It goes without saying that foraging can be dangerous if you are not experienced; you should never eat anything growing wild unless you can identify it with confidence. Always be careful, safe, and legal as to where you go foraging and what you collect. Knowledge is power and the more you know about wild food, the more you can appreciate the wonderful things that grow around us. You might think that wild food is a bit (to pardon a pun) *thin on the ground*, but there are some truly wonderful edibles to be found if you know where to look.



These amazing mushrooms are either Ruby or Scarlet Elf Cups; without a microscope you cannot tell which. They are a fairly safe mushroom to forage, as both species are edible and so distinctive looking; there is really not much else like these little red wonders! We like to pair these with a nice steak, and our Mountfitchet Red, to create a dinner full of local flavour. We will share more of our favourites as they bloom into life over the coming months.

It is good to see the old photo of the mill on the front cover. The mill has been part of the village skyline since 1787. The current generation of Millers are carrying on the conservation work which dates back to the formation of a Restoration Committee in 1943.

UGLEY WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

Our February meeting saw the very welcome return of Tim Turner, formerly of Sworders. The theme for his talk was Audley End House and its development over the centuries. In the space of just 45 minutes he introduced us to the original owner Sir Thomas Audley, the Howards of Norfolk and the Braybrooke family. Richard Neville, the 3rd Baron Braybrooke was a scholar and antiquarian who, fortunately for posterity, published Dr Johnson's Diary. He also researched the history of Audley End House, making him realise its importance in the history of English architecture. His research led to the publication of The History of Audley End and Saffron Walden in 1836. Tim illustrated his fascinating talk with a number of publications including articles from magazines and a copy of Addison's Audley End published in 1953. He also brought along images of the former owners, allowing us to put faces to names.

Tim kindly judged our competition for a cup and saucer. There were a number for him to choose from and he selected two examples that he felt worthy of mention: a cup and saucer from the Limoges factory and a Crown Derby tea cup and saucer. Although damaged, this attracted his interest as it had been repaired by a china riveter and was a good example of the art of china mending!



BEES AND BUGS

Hello again bee and bug fans. Sorry for the gap in my beekeeping updates, but not much happens over winter. Most bugs die and leave eggs to hatch out in spring or they hibernate, but honeybees are wide awake all winter. That is why they are one of the very first insects you will see in spring. It is also why they make honey which is their winter food; they need quite a lot, because even though they are cold blooded, they vibrate and make heat that way to prevent the hive and its bees from freezing.

So just a little personal information about my bees, before talking about the broader beekeeping environment. I do not have an apiary, as this is a situation you never find in nature anywhere in Europe, where estimated colony density is at least 1 per km². Out of interest, I was in Adelaide last year and they have densities of over 220 per km². But this is a very unnatural environment as honeybees are not endemic.

Back to my bees; around Stansted I have about eight hives. I have been to check on three of the eight and I am glad to report we have a three out of three survival rate so far. Only seven of the eight had bees in at the beginning of winter, and the one I had built had no bees in. We will have to see how the others fared. I do a slightly more natural way of beekeeping and normally have a 100% survivability over winter. The way I do winter checks is just to see if I have any bees flying in and out on sunny warm winter days. I will let you know next month.

GUESS THE OBJECT 2 ANSWER

Well done to Kathy Chatto who correctly identified these small glass dishes as *Penny Licks*.



When ice cream became popular in the late 19th century, people did not have refrigerators with freezer compartments at home, so the only way to enjoy this special treat was in these glasses bought from a vendor. The large glass would cost a penny

and the smaller one a ha'penny. The refractive qualities of the glasses made them appear full, even when they only contained a small amount of ice cream. The customer would lick the ice cream and return the dish to the vendor. Unfortunately the dishes were not very well washed and led to the spread of diseases such as typhoid and cholera. Consequently, the City of London banned the use of penny licks in 1898.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

Ordnance Survey maps from the late 19th century record the location of numerous ponds in farmland across lowland England, but since then farming practices have changed and many have disappeared.

Well-maintained ponds are hot spots for biodiversity, supporting special plants and animals. Responding to concerns about the loss of such habitats, researchers at the *Pond Restoration Research Group* at University College London joined forces with others to investigate the potential for restoring such lost ponds and advised about the best ways to create new ones.

Following on from this, Essex Wildlife Trust identified 17,200 Essex farmland ponds on these old maps but noted that 10,400 had since disappeared. A few have been restored, and the team is working with the *Farming and Wildlife Advisory Group* to secure funding to help more farmers reinstate their lost ponds; for further information please see www.fwageast.org.uk/ponds.



