For our January meeting, three of our long-standing members gave a short talk on one of their favourite topics. Our Chairman Dave Perry thanked the large audience for attending and introduced our first speaker Tony Crosby, who spoke about the Jaywick Miniature Railway. Jaywick is a small town on the Essex Coast fairly close to Clacton, and today has the reputation for being rather run down and unwelcoming. However in the mid-1930s, a family called Stedman built a development of holiday lodges; by all accounts these were pretty basic in every respect. The miniature railway was constructed as a means for prospective purchasers to get to and from this development. Eventually the railway fell into disuse and was broken up and sold to various museums and collectors.

Our second speaker was Roger Barrett who discussed the men and women in the famous photographs at the opening of the Blythwood Model Dairy, attended by King Edward VII in the early 1900s. Stansted Mountfitchet and the surrounding area was the home of many rich and famous people and the photographs showed these men, their wives and various offspring invited to this event; amongst them were Lord Warwick and Walter Gilbey of the famous distilling company. Our third and final speaker was Tony Wellings who brought with him a fascinating and varied collection of toys and games of bygone eras. These items were not only for playing with but served a useful purpose in education and in some cases helped with hand-eye co-ordination in various sporting activities. The meeting finished with the usual question and answer section. Our next meeting is on Thursday 6th February at 7.30pm in Touchpoint and our speaker will be Ken McDonald.

For our meeting on **Tuesday 11**th **February** at 7.30pm in Bishop's Park Community Centre, Bishop's Stortford CM23 4DA, we welcome Gavin Vicary who is the founder of the *North-East Herts Swift Group*. For many the return of the swift is the sign that summer is here and a moment for celebration. However, all is not well with our swifts and since 1995 we have lost over half of the UK breeding population, leading them to be on the red list of threatened species. Gavin will introduce the vital work that he and others have been doing to address the dramatic decline and go through how we can all help.



Our midweek birding walk is early in the month on Wednesday 5th February and takes a route of five miles starting from Stocking Pelham. Using quiet lanes and footpaths it includes Deer's Green, Ford End and Washall Green. On Saturday 22nd February we plan to visit Woodwalton Fen near Huntingdon, which is part of the Great Fen project. The fen is one of only four remaining fragments of the ancient wild fens and is internationally important for wildlife, providing a refuge for thousands of species of fen animals and plants. There are three great trails to help visitors discover the best of this historic nature reserve. At the time of writing the arrangements for both the walk and the visit have yet to be finalised. During the winter, we close the forest and car parks on Mondays and Tuesdays because the ground conditions are very poor during the wetter months and can be badly impacted by large footfall. The change in season is also causing erosion of the historic woodland rides, so if you come across a diversion, please follow it and discover a new route. Please be mindful that car parking spaces are limited at this time of year as they are restricted to the hard-standing car parks at the entrance and lake area; we have closed our grass park because the ground conditions have deteriorated due to changes in the weather. CARIBBEAN ADVENTURE



BRAIN TRAINING

How to survive the winter Blues

Rhythm! Draw the curtains on the dreary winter sky, turn on your favourite music and go for it. If you are filled with the horror of Dad Dancing, then instead just sit and tap away with your hands, fingers, feet, toes, nose or the cat's paw. Let us explore the neurology behind this apparent daftness. The magic happens when we hit the beat with instant positive feelings. We danced or tapped, co-ordinating our movements to land on that beat; that positive reinforcement is why moving rhythmically improves co-ordination. For Parkinsons' patients, moving to a rhythm is great therapy. To make it more powerful, add a very heavy bass.



When we move rhythmically, nicely on time, we get bursts of the positive neurotransmitters dopamine, serotonin and endorphins. Dopamine is motivating, serotonin regulates our moods and endorphins give an exercise high. The rhythm we are moving to stimulates the brain areas related to speech and language, so is an important part of cognitive maintenance and rehabilitation, as well as helping us learn stuff. Instead of music, you can work with a metronome. You can buy one cheaply or download one. If you have an iphone or ipad, there is the paid-for app: Prometronome. This can be set to random. For example, tap a hand and a foot at, say, 100 beats per minute, in 2/4 time. After a little while, the beat stops but you carry on tapping away and, after a bit, the beat returns. Did you hit it? Having mastered this, to give an even bigger burst of the good stuff, when the beat stops, switch to lifting your toes whilst your hand taps so they are moving in opposite directions. When the beat resumes, return to the same direction. Brain fuddling.

