IN MEMORIAM

EIRWEN ELIZABETH BUTCHER

28th February 1933 - 18th October 2025



The winter of 1932-33 in West Wales was decidedly snowy. As a heavily pregnant young woman walked into the family home where she would give birth to her first daughter, a lump of falling snow just missed her head. This inspired Gwladwys and David to name their baby Eirwen, which means *snow white*. Eirwen and her younger sister Gwyneth grew up in the pretty coastal town of Aberystwyth. When she first went to school, she spoke only Welsh, not a word of English. She learned to swim in the sea, had Saturday evening piano lessons and went on bike rides with friends. In her later teenage years, she would go to the dances at the King's Hall. Mum's extended family were coal miners, teachers, farmers and grocers. Her grandfather was a tea traveller who went on to own a Temperance Hotel in the town. Mum's father, meanwhile, did a stint as the Aberystwyth lighthouse keeper.

Upon leaving school, Mum worked in local businesses. In the Government treasury office, she would work with newfangled machines: tabulators and comptometers. However, as charming as Aberystwyth was, Eirwen felt somewhat isolated and she jumped at a friend's offer of a job in London. It was there in the big city at a Young Conservatives social event that she met a handsome young man, Tony Butcher. In 1966, Eirwen and Tony settled down in Stansted in the newly built Wetherfield. With the arrival of two sons, Jon and Matthew, Eirwen became a dedicated homemaker. Mum was a good cook, a great listener and she had a nurturing approach to everything.

She actively participated in the local Stansted community, volunteering with the WI, Huw Johnson Club, School PTA and Seniors' Lunches. Eirwen valued simple pleasures: the daily newspaper crossword and a day out at the seaside. In the evening, there was always a murder mystery such as *Vera*, *Morse* or *Lewis*. Mum was perhaps most content in her garden. The biggest treat of all was the visit to the garden centre at the beginning of each growing season to stock up on new plants.

Dad sadly died in 2018, and over the last few years, Mum was cared for at home by health visitors led by Matt's partner, Boo,

to whom we shall be forever grateful. She valued her relationship with Boo enormously. Mum was humble but quietly determined. She always wanted to know the latest news of each of her five grandchildren. They all felt her love and knew that she would always be rooting for them.

BIRCHANGER AND STANSTED GREEN BELT PRESERVATION GROUP

Every householder urged to take action!

City and Country has submitted a planning application for 480 homes on protected Green Belt land near Stansted and Birchanger, prompting strong objections from local campaigners. This speculative proposal seeks to exploit planning loopholes, ahead of the expected approval of Uttlesford District Council's emerging Local Plan, due in the next few months. The photo below is an Al generated image of what the development might look like and how it could affect surrounding areas.



Key concerns

- Loss of Green Belt: The entire site lies within the Metropolitan Green Belt, rated highly for preventing urban sprawl and preserving rural character. Despite developer claims, the land has not been reclassified as grey belt
- Urban sprawl risk: The scale and density could merge Stansted with Bishop's Stortford, eroding village identities and accelerating unchecked expansion
- Traffic and pollution: Thousands of extra daily car journeys would worsen congestion on Stansted Road and add significant CO₂ emissions annually
- Safety issues: Plans include closing Tot Lane and narrowing Birchanger Lane, already unsuitable for heavy traffic
- Infrastructure strain: Roads, schools, GP surgeries and utilities are overstretched, with no credible upgrades proposed. Combined with other largescale developments, this could lead to severe congestion and service breakdown
- Environmental damage: Wildlife habitats, hedgerows and open countryside would be permanently lost. Landscaping cannot replace natural green space

- Limited local benefit: No clear evidence of meaningful amenities for residents. Section 106 funds will be absorbed into Essex County Council's structure, echoing past failures
- Prolonged disruption: Construction is expected to last eight years, bringing noise, dust, traffic and health risks.

Call to action

Residents are urged to submit objections to Uttlesford District Council, attend public meetings, and stay informed via our website and the Birchanger and Stansted Green Belt Preservation Facebook page. Every objection counts.

Helping endangered swifts

Swifts are fast-flying, spectacular birds and we have teamed up with the North East Herts Swift Group, to install swift nest boxes in the village. These amazing birds rarely land and fly continuously through day and night. They eat, sleep and mate on the wing and in its lifetime, an individual swift can fly as many as four million miles. They travel to the UK each year to breed. Sadly, here swift numbers have declined by about half in 20 years and they are now red listed for conservation concern.