However, pond restoration can be challenging, as evidenced by the difficulties faced resolving problems with the Doctor's Pond in Great Dunmow, pictured above. In recent years it has been polluted by toxic blue green algal growth. Ambitious and costly plans were drawn up to desilt the pond which necessitated the safe removal of fish so they could be returned eventually. Work commenced last October; safety fencing was installed and water drained so that a digger could be used to help remove over 1,900 tons of contaminated silt. Heavy rains made the silt very slippery, and the digger became stranded in January. By the end of February all the silt had been removed.

Future plans include landscaping of the surrounding area and replanting with suitable vegetation once the pond is re-filled. It is anticipated that in the coming months this attractive pond will once again provide a great habitat for ducks, fish and dragonflies.

This year we celebrated the day by:


- Reading to residents at Stansted Mountfitchet Care Home



STANSTED IN BLOOM

An action group has been formed to build on our success in the Anglia in Bloom competition over the last couple of years. Representatives from Human Roots, St Mary's Church, Stansted Social Club, the Aubrey Buxton Nature Reserve and St Mary's School have joined Parish Councillor Alan Barnes and group secretary Trevor Lloyd in planning our entry for the 2025 competition. As well as entering the overall category we hope to have projects nominated in the following subcategories: Public House, Churchyards, Nature Conservation Area or Nature Reserve, Nursing Home or Care Home and Best Young People's project. In addition, we hope to enter the Special Feature category which this year celebrates 200 years of Rail Travel. In the 1920s Stansted station had very impressive gardens. Station Master Tommy Gawthorpe is credited with the layout of the gardens.



In the early post war years Doug Hudgell joined the station staff, and he was largely responsible for creating some very impressive flower beds, most notably his creation for the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II which consisted of a crown in tagetes, blue lobelia and salvias, with an E and R on either side. The garden measured 120ft by 25ft with hanging baskets, flower tubs and pot plants in the booking hall. Stansted regularly entered the British Rail's Eastern Division Gardens Competition and Doug's efforts were rewarded with six Special Class awards and eight First Class awards. The garden featured in a two-page feature about station gardens in a 1983 edition of Popular Gardening Magazine. We have a few pictures of Stansted Station in its heyday but we would love to have more, so please get in touch if you have any which we could add to our display.

Four legged Conservators

Our flock of rare-breed sheep, which are all Hebridean, are helping to transform the overgrown bramble scrub into open wood pasture within several fenced-in enclosures at the forest. They can also be found grazing on the marshland habitats. The first flush of lambs has arrived; several were born in February. It is a very exciting and significant moment as their mothers were born two years ago in the forest and it is amazing to be breeding from our own herd of Hebridean sheep.



Sheep have grazed the forest for centuries and so this keeps a strong historical link alive. Last year we celebrated the 100th year of being owned and managed by the National Trust and we took some of the lambs down to the lake area for a *Meet and Bleat* with visitors. It was a great chance for people to see the lambs and for us to talk about the importance of having sheep on site, whilst also raising awareness of the importance of keeping dogs under control. We hope to do the same this year, so keep an eye on our website for more information.

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

Lent is the old English word for lengthen; the days are indeed thankfully lengthening, we are looking forward to lighter evenings, and of course Easter. It used to be that you gave something up for Lent, often chocolate or alcohol, and in some traditions, meat or rich food. I can remember being told off whilst shopping in my dog collar and putting some chocolate into my basket; you should not be doing that during Lent said a complete stranger! Fast from selfishness and be compassionate; fast from grudges and be reconciled.
Fast from words; be silent and listen.

In whatever way you prepare for the joy of the resurrection on Easter Day, may this season of Lent be a blessing to you and yours.

BRAIN TRAINING

The best Way to Strengthen your Core

Much effort can be spent strengthening our core muscles for pain reduction, performance or vanity reasons. Unfortunately, unless for vanity, research shows those efforts are at best ineffective. In order for the core muscles to engage properly, they need a stable pelvis. Without this, it is like firing a cannon from a canoe; things will not go well.



Let us test this out. Sit down, put your hands on your tummy and rock back and forth. Now rock backwards, press your toes down onto the floor and squeeze your bottom and then rock forwards, keeping your hands on your tummy. Feel the difference? Also practice picking something light up off the floor, maybe a sock, bend over for it normally, then press down the big toes and squeeze the buttocks just before standing up. The core works dynamically, adjusting according to what we are doing. Clearly, picking a bit of paper off the floor is very different from lugging a heavy plant pot about. Get used to engaging the big toes and buttocks and the core will be there for you when needed.

When the pelvis is not stable, various muscles tighten up to protect the spine. It is a survival mechanism and certainly not optimal. These muscles may be the abs themselves, locking up. Another emergency muscle is the diaphragm; be aware of breath holding or audible breathing, a sure sign the diaphragm is desperately holding on. It is the most useful technique when strengthening yourself in any way, including in all the lifts in the gym. When squeezing the glutes, make sure you do not slide the hips forwards. Instead focus on bringing the cheeks together.



