughs brought down by the torrential rains and winds at the beginning of January. Hopefully February will be seasonal with some cold weather, of course, but also with some of those lovely bright winter days when it is a joy to be outside, seeing the early flowers emerge. For us that means snowdrops, and with luck some aconites too. The snowdrops have spread hugely throughout the gardens, partly because we have planted extra. We have also been careful to leave grass cutting till after the bulbs have replenished themselves and divided, producing extra bulbs and after they have formed seeds. These are apparently planted unwittingly by ants carrying them into their nests!



We do not have as many aconites as we would like. Their bright yellow flowers make for such a cheery sight, often coming a bit before the snowdrops. They are native to Italy, Bulgaria, the Balkans, Turkey and Iraq. I have read they were introduced to Britain in 1596 and were first recorded as being naturalised in the wild in 1838. We have some longstanding clumps but we have found it difficult to establish more. We keep trying though!

Our open days for snowdrops are on **Sunday 18**th, **Thursday 22**nd, **Sunday 25**th **and Thursday 29**th **February**; we have our fingers crossed that the snowdrops will be at their most beautiful then. Gates open at 11.00am; tickets can be purchased in advance through our website or through *www.Trybooking.com* or can be purchased on the day. Snowdrops in the green will be on sale. Please note that the gardens of Warwick House are not open to visitors on the Thursdays. 
