

Together with a lazy stroll around the gardens, a picnic, a cuppa and a piece of cake, as well as the opportunity to buy vegetables for supper, we hope we have plenty on offer for relaxed days out in August. The gardens are parched, but there is still lots to see and enjoy. The lavender hedges love the heat and sunshine and have been welcoming lots of butterflies and an occasional hummingbird hawk moth. The roses are also very happy. The new rose bed in the walled kitchen garden is covered in flowers and the perfume wafts to visitors on a still day. The Italian garden borders have long included drought-tolerant shrubs and perennials, such as *Phlomis russeliana*, *Crambe cordifolia*, *Hylotelephium* and ornamental grasses, but we have added further dry area loving plants, including white *Gaura lindheimera* (Whirling Butterflies), Cool Cream *Salvia greigii* and orange/yellow *Helenium Sahin's* Early Flowerer.

Our volunteers have been watering vulnerable plants and trees as often as they can. The vegetables are thriving, so we have a steady stream of beans, beetroot, carrots, chard, courgettes and spinach to sell to visitors. THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

Before the dissolution of the monasteries, instigated in 1536 by King Henry VIII, the Hundred Parishes area had its fair share of religious houses: monasteries, convents, abbeys and priories. The remains of some can still be seen today.

Tilty Abbey is one example. It was founded for Cistercian monks in 1153 and prospered mainly due to the wool trade before being dissolved. In 1220 a chapel was built outside the abbey gates for use by visitors. The chapel survives and today functions as Tilty's parish church; see photograph below. Little remains of the other abbey buildings, but the site can be visited; interpretation boards inform the visitor and give an artist's impression of what the site would have



Little Dunmow Priory was founded in 1104 and was home to Augustinian monks until the dissolution. Most of the priory church was demolished, but the southern aisle survived. It is now used as the parish church. Several of our larger hospitality venues were developed on sites of former religious houses: Hanbury Manor in Thundridge was once Poles Convent, Down Hall in Hatfield Heath evolved from a 14th-century monastery, while Leez Priory in Felsted became the home of Richard Rich while he played his leading role dissolving the monasteries.

In Saffron Walden, **Audley End House** was built on the site of Walden Abbey, founded in the 12th century and whose lands were granted in 1538 to Sir Thomas Audley, Henry VIII's Lord Chancellor. The present house was built some 60 years later by his grandson Thomas Howard. While we tend to think of religious houses as a bygone era, Pleshey has one that is relatively new and active: its **House of Retreat** was founded as a convent in the early 1900s and became the first Diocesan Retreat House in England in 1927.

They lived a very luxurious lifestyle in a beautiful house in Paris until the outbreak of WWII and the occupation of Paris by the Nazis, when their lives changed forever. The moving talk was illustrated with coloured reproductions of the portraits and a nine-page handout was given to each of our members.

The judging of our monthly competition, the theme of which was something French, our usual well-stocked raffle table and refreshments brought another interesting afternoon to a close. Lynda Dale will be the speaker at our next meeting on **Wednesday 20th August** at 2.00pm in Ugley Village Hall. BRAIN TRAINING

Mental flexibility. What makes us human Part Three.

An important part of executive function is cognitive or mental flexibility: the ability not to get stuck in our ways of thinking and doing. It is a uniquely human capability. As with so much else, this gets harder with age and with high levels of stress. There are many ways of challenging mental flexibility. A very simple way is to take a different route than your normal one and be spontaneous about it. Try a different food or wear a new combination of clothes. Get creative. As it happens, this part of the brain is strongly linked to being creative. Other tasks to try: get down on and up from the floor in five different ways, including using a chair or wall, as well as limb flailing along with making general ooofff noises. Then there is touching the tip of your nose: stick your arms out, pick a finger and touch it to the tip of your nose. Do that again with the other hand but choose a different route to your nose. How many ways can you take to get to your nose and with which finger? Another simple idea: randomly write 20 numbers or letters on a piece of A4 paper, then join them up in order as fast as possible.



Then there is visual flexibility. The picture is called *My wife* and my mother-in-law by Artist William Ely Hill, 1915. It is a bi-stable image, meaning if we look at it one way we see the beautiful wife; look at it the other way we see the mother-in-law and the artist's opinion of her. This is all about being spontaneous, flexible and creative; definitely something your dog cannot do.