Roadworks in April

Temporary lights along Pines Hill

The strangle-hold that roadworks have held over Stansted for the last year appears to be easing. But look out for extended works on Pines Hill and Forest Hall Road this April

Pines Hill and the junction of orest Hall Road (where it meets the B1383) will both see traffic lists in operation to allow the Electricity Network Company Ltd to carry out utility assist work this month. The lights at Pines Hill will last from 1-25 April and will be in use at Forest Hall Road from 14-30 April. Meanwhile, drainage improvements by Essex County Council will see Church Road closed from 31 March until 11 April. Allotments Walpole Meadows

On March 1st, the Parish Council welcomed 14 tenants on to the village's fi st new allotment site since 60 plots opened at Elms Farm 2019.

Bloor Homes promised to deliver allotments as part of its development at Walpole Meadows (WM). This has taken over 6 years. Why so long, you may ask?

Ever since the last brick was laid at Walpole Meadows, SMPC has been in negoti tions with Bloor o ensure land meant for community is fit or purpose. The land set aside for the allotments has been plagued by poor drainage, weeds, and the soil being peppered with stones.

"We have had to work with the Section 106 Office t Uttle ford District Council to persuade the developer to get these problems sorted out," says Jo Kavanagh, Chair of the Council's Open Spaces committee. "Taking on responsibility earlier would have meant the Parish Council paying to put this right."

The allotments are finally in a bitter shape. Prior to the plots' recent hand-over, Bloor rotavated the land and added more topsoil. In the weeks leading up to the opening of the WM plots, councillors were also busy: tenancy agreements needed to be drafted, suitable chains and padlocks sourced, and the plots themselves marked out.

"It has taken a lot of effort, but it has been worth it. We know how much demand there is for allotment plots," says Cllr Kavanagh. "We would like to thank the new tenants for their patience while aiting o get on to their allotments."

Increasing the supply of allotments in Stansted is dependent on land being reserved for this purpose as part of any new housing development. Currently, the two planning proposals for homes near High Lane come without space for allotments. The best hope for people interested in getting a plot is o register their interest with SMPC. Each year tenancy contracts are renewed and roughly six allotments at Elms Farm become free. It will be 12 months before it will become clear if tenancies are available Walpole Meadows. 



Whither Uttlesford!

t now seems likely that Uttle ford District Council (UDC) will be scrapped within the next three years.

Uttle ford will be merged together with other district councils and the corresponding parts of Essex County Council into a much larger authority. The Government announced its plans just before Christmas and demanded responses from county and district councils by early January.

At the time of writing in early M ch, little d tail has been shared with most councillors in Uttle ford. The Leader of Uttle ford District Council, Cllr Petrina Lees of Elsenham, has been attending Essex-wide meetings about the plans, but has so far refused to share minutes of the meetings with all members of UDC, so keeping many of us in a drip-feed world of semi-ignorance.

From what I have gleaned from the press, it seems that His Majesty's Government does not like the present system of two-tier lo al government comprising both county councils and district councils. Instead, it wants to see unitary (one tier only) authorities verywhere. These do already exist in parts of England. Parish Councils, including our own Stansted Mountfi chet Parish Council, are unlikely to be much affected.

I foresee problems over the next three years. There will almost certainly be widespread staff redundancies.

We may see Uttle ford joined together with Harlow, Epping Forest and other district councils, to create a new council area of some 500,000 residents that deals with all district and county services such as adult social care, refuse disposal, housing and education. Appa ently, the Government considers populations of a ound 500,000 as more suitable for local authorities of the futu e. Uttle ford DC's population cur ently is just short of 100,000.

I foresee problems over the next three years. There will almost certainly be widespread staff edundancies. County councillors, who should be up for election in M y this year, will have their terms of office xtended automati ally without elections y 2 or 3 years. District councillors are likely to have their 4-year term extended by a year, but without the election normally due in M y 2027.

I also foresee the job of a councillor becoming much more onerous. There will be far fewer councillors, and their wards will become much larger. I hope a councillor's job does not become more like that of a Member of Parliament; full-time and salaried. The risk is that councillors will become out-of-touch with what is going on behind the scenes in the council offices — where that may be.



David Morson was our speaker for our March meeting and he gave a talk entitled *A Prelude to Dad's Army*. He told us about Henham's evacuation plan in WWI. David took us through England's history of invasion, either attempted or successful.

With the outbreak of the war in 1914 the home front was startled by initial Zeppelin raids, particularly in Essex. There was a *Defence of the Realm* act published in 1914. Subsequently an evacuation plan advising what to do in case of German invasion was ordered. If the people of Henham had been told to evacuate, they were to take only money, biscuits and cocoa, with at least three days' supply. Farmers were to destroy livestock and crops, and no alcohol was to be left behind. Signs such as that in the wall at Orford House shown below guided civilians westwards.