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

A friend told me this morning of a gift she had been blessed with earlier in the week on a particularly cold January morning. Her car had been parked outside her house all night; the windows were covered in ice. She needed to go out so she sat in the driver's seat and turned on the heater. Being used to sitting still (as in Quaker meetings!) she patiently closed her eyes for a while. On opening them a few minutes later her breath was taken away; she was completely struck in wonder and amazement by the un-melted frost pattern on the windscreen in front of her, making her aware of the *positive* aspects of the frost, as a thing of beauty rather than a problem to be dealt with.

With the bountifulness of Christmas present-giving behind us for another year, perhaps we can strive to be present—minded in this New Year.

At the beginning of the year, the mill was still clad in scaffolding; work stopped for the festive season but hopefully will have restarted by the time you read this. So far 600 bricks have been cut out and replaced. It remains only now to finish the actual re-pointing. How long that will take is dependent on the weather, but the project is well on the way to completion. After that we will have to carry out a major spring clean to clear the dust and dirt that has accumulated throughout the windmill before it will be fit for visitors again. We always have a spring clean but this year it is far worse than usual as the mortar dust has spread everywhere! That will be a big job and we would welcome help from anyone who can spare some time. We will also need to do some work on the displays in the mill.



The repointing work has been a once in a generation project which necessitated a big fundraising effort. We need to build up our reserves again so we can fund the replacement of the sails which is required roughly every 10 years. That is likely to cost around £65,000. We will post further news on the wind-mill Facebook page, on our website and local social media platforms. We will re-open again for our 2025 season at Easter. If you would like to support the windmill you could become a Miller. Membership is only £10 a year per family and includes free entry to the Windmill on Open Days. For new members there is a complimentary guide book and a window sticker like the one in the picture above.

Road closures to continue

Grove Hill Closure — February 10 until Ma ch 7

No let up in long road closures as a second permit granted for Cadent to return to Lower Street in March



Cadent's work to replace gas pipes in Stansted will see the closure of Grove Hill for four weeks, starting f om the second Monday in February. The road will be shut from the junction whe e the B1051 meets with High Lane and Lower Street. The utility p ovider says the closure is needed to keep their workforce safe while they fit n w plastic pipes and remove old copper ones. Setting up emporary traffic li ts instead of a closure is impracti al due to the narrowness of the road along Grove Hill.

The Grove Hill roadworks will overlap until ebruary 28 with Essex County Council's running of traffic li ts along Church Road. These are currently in operation o allow the local authority to carry out improvements to the pavements and road surface in the area. The misery to villagers will not end there. Cadent are shutting wer Street for a second time from March 3-28, along a section owards Brewery Lane. This follows the street's fi st month-long shut down of the year in January.

The Parish Council as a lower tier lo al authority has no input into the planning of roadworks. This is a responsibility reserved for Essex Highways. We would ask residents concerned about the inevitable disruption aused by the closure of Grove Hill to contact Essex Highways. You can do so by visiting the a ency's website where you can also find details of all roadworks affecting S ansted.

ESSEX HIGHWAYS have revamped the way you can report road defects online at the start of the year. They say their 'Tell Us' webpage has been reconfigu ed to make it "easier than ever to report highways defects in Essex." There are option for different types of emergencies and if issues have worsened over time. But wh t Essex Highways giveth, they also taketh away — you will no longer be able to raise issues using third party sites such as Fix My Street. The agency says this is because issues logged on such sites are often duplicates of reports already submitted via Tell Us. Or such issues are unrelated to roads maintained by Essex Highways. Windmill Repairs 2024/5

Funds from SMPC keep Stansted Miller's re-pointing project heading in the right direction

ast November the Parish Council agreed to provide thousands of pounds of extra funding to shore up the brickwork of the village windmill.

The Parish Council is one of two trustees of the windmill and pays money into its Windmill Capital account each year to cover the cost of repairs. The Parish Council works closely with the Stansted Millers, and without the voluntary group's expertise and dedi ation it ould be unable to look after the Grade-11* listed structure.



The cold, wet winter weather has delayed repairs

Keeping repairs on track and to budget is never plain sailing when you are dealing

with a mill dating o 1787. And the current project has proved to be no exception.