They nest in small gaps in roofs and eaves, but modern building methods are gradually excluding swifts from these spaces. Fortunately, they take to hollow bricks called swift bricks; they also use swift nest boxes which are being installed to reverse the decline. It can take a while to attract the swifts but once they do, they usually come back to the same nest site year after year. Why not

consider putting a swift box on your home? This could make a great Christmas present. We also help house martins by installing artificial versions of the mud cups that they build as a nest. House martins are much messier than swifts and so site selection should be carefully considered. For anyone interested the cost is £45.00 or £40.00 for a house martin cup. This covers the cost of the box and installation, usually under eaves or at the top of a gable. We will visit beforehand to choose the site and ensure that it is suitable. 

Her grandfather was the real vicar of Grantchester; apparently he was just as handsome as the fictional vicars in the TV series! During WWII her grandmother was involved in the Women's Voluntary Services (WVS) supporting soldiers who were billeted nearby and who appreciated the comfort offered by the canteen. Zoe's grandmother stayed in touch with many of the soldiers after the war and kept all their letters, which prompted Zoe to research the WVS. She told us that Stella, Lady Reading, founded the WVS in 1938 to assist with civil defence tasks ahead of WWII. Volunteers helped in many roles including the evacuation of children, issuing gas masks, opening nurseries when women were called to work and distributing clothing. Zoe has written a book of fiction based on the WVS during the war. Afterwards it became the Women's Royal Voluntary Service and is now the Royal Voluntary Service. This group is found mostly in hospitals; their aim is to grow the nations volunteer community and run services to support health and well-being.





Manor Road Flats update

Meetings lead to key commitments from Uttlesford officials

t has been a year since the Parish Council urged Uttlesford District Council to act on the poor condition of the Manor Road flats in Stansted. At that time, we invited Cllr Arthur Coote, portfolio holder for housing, to discuss residents' concerns about damp, faulty electrics, leaking roofs, unsafe balconies and other repair.

In October, Parish Council Chair Maureen Caton and two District Councillors met with Cllr Coote and Brian Burton, Uttle ford's interim director of property. This positive tone at this meeting led to a follow-up one being arranged by the Parish Council between Mr Burton, three district council offic s and residents. At that meetin, residents heard directly why repairs had been delayed and learned about plans for improvements.

Two commitments

The District Council made two key commitments to residents:

- To conduct a survey identi ying outstanding repair work
- To assign a council officer to inspect completed work Another positive outcome was an invitation for a Manor Road resident to be co-opted onto the District Council's housing board, which one resident is currently considering. The Parish Council will continue working with residents and UDC housing officers to improve living conditions at the Uttle ford-managed Manor Road properties

Resting places for weary legs

Ever thought of donating a bench to the village?



With the installation of a new bench at Burnell's Way in November —kindly funded by a resident in memory of a loved one—there are now three more resting places around the village to sit and watch the world go by! At the Chapel Hill bus stop we have added a "seating perch" and beneath the oak tree near the Recreation Ground play area we have undertaken substantial repairs to the bench. The la er two were funded by the Stansted Mountfi chet Parish Council, using £1,500 from its reserve funds. There may be a fourth on its way should Affinity Water follow through on their commitment to re-instate the bench opposite the Dog & Duck, removed over 12 months ago as part of their maintenance work in the area.

The Parish Council often receives offers from residents wishing to donate a bench, plaque, or tree to commemorate someone special. The Council oversees the supply, installation and maintenance of all such gifts to ensure quality and consistency across village sites. Donors cover the installation cost and a small maintenance contribution. In the case of benches, once installed, SMPC ensures the upkeep for ten years. Search for biodiversity site

Consultation follows switch to larger, but less re-wilding areas

he Parish Council in November undertook a two-week consultation with the community to get its views on a possible biodiversity site along the grass verge on Forest Hall Road near Bentley Drive.

businesses and organisations across the UK in declaring a Climate Change and Biodiversity Emergency. Since then, SMPC has been finding ways to support plant and animal habitats locally. So far, the Council has overseen the planting of over 100 trees and created wildfl wer areas to att act pollinators such as bees and bu erflies and to enhance green spaces for people to enjoy.

The importance of this work is clear. The UK has lost nearly 97 percent of its wildflower meadows since the 1930s, reducing habitats for insects, birds, and small mammals. Pollinators are vital for food production and protecting them helps maintain crop yields and a sustainable food supply.

The Parish Council has already trialled two smaller wildfl wer sites in the village. In 2024 wild grasses were sown at the verges where Rainsford Road meets Pennington Lane. These have produced a vibrant display of wildgrasses and nati e meadow flowers that att acted wildlife. Wildfl wers were also sown on land in front of the Knight sign at the B1383 roundabout. This site has struggled to establish and will return to regular grass cutting.