POTHOLES, PITFALLS AND CLAIMS Part 2

Making a claim

Search online for *Making a claim from Essex Highways*. This takes you to a page which explains that you will need to provide evidence which proves that Essex Highways was negligent **at the time of the incident**. Read the requirements carefully. This is where **photographic evidence** is of the utmost importance.

Make an insurance claim online

Click on this, and it will take you to a Register or Login page and a form. Describe the state of the hole; for example: jagged or sharp edges, near the kerb or grass verge, loose chippings or worn away layer or in the middle of the road, on a corner, on a narrowed part of the road, damage on the other side of the road preventing you from avoiding the pothole. If there has been a cone in it before, if it has been repaired before to your knowledge, was it full of water, had shingle in it, a drain cover and any other details relevant to your particular issue.

Describe the situation just before

Was there another car coming around the corner, preventing you from avoiding the pothole? What was the weather like, what was your speed?

Describe the damage to the vehicle

Be factual not dramatic and include photos. Only then will the claim be considered. However, this does not mean that your claim will be successful and on the website they warn that less than 10% of claims are successful. Maybe this is to stop people from applying but those are the figures they give.

I hope you never need this advice. Drive carefully.

RESEARCHING MY ANCESTORS IN STANSTED

I picked up a copy of June's issue of The Link and was most impressed by the contents, and especially the photo of Greens Department Store. I recently discovered that I am related to the Days who, for more than 200 years, ran a grocery and draper's business at what later became Greens Department Store and is now the site of The Greens Building. Having learned that the family were for five generations staunch Quakers, I contacted the Stansted Quakers and received a very warm invitation to visit.

I duly travelled from Dorset to visit the Quaker Meeting House in June and learned much about not only my ancestors but also about the modern Quaker philosophy. There are a number of Quaker gravestones in the quiet garden behind the Meeting House, including a stone commemorating no less than 12 of my Day forebears, *just two Days short of a fortnight* as one of my hosts neatly put it.

I was equally warmly received at St Mary's Church by Lynda, a member of the Churches Conservation Trust (CCT). Samuel Tayspill Day had to put his Quaker beliefs to one side before he married Anne Felsted in 1804 and they are both buried in St Mary's Churchyard, as are a number of their children. I understand that the CCT has done an amazing job during the last five years, recording the gravestone inscriptions and saving the graveyard from being completely overwhelmed by nature.



Throughout my visit, I was impressed by the kindness and friendliness that I received from everybody, and I am proud and delighted that Stansted Mountfichet plays such an important part in my family history.

You may recall from the July Link that Lynda Dale mentioned Nigel, his wife Moira and Jumble the dog visiting the family plot of Nigel's great, great grandfather.

A 300 YEAR CONNECTION

Quakers have had an active presence in Stansted since the late 1600s. Early Quakers bought our site on Chapel Hill in 1703, initially as a burial ground; the existing farm building became a meeting house. One Stansted Quaker at that time was John Day. He opened a grocery, drapers, chandler and general dealer business on the Cambridge Road which grew over many years as it passed down through the family, eventually becoming Greens Stores. Generations of the Day family worshipped at Stansted Meeting House, and were buried here. Our burial ground has a very large stone fixed to the boundary wall that records twelve members of the Day family through the 1700s.




Imagine our amazement when we received an email from Nigel Day, saying that he was a descendant and asking if he could visit the Meeting House. We arranged 5th June, when four members of Stansted Quakers welcomed Nigel and his wife Moe, who had found out about the historic Stansted Quaker connection from Nigel's third cousin in Holland, who had been going through a lot of inherited family archives. The cousin had found John Day's marriage certificate and a complex family circle. She tracked down the Days to tell them. We welcomed Nigel and Moe and they looked at the headstone, walked in the burial ground and took photographs. We had tea and cake and talked about the Quaker way and how very little had changed in our foundations of faith over the past three hundred years. Afterwards Nigel and Moe wrote with thanks, saying, Despite the wet weather, we were already buoyed by the fact that we had successfully located The Greens Building, so now know that many generations of Days spent their working lives within a hundred metres of the Quaker Meeting House.



We have two large elm trees that stand out majestically whatever the season. Mature elms are now seldom found because of the infamous Dutch Elm Disease. So how do we come to have these two healthy specimens in the reserve?