Since October the windmill has been wrapped in blue tarpaulin and a forest of scaffolding while a builder that specialises in historic maintenance has got stuck into replacing over 300 damaged bricks. The current work was expected to be the fi st phase in the piecemeal restoration of the mill s pointing. The Mille s hoped by tackling the repairs in stages project costs —conservati ely estim ted in 2022 to total over £55,000 (excluding VAT!)— would be more manageable.

Alas, early into the current repairs the Millers were informed that a there were a further 600 damaged bricks in need of attention. With no other sources of funding immediately available, the Parish Council agreed to make £30,000 in the Windmill Capital account available to keep the project on track. The removal of the original pointing has been ompleted, but winter weather will likely mean scaffolding will not come down around the Mill before the spring.

Meeting the mill's bills

The Stansted Millers regularly apply for grants to pay for repairs from the likes of the Stansted Airport Community Fund, the Essex Heritage Trust, the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings and the Lottery Heritage Trust. As a trustee, the Parish Council works closely with the Millers on such applications. We also contribute financially to cover project costs. In so doing this partnership works to keep Stansted's 18th-century mill open to the public for years to come. For an idea of the project funding needed to keep the windmill upright (and the sails turning!), below are listed maintenance projects undertaken and heading the mill's way.

Recent repairs 2021

Overhaul of mill's striking gear and repair of 20 sail shutters (£10k)

2022

Stock clamps replaced (£14.5k) New fire alarm (£4.5k)

2024

14 sail shutters replaced (£2.3k) Repointing of brickwork (£55k)

Future fixes

Replacement timbers (£85m) Replacement sails (£70m)





t's been three months since the November fi eworks display — time enough or organisers to take stock of what they are proudly calling, "the community event of the year."

David Arora, one of the two principal organisers of the event, said tic et receipts showed over 3,200 attended the fi eworks. Mr Arora's company Tenacity Business Solutions, along with ellow organiser Maureen Caton, also underwrote the fi eworks.

Mrs Caton added: "The fi eworks took over 12 months of planning and cost over £10,000 to put on. As the event was so well attended, we have been able to cover the £10,000 that was needed to hold an event of this size and deliver on our goal of using some money from the event to support village organisations and individuals"

The fi eworks committee, which is made up of local business leaders, the Stansted Business Forum and chair of the parish council, have agreed to donations from the fi eworks to go to:

- £1,000 to Stansted Youth Club
- to help fund a trip to Rungis
- £1,000 to Forest Hall School
 - which kindly agreed to host the event

A further £1,000 has been reserved by the committee to support a family in the village caring for someone undergoing hospital treatment for a serious illness. By making a direct contribution, rather than a donation, it is hoped all the mon y raised will be spent in the community, and not lost in charity administration osts or diverted to family outside Stansted.

As discussions begin for fi eworks in 2025, organisers would like to thank sponsors of last year's show, many of which were local businesses. Among them are AVS garage, the funeral directors Daniel Robinson & Sons, the estate agent Murdochs, management consultancy Tenacity Business Solutions, housing developer City and Country, environmental services provider SES, property developer Bloor Homes, the broadband provider Gigaclear, as well as the Stansted Business Forum and Stansted Mountfitchet Parish Council.

The beginning of the end!

The government has announced the biggest reorganisation of lo al government in half a century. In Uttle ford we have two ties of local government affected by the reforms: the county council and the district council. Stansted is represented by a county councillor and four district councillors, with the Stansted South ward also including Birchanger. We have been asked to present plans to move to a single 'unitary' authority that will be responsible for all local government services in the area. These unitary councils would have a population approximately of 500,000 people. This would be considerably bigger than Uttle ford's population of 91,000.

The government has several rationales or scrapping district councils. One is efficiency vings. Another is removing fragmentation in se vice delivery. The white paper also touts reducing workforce pressures by removing competitio for staff, and a reduction in the number of politicians. Th local government landscape in England is undoubtedly complicated and confusing, making it difficult or local residents to know who is responsible for which service.

Uttl sford has had somewhat of a chequered reputation i recent years. Being a relati ely small council it has issues of capacity and att acting skilled taff. Reform could be the right way to go. However, the government is proposing a one-size-fits-all solution. The se of the unitaries is an issue. There are currently over 70 unitary councils in England. We have two in Essex, namely Southend and Thurrock. Most unitary councils have considerably less than 500,000 residents.