Based on these lessons, councillors are now focusing on larger sites, which can provide a greater ecological benefit and create true wildflower meadows. As part of this

review the Open Spaces commi ee decided to survey the community to find out its views on establishing a wildflower meadow on the verge fronting Forest Hall Park road, next to Bentley Drive.

Residents' feedback from the consultation results will inform the Committee's final decision, which will be published in the next edition of *The Link*. If this project goes ahead, grant funding will be sought from Uttlesford District and Essex County Councils.

Councillors go on patrol

Patrols provide a chance for residents to share intelligence

C tansted PCSO Alex Stewart recently joined Parish Councillors Jamie Gardner and Jo Kavanagh for a community patrol, starting at the Mountfi chet Exchange and conti uing through Foresthall Park. This patrol marked the beginning of a new

initi ti e where councillors and residents are invited to join PCSO Stewart on monthly patrols. These walks offer a valuable opportunity to raise local concerns directly with the police and highlight areas that may need a ention. The first patrol proved particularly insightful with residents voicing concerns about suspected drug activity in the area. PCSO Stewart, whose role is partly funded by Stansted Mountfi chet Parish Council, was able to offer guidance on how to report such issues, whilst residents shared informatio that will be used by the police to build a clearer picture of what's happening locally. If you'd like to join a future patrol, the next opportunity to do so is on Thursday, 18 December. Meet at noon outside the Mountfitchet Exchange (72 Chapel Hill). Please note, police community engagement events are dependent on operational requirements on the day. As such, they can be subject to last-minute cancella on.



Between 250-300 people a ended the village's Remembrance Service on Sunday, 9 November. Nearly 30 wreaths were laid at the war memorial in the Memorial Gardens, with representati es from our many and varied village organisations, and officials from the County and District Councils paying their respects. A short closure of Chapel Hill to traffic meant that the observance of a minute's silence passed without signifi ant disruption. The Parish Council would like to thank all those who turned out and helped to make the occasion special — including the troops from Carver Barracks who led the parade down Chapel Hill, and Rev. Helen Flack for taking the service.



Shortlist for treehouse replacement

Parish Councillors and the SMPC's Projects Officer have been meeting play equipment providers to choose a replacement for the treehouse which was dismantled at the Recreation Ground. At the top of the shortlist are two designs from play company Broxap, both aimed at children aged 11 to 14. These feature a mix of climbing and fitness elements suited to older children and would fit well on the site, though safety matting ould be required. Also being considered is individual outdoor gym equipment, for those aged over 14. Before making a final decision, Councillors would like to hear from residents. The Parish Council will also be seeking input from the Youth Club, Year 6 pupils, and Forest Hall School students. The outcome of the consultation will appear in the February edition of *The Link*.

End of an era

Stansted Helpline to close after 40 years of service

n October, Stansted Helpline announced it will close at the end of December. The local charity has helped countless residents get to hospital appointments, collect prescriptions, and do their shopping, since opening in 1984. The service, run by 20-30 dedicated volunteers, is ending due to a shortage of helpers.

Parish Council Chair Maureen Caton said: "This is such sad news a er such a long history of excellent help and support. Unfortunately, the decline in volunteer availability is an increasing challenge for many voluntary organisations" There is some comfort for those who depend on the service. Uttle ford Community Travel (UCT), which provides similar transport support, has offered to assist both Stansted Helpline's users and volunteers.

UCT General Manager Mick Bott said: "We are always here if someone needs ongoing support. They can call us and receive the same friendly response they're used to. And if any volunteers would like to join us, please get in touch for a chat about our work."

Based in Dunmow, UCT operates 28 cars and 6 minibuses across 54 parishes in Uttlesford, including Stansted Mountfi chet. This year SMPC awarded the charity a £2,500 grant to help it get local residents to hospitals, doctors' surgeries, and social events.

December always whizzes away from us at the gardens; we hope to be tree planting and clearing out beds ready for spring planting, before we hang up our tools for the Christmas season. After this year's drought, we hope that we will get lots of rain this month. It has been a fantastic mast autumn, with so many acorns and other tree litter to crunch through as you walk around. The fungi have enjoyed the conditions too. They are often still bursting through in December, bringing a different colour palette. Last year it was the bright yellow Witch's Butter (*Tremella mesenterica*) which made us stop and stare. It is parasitic, feeding on the wood-rotting fungi of the *Peniophora* genus. Legends say it grows on gates and doors of homes, when a witch has cast a spell on the family!



So how has the year been at the gardens? In a word, it has been rewarding. We have had lovely feedback from visitors, including some on a Shakespeare tour from the Netherlands, as well as school groups. We were particularly delighted that a local school walked their children to the gardens to learn about local world war history, and we have had record numbers of children enjoying the gardens and activities on our Open Sundays. Next year the gardens will be open as usual for snowdrops in February; from April till October we will be open on Thursdays and one Sunday a month. 