These trees are known as *Pitney Bowes Elms*, but more properly they are *Sapporo Autumn Gold*, a hybrid between Japanese and Siberian elms. The US firm Pitney Bowes spearheaded a campaign which focused on planting disease resistant elm trees throughout Europe in the early 1980s as part of its *Elms Across Europe* initiative. The patent issued for this hybrid has expired, and

there are now no propagation restrictions, so we will see if we can propagate our trees from cuttings.

Last month we welcomed members of the Essex Field Club to carry out some moth trapping in the reserve. This involves using mercury vapour lamps to attract in the moths which are then released unharmed after identification. On a warm night with good conditions we recorded over 100 species of moth. The most abundant species was the *Bird Cherry Ermine* of which some 500 arrived to the lamps. It is amazing to discover the volume and variety of life that exists in the reserve and which will normally go unobserved.

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

This summer we have experienced an unprecedented number of heatwaves causing a dilemma for weather forecasters. Do they tailor their remarks to gratify sun worshippers or to sympathise with farmers? During the winter we crave the warmth of summer, but when it is with us we are not so sure. That is especially so if drought is making a desert of our vegetable gardens. We are never satisfied with our present situation. The grass is always greener on the other side. How many times have you been to a restaurant and looked at somebody else's meal and wished you had ordered the same? Could our dissatisfaction be solved by everybody having the same food? Probably not. We all have different preferences for food and different perceptions of what is ideal weather.

The Bible includes the story of a blind man called Bartimaeus. Bartimaeus was not too concerned about the weather or what food was available. Above anything else, he wanted to be able to see, so when Jesus arrived in town, Bartimaeus seized the opportunity to call out for healing. Jesus was moved by the blind man's faith and restored Bartimaeus' sight.

Sometimes we can be so absorbed by the weather and what to eat that we miss opportunities to deal with more important things in our lives. Perhaps we are spiritually blind and need our eyes opening to see the needs of others as well as our own. I find that prayer changes things. Why not give it a try?

BEES AND BUGS

As I write this is early July; even with a bit of rain over the weekend, it has still been very dry. For pollinating insects to thrive, flowers need to produce nectar to attract them; to



do that, plants need water. Many plants have not even been flowering, and they have been struggling just to keep fruit on trees and bushes. That said, my hives have been very busy, and there still seem to be quite a few hoverflies and butterflies around. What I have noticed is that wasps, being meat-eaters, have been attacking, and unfortunately, they

have overwhelmed one of my hives. Now, when I say wasps are meat-eaters, it is a bit complicated; they are unable to eat solid meat because the narrow connection between their abdomen and thorax (called the petiole) is too small, so they catch insects instead and bring them back to the nest to feed to the larvae. In return, the larvae excrete a sugary liquid that the adult wasps can drink. The larvae are basically little nectar tubes!

This time of year, if you are having a BBQ and there are wasps around, just place a small piece of raw meat a short distance away; they often go for that instead of bothering you. The real trouble starts around October and November, when the young wasps emerge as queens and head off to hibernate. At that point, the worker wasps begin to starve, get very grumpy, and are more likely to bother your drinks or sting. I just thought you might find that interesting!

n June our local MP and Leader of HM Opposition, the Rt Honou able Kemi Badenoch MP dropped by the village windmill. Mrs Badenoch was shown around the mill by members of the Stansted Millers, the voluntary group that oversees the up-keep of the grade-II* listed structure. In February repairs to the windmill's pointing and brick ork were completed. The Parish Council — a co-trustee — made £30,000 of the mill's capital funds available to keep the project on track when costs escalated. In the coming years

Stansted's' iconic windmill will need its timbe s and sails replacing at a combined estim ted repair bill of £155,000. One of the Millers' fundraising efforts to cover these costs is this month's Windmill Fête. By attending this event you will helping the Windmill stay upright for future generations o enjoy. Tackling shoplifting at the Co-op

SMPC seeks meeting with egional Co-op management

The national shoplifting epidemic has sadly eached Stansted Mountfi chet in recent months. One particular hotspot has been the Co-op store on Lower Street. Perpetrators have been increasingly brazen, even going so far as to jump over tills o ransack shelves of cigarettes and tobacco. This is not just unsettling or store staff but or customers, too. While the police are investi ating incide ts, they are being frustrated by a shortage of store CCTV cameras. The Parish Council is in communication with the regional head office of the Co-op o see if they will employ security staff o support the village store.