It's vital that local government stays local. Councils need to be embedded in their communities, not emote and unaccountable. That means any new councils must not be too big or we risk alienating ou selves from the residents we serve. If we are to have unitaries, I would like to see an area committee established for Uttle ford. This would help ensure that some decision making is taken closer to the residents they serve.

What next?

The Council was due to meet on the 8 January to decide its reaction of the government's proposals. The County Council has requested the government to delay the elections scheduled for May 2025.

'StanHanger': wrong development, wrong place

ouse builder City and Country, who are based in Stansted, are proposing a new development on land between Stansted Mountfi chet and Birchanger (see image). It would deliver up to 1,050 homes. The site lies between Stansted Mountfi chet and Birchanger and consists of around 172 acres of land.

My fi st thoughts are that this is an opportunistic p oposal. The site is not included in Uttle ford's Local Plan, submitted to the government in December. The site falls in green belt land. The developers are arguing that it is in fact greybelt low quality green belt.



City and Country's proposal to build on land between Stansted and Birchanger hasn't been submitted as a planning application yet

I have always been opposed to coalescence—ie the merger—between Birchanger, Stansted & Bishop's Stortford. Clearly as Uttle ford is under special measures regarding its planning function, City and Cou try have the option of submitting a planning appl ation di ect to the Planning Inspectorate. I will do all I can to ensure that this proposal is not supported.

The developers recently met representati es of Birchanger and Stansted Parish Councils. They argued that the site is sustainable and meets housing needs. Councillors, however, were resolute in opposition of the proposal.

Where are we now with this? Clearly the developers have a lot of work to do in commissioning highway reports, etc. before they can submit a planning application. Their plans seem to be based on the premise that Uttle ford's Local Plan will fail at inspection, and they can step into the breach.

Enjoying a winter stroll along any of the described walks within the Hundred Parishes provides an opportunity to view the landscape features visible from various vantage points, such as the view across the fields to Manuden shown in the picture below.

Much of this countryside has been farmed by many successive generations as these custodians of the land have raised livestock and garnered variable harvests of grain. The spring of 2024 was rather wet, and this resulted in poor establishment of autumn-sown cereals. Combined with the inclement conditions during harvesting, this resulted in disappointingly low yields. However, it seems that with dry weather in the autumn, the sown wheat, barley and oats have germinated well, with most fields now covered with fresh green shoots. Many farmers have decided to cut back on growing oil seed rape, and they may choose to plant alternative niche crops such as sunflowers or borage once the weather is warmer.



These farmed landscapes have traditionally supported assorted wildlife including skylarks, rooks, ladybirds, bumble bees, butterflies, badgers and foxes. In addition, well-maintained soils contain not just beneficial fungi, but a variety of earthworms and beetles which in turn provide food for many other creatures. Sadly, other less-welcome creatures such as slugs and root-eating beetle or fly larvae are also present. Seeing a sizeable flock of birds following a plough demonstrates this plethora of food!

Recent concerns about the loss of insect life, especially pollinators or those that eat aphids, is encouraging farmers to find ways of enhancing habitats for insects by leaving marginal strips round fields for wildflowers, planting new hedges or creating beetle banks within their fields. These features may be visible from footpaths during the winter months so make a note of where they are and plan return visits during the summer to observe them full of flowers and other wild-life

Surveys of the invertebrate life in our ponds have shown the lower two ponds are significantly below the quality of the top pond. So in December we carried out work to help improve the lower pond. There were three main tasks:

- Removal of fallen branches and dead wood which was slowly decaying in the water. This involved donning waders and fishing out branches or for the largest branches dragging them out with a winch, as shown in the photograph
- 2) Pollarding some trees to improve the amount of sunlight reaching the pond surface to help improve the environment for aquatic plants
- Opening up the route for the prevailing winds to put a breeze across the pond surface to increase the amount of oxygen that is dissolved into the water.



We left plenty of bankside vegetation overhanging the water to provide cover and nesting locations for our mallards and moorhens. We also left in place the fallen tree that spans the pond and provides a convenient resting spot for the mallards and their ducklings in the spring.

This winter we have also done some more coppicing of hazel stands, opening up the floor of the wood to another cycle of regeneration and continuing a hazel wood management cycle that has been practised for hundreds of years. We will soon be looking for the first signs of spring.