These and many similar arrows were painted to direct noncombatants across country, avoiding main roads, to facilitate the movement of troops in the event of a successful landing by the Germans on the East Coast 1914-1918.

The evacuation route from Henham was Orford House, Manuden, Stocking Pelham, Buntingford, Stotfold and onwards towards Oxford. There did not seem to be any plans as to what do with the millions of civilians when they arrived. By 1916 the order was cancelled as the threat of invasion receded.

Whilst the opening slide of Dad's Army characters was still in our minds, the seriousness at that time cannot be underplayed. Our thanks to David for a thoroughly entertaining evening. Our next meeting is on **Thursday 3rd April** at 7.30pm in Touchpoint when Lynda Dale will be talking about *St Mary's Churchyard Project*.

Join Sustainable Stansted for No Mow May

It is time to think about *No Mow May* once again. Instead of mowing your lawn, let the grass and flowers grow and see the benefits for wildlife. Garden meadows do not have to look untidy; mowing just a path or seating area will keep it looking intentional. UK gardens, covering an area larger than our national nature reserves combined, have the potential to make a significant contribution to supporting biodiversity.

Wildflower meadows provide an incredible 50 plants per square metre. However, since the 1930s, over 97% of these meadows have vanished, leaving gardens as a vital alternative source of nectar for pollinators like bees and butterflies. Plants like plantain, dandelion and clover provide food, and longer grasses offer shelter and foraging grounds.

Over the past three years of trying *No Mow May*, we have definitely seen an increase in insects, butterflies and flowers. One example is ragwort which is critical to cinnabar moths who lay their eggs on the plant.

The moth's numbers have declined by 83% in the last 35 years so it is great to see their stripy caterpillars in our home meadows.



Tips for Nature-Friendly Gardens:

- Plant bee-friendly plants like lavender, sunflowers, and heathers
- Create hedgehog highways gaps in fences to allow the animals to enter
- Leave dead leaves and wood to decompose naturally to create food for fungi, small mammals and insects.

IN THE GARDEN

Fascinating Fuchsias

April is the time to start preparing fuchsias for their fast-growing, long-flowering summer season. Fuchsias are highly versatile: easy to grow and propagate, they flourish in containers and tight spaces, most prefer some shade and there are hundreds of varieties in single or double flowered combinations of pink, red, violet and white.



The first recorded fuchsia was named in honour of a 16th century herbalist and professor of medicine, Dr Leonard Fuchs. Most fuchsias originate from coastal South America. Garden hybrids bred from fuchsias native to tropical and subtropical areas require frost protection in our British winters, so it may be preferable to grow these in containers to overwinter under cover. Hybrids bred from fuchsias that originate from the colder areas of South America are frost hardy; these can be left in place to overwinter, so are ideal for either ground or container planting. Do keep the plant labels to remind you which fuchsias will need protection.

Although there are fewer hardy varieties, many more are available than previously due to increasing demand. Fuchsias may be bushy, trailing, upright or trained. The *F magellanica* and *F coccinea* hybrids are best for very cold winters; these have a slender, upright habit with delicate lady's earrings flowers and can make attractive hedging.

Fuchsias are best planted once the soil has warmed in spring. Wait until April to prune hardy fuchsias down to 8-10". Tender varieties can be planted outside and pruned after the last frosts. All need ample moisture, nutrients and good drainage. Either deadhead the flowers and seed pods throughout the summer or leave the seed pods to develop into edible berries. Caterpillars of the stunning, pink-banded elephant hawk moth may eat the leaves; if this becomes problematic, consider growing a sacrificial fuchsia to move them onto.

AUBREY BUXTON NATURE RESERVE

As I was working in the reserve in early March I came across a frog that was making its way from the wood to the pond. The frogs and toads are on the move, coming from their winter resting places under logs and deep in the leaf litter towards the ponds where they will breed and start the next generation. The arrival of frogspawn is one of spring's vital signs, recorded every year in a large citizen science project run by The Woodland Trust.



They also record the dates of flowering blackthorn and singing song thrush. They use the data to understand how wildlife is coping with shifting seasons, warmer temperatures and unpredictable weather patterns. Spring starts in the south west of Britain and works its way up the country arriving in Scotland several weeks later, but it is trending earlier. Last year the first frogspawn was recorded on the Isles of Scilly on 21st December followed by recordings in Cornwall in early January!

Now is an excellent time to get outside and do some bird watching. The birds are very active establishing territories and finding nest sites. Before the trees are in full leaf you have the best chance of good views and hopefully you can observe the birds while singing, which really helps to build your knowledge of bird song.