Search for fresh biodiversity sites

Sustainable Stansted to help identify new wildflower seeding areas More wildfl wer areas may help grant application

ast year SMPC kicked off its biodi ersity project at two places in Stansted. A patch was sown with 52 types of wildfl wer seeds at the knight sign of the B1383 roundabout. While over at Pennington Lane, three types of low growth turf were laid. Twelve months on, and with both areas in rude health, the Parish Council is working with Sustainable Stansted to identi y new biodiversity areas. The local environmental group, set up with SMPC funding support, are in the middle of conducting a villa e-wide biodiversity audit, of which the current SMPC sites are a part. It's hoped new areas for wildfl wer seeding can be identified y the autumn. Committing o more biodiversity could also boost chances for accessing grants set aside for environmental projects.





Stansted Airport Expansion

SMPC pursues community gains from airport's growth plans
Annual capacity may hit 50million passengers by 2040

n recent months Parish Councillors have been considering their response to Planning Application U T/25/1542/FUL.

Lodged by London Stansted Airport with the planning department of Uttle ford District Council at the start of June, this application outlines h w the airport would like to expand its capacity over the coming decades.

At a Full Council meeting in June, SMPC Chair Mau een Caton tasked the council's Airport Working Group to assess how the application ould impact the village and what options ould be pursued to overcome associated negati e impacts. The group worked with ClIr Jo Kavanagh to formulate the Parish Council's response before the window for comments for the application closed on July 21

What is the airport proposing?

The District Council has been asked to allow the airport to build two taxiways to its existing ru way and improve access from the airport to junction 8 of th M11. The goal is to

expand existing apacity. Last year nearly 30million fl w from the airport. By 2040 it targets 274,000 flig ts and 50 million passengers a year. The airport says up to 4,500 new jobs could come on the back of expansion.

Council Concerns

Growth of this scale is likely to come with downsides for our community, namely:

- A larger airport workforce may lead to increased competition for local housing
- Fly parking could become an even bigger problem than it is now, if transport infrastructure fails to keep up
- Extra flights may well spell more noise and air pollution
- Yet more pressure to develop on green belt and brownfield land in our area

SMPC as a statutory consultee

The Parish Council has no authority itself to approve a planning application. But as a lo al authority representing th community, the Parish Council is able to call on developers to offer community gains to compensate for harms that may come with the approval of a planning application. Communit gains that we would like Stansted Airport to consider as part of their plans have been highlighted in the box below.

Opportunities for Community Gains

Improved public transport for airport users: Currently 50% of people travel to and from the airport by public transport. The airport should be asked to raise this percentage to 70% in the future. That will need more trains and buses to transport people back and forth from the airport.

Better bus and cycle lane links to the village from the airport: A free shuttle bus for airport workers and college students is needed. As is a safe cycle route from the village, one that goes beyond the business park, but also to Stansted Airport College.

Fly Parking: Pricing at the airport's car parks should be tailored to maximise use, not revenue. Along with working with SMPC to discourage the practice, the airport should re-consider their decision to no longer pay for signage in the village to discourage fl -parking.

Airport Noise: Thousands of extra flig ts are likely to make air and noise pollution orse. The airport should consider working with carriers to miti ate these problems by minimising the use of reverse thrust and static run-ups when planes take off f om the airport.

Stansted Airport Working Group

- » Meets twice a year
- » Made up of 3 Parish Councillors and 4 co-opted members — a pilot, a barrister (and former pilot), as well as a resident each from Burton and Foresthall Park
- » Conducts research and write reports on airport matters
- » Seeks to maintain a balanced position of the airport's benefits and costs to the village



The experience and knowledge on the working group is proving invaluable. The pilots' input, for example, has helped us highlight realistic ays to reduce flig t noise around the airport.

Local Government Reorganisation

It became known just before Easter that His Majesty's Government is mindful to introduce single tier lo al government in Essex. That would mean that the two-tier district and county council system would disappear to be replaced with groupings of present districts to form larger, single-tier authorities t t carry out today's responsibilities performed by both district and county councils. Parish councils are said to be unaffected by this proposed reorganisation.