For our November meeting we welcomed Dr Chris Connell, who gave a presentation on The Good Schools Guide in 19th Century Bishop's Stortford. Formal education there had actually started far earlier when the Grammar School was founded in around 1573, but the National Schools and British Schools of the early 19th century provided near-universal education provision. Religious influences came from the Congregational and nonconformist churches and the Church of England. A National School opened in 1818 in South Street for boys only, although in 1872 a school for all children opened on what is now the Apton Road car park, with fundraising from Rev'ds Rhodes and Menet. A school was founded at Northgate End in 1839 providing access to education for children of the labouring classes. New Town Infants School at Holy Trinity in South Street opened in 1852. The original Bishop's Stortford High School was opened in 1850 on the corner of Church Street and High Street; the name was changed to the Grammar School in 1895, and it was finally closed in 1930. The Bishop's Stortford High School in London Road was built In 1950.

The Proprietary School was founded in 1850 for the sons of the upper and middle classes of this town. It was renamed Bishop's Stortford College in 1901. The British School in Stansted opened in 1862 at the bottom of Chapel Hill, supported by the nonconformist and Congregational churches. The Education Act of 1870 provided education for all children, but league tables for attendance existed even then! Our thanks to Dr Connell for such an interesting talk, which struck a particular chord with many members who had attended schools in Bishop's Stortford. Our next meeting on Thursday 4th December at 7.30pm in TouchPoint is our Christmas Quiz Mulled Wine and Mince Pies hosted by Roger Barrett. There is no January meeting.

IN THE GARDEN

A heatwave might lead to fantasies of picking a ripe lemon from your own beautiful, fragrant tree on a summer evening but they are far from effortless to grow! Citrus trees are native to tropical and subtropical regions and are frost-sensitive in colder climates. They are fussy and greedy; incorrect soil, humidity, watering or feeding can create a sickly tree with dying leaves and no fruit. The container compost must be acidic, gritty and free draining so that the roots can absorb nutrients essential for healthy leaf, bud and fruit development. Alkaline soil, multipurpose compost and tap water are unsuitable for citrus. Always use rainwater or, in drought, tap water after 2-3 days in a bucket. For most citruses the ideal UK winter temperature range is 7-15°C, making a centrally heated environment too warm and dry. A cool conservatory, polytunnel or unheated greenhouse is ideal for overwintering. Being evergreen, citruses still need sunlight and a little moisture over winter; gradually increase watering, ventilation and humidity as the days lengthen in springtime.



After the last frosts, move your tree outside to a sheltered sunny spot; remove winter damage and thin out. Water thoroughly when the top 5cm of compost is dry, adding a weekly citrus feed. Standing the pot on a shallow saucer with gravel can aid drainage; misting the foliage in heatwaves helps with bud and fruit setting. Citrus trees produce new leaves, buds, flowers and fruit simultaneously; the fruits slowly swell over winter and ripen the following year, just in time for the first Pimm's. It is a good idea to buy varieties grafted onto dwarfing rootstock to prevent them from outgrowing their winter environment or become too difficult to move. The easiest citruses to grow in the UK are Eureka (sharper) and Meyer (sweeter) lemons, Bearss and Finger limes, Yuzu and Calamondin oranges.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

The Society is not a church or religious organisation; however we encourage visits to churches because they are often the oldest and most interesting building in any community. Most of our churches are open regularly and welcome visitors. Our website has many short articles, including some about various features of churches including bells, clocks, memorials, poppyheads, spires, towers and windows. We recently added an article about church fonts, some of which are described in the next few paragraphs. Fonts hold holy water which is used to baptize people, an initiation into the Christian faith. They are often situated near the church entrance. Our local churches have a great variety of fonts, usually made of stone. For example ...



St George's church Anstey, pictured above, has an 11th century font which is rare in that it is decorated with mermen holding their tails. Thorley church has a 12th century font. It was removed from the church and for many years was used as a drinking trough on a nearby farm before being reintroduced into the church in 1855. Its ornate cover was designed by George Gilbert Scott, a prolific architect known mainly for his work designing and renovating churches and cathedrals. Chickney church has a carved stone font from the 14th century. The bowl is lavishly decorated including shields bearing the coats of arms of local Braybrook and Fitzwalter families. Debden's 18th century font is made of Coade stone and is richly decorated with roses and heraldry.

Over the last couple of years, I have been giving a talk entitled *A peek inside some Hundred Parishes churches* to local groups. The talk is a PowerPoint presentation with many photos. If your group might be interested, please contact me.