If this does proceed, the argument today is whether the single-tier uni ary authority that includes Uttle ford should include two other districts, namely Epping Forest and Harlow, which are adjacent districts, or whether more districts should be added to create fewer but even larger and arguably even more remote new councils across Essex. It is said this would save money. However, Harlow is a more costly authority, so our council tax may increase as a consequence. This is happening at a time when ce tral government is coming under criticism in t least one national n wspaper by its leader writer for mishandling its own finances and seeking the w ong solutions th t allegedly would repeat mistakes made in the 1930s that led to economic stagnation. atch this space and do let me know what you think.

Meanwhile, UDC ran a public consultation on the p obable reorganisation th t ended in July! At the time of writi , I have received no information on public eedback.

Examination in Public of UDC's Local Plan Report

The Examination in Public or the Local Plan began on 10 June, with the final public hearing being held on 19 June More than 100 participa ts including developers, site promoters, legal representati es, the county council, parish councils and local residents' groups took part in the hearings. These were held in the council chamber and also streamed online.

UDC is currently awaiting the inspec ors' post-hearings letter, which will indicate whether he believes the current draft plan is apable of being adopted.

UDC Freed from Planning Designation Status

Uttle ford District Council has been given back its full planning powers after the government took the Council out of "designated" status over the unsati factory way it had been handling major planning applications. U til recently, applicants were able to bypass UDC, by sending applications di ectly to central government planning inspectors for determination; but no lon er!

Community Achievement Awards

The Uttle ford Community Achievement Award scheme recognises and celebrates those people who have made a real difference to others in the local community. To be nominated, a person must have been mainly working as a volunteer (though can have been paid for some of the work), worked primarily in Uttle ford and have more than fi e years' voluntary work experience. UDC is asking for nominations f om town and parish councils, the Council for Voluntary Services, Uttle ford Volunteer Centre and secondary schools. Any individuals or representati es of a group who want to nominate someone for an award will need to ask one of the eligible organisations about making the nomin tion on their behalf. The deadline for nominations is Thu sday, August 7. So be quick.

A new councillor on board

In June members of the Full Council voted to co-opt Sophie Gee to serve alongside them as a Parish Councillor. Cllr Gee is a chartered surveyor and a long-tim resident of Stansted Mountfi chet. She looks forward to working on behalf of a community she has lived among for 50 years. Her co-option ends a succes ful recruitment campaign that now sees a full compliment of 15 Councillors in SMPC's chamber, after three spots opened up earlier in the year.

Roadworks round-up

There are three sets of major roadworks affecting Stansted in August. Church Road will be closed by Essex Highways for 5 days from August 11-15 to improve drainage, who will also be closing Chapel Hill from August 26-27. The third closure will see High Lane shut after Brewery Lane to allow Affinity ater to carry out essential maintenance from August 21-26. Please note SMPC is not responsible for the timing or app oval of roadworks. Essex County Council and National Hig ways take such decisions.

IN THE GARDEN

More drama from your cannas

With their tall tropical foliage topped with colourful flame-like flowers, canna lilies bring vibrant, exotic drama to borders and containers from midsummer until the first frosts. Tender perennials native to the American tropics, they need plenty of sun, nutrients and water. Although the *gigantea* and *musifolia* varieties reach an impressive 10-12 feet, most are 4-6 feet in bloom and dwarf varieties are half this height.



Canna are easy and economical to grow. After the last frosts, plant the rhizomes out in free-draining nutrient-rich soil or container mix; add a generous handful of slowrelease fertilizer, and dig in some grit if the soil is heavy. Each rhizome needs a large space in the border, or a heavy 15 inch container. Water in, ensuring that the rhizome buds (or eyes) are an inch or so below the surface. Keep wellwatered; use a plant saucer under cannas in pots and

watch for slugs and snails damaging new growth. Inadequate nutrient levels will limit re-blooming; apply a liquid feed regularly to avoid this problem. Your canna will best continue to rebloom if you resist the temptation to tidy it up; avoid deadheading or pruning the flowering stalks.

Cannas die back with the first frosts; remove the foliage, lift those in borders into pots of spent compost, and store the pots in an unheated frost-free shed or greenhouse. Importantly, canna rhizomes still need to be kept moist throughout the winter. I grow mine in large black pots and overwinter them under the greenhouse staging. By May, the rhizomes are pushing up new foliage; they usually need dividing with a pruning saw before repotting in fresh, nutrient rich medium and hardening them off. A few rhizomes can easily multiply over the years to provide enough garden drama to keep and to gift.


