Open Evening

It was a pleasure to welcome both old and new faces to our annual Open Evening on 20th May. In addition to a discussion about our own activities and plans, we were also enthralled and educated by the experiences of our guest speaker, Roy Owens (www.royowensconsultancy.com). He recounted the personal journey that led him from the depths of alcohol addiction to recovery and total sobriety; he now uses his hypnotherapy training to support others with similar problems. It was a thought-provoking reminder that the very first step in any kind of addiction or mental illness is admitting to yourself that there is a problem; after this, you need to also take the steps to seek appropriate help.

24/7 Samaritans Awareness Day

This takes place on 24th July every year and is dedicated to raising awareness about the vital support provided by the Samaritans. It spotlights mental health, suicide prevention and the life-saving role the Samaritans play in offering a listening ear round the clock, reminding everyone that no-one has to face tough times alone and encouraging people to talk openly about their feelings. The date serves as a reminder that the Samaritans' services are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week; hence the significance of the date.

Mental health challenges can arise at any time, and support should always be accessible. There should be no stigma whatsoever about seeking help, open conversations should be encouraged and can even save lives. The day recognises the hard work and dedication of Samaritans' volunteers, who are always there to listen, support and help people find hope in difficult times. IN MEMORIAM

ARTHUR STANLEY LAW 7th October 1931-28th April 2025



Dad was born at the Game Keepers House, Durrell's Wood Burton End, and grew up in Bentfield End with his parents and younger sister. He attended the village school in Chapel Hill, and on occasions he liked to play hooky from school and hang out with friends at the Football Club. In those days, children went home for dinner and he told us stories of how he and his mates counted the church bell clock chime so they would know when to go home. On one occasion they miscounted and turned up home early and his mum asked him why he was home. Dad replied "for lunch mum" and it all went wrong from there!

Dad loved to tell us stories of his childhood, particularly being a young lad during the war, with an American base in the village. He often started these tales with an impersonation of his Uncle Albert: *During the War* ... He would tell us stories about the evacuees who stayed with his family. His sister was charged with taking them to the store to pick up rations, and on one occasion Dad and his friends were hiding in the trees on Bentfield Green with pea shooters and took aim at his sister, only to miss and shoot a hole in the flour rations, leaving a trail of flour and trouble waiting when he got home.

Dad started his working life as a butcher with Mascall Butchers until he turned 18, when he was conscripted and posted to Egypt as part of the Royal Army Medical Corps. After completing his National Service, Dad returned to his butcher's job until he joined Post Office Telephones where he worked until retirement.

Dad met my Mum Janet on a blind date set up by his good friends Peter and Nancy Camp. Mum was a student nurse at the Herts and Essex Hospital, working alongside Nancy. They married in October 1957, initially living in Bishop's Stortford before moving to Stansted. Dad would tell us that it was the best decision of his life and how, with Mum, his faith and interest in the church developed, and he gave up his Teddy Boy days. Three children came along, David, Edward (Ed), and then me. They had a long and happy marriage until Mum's passing in 1996, aged just 60.

He and Mum became members of the Stansted Methodist Church with their young family, where they made lifelong friends. Dad was the treasurer and Mum played the piano. They met Marion and Mike Dyer through the church, both of whom have continued to support Dad in his later years. Dad became a local preacher, and after he retired from this he would still go along to Langley Baptist church, where Mum came from, to participate in Mike's services.

Mum and Dad always enjoyed country music and enriched their lives with many new country music friends. Later in life they joined the Stansted Football Club and became greatly involved with the running of the social side of the Club; they really enjoyed hosting a monthly country music night there. Saturday would be a busy day preparing a buffet which included stuffing many, many vol-au-vents. Dad also enjoyed watching football at the Club and became a member of the darts team with Ed.

Dad was never idle or bored; he enjoyed many hobbies including painting, particularly water colours, gardening, and playing golf, although not that well. He was also not too clever driving the buggy and nearly drove into the lake, or maybe he was following his ball! He enjoyed travelling and both Dad and Mum took holidays every year to new countries and places. Dad loved dogs and could always be called on for dog sitting and walking. His favourite dog was Tia, and he would walk miles with her at his side.

Dad found new interests to fill his time in retirement without Mum by his side. He joined the Re-enactment League where he met Gary and Grant, who became firm friends. They used to have a great time acting out battles and discussing the American Civil War. They camped, put on shows for schools and fêtes and had a yearly trip to Brean Sands for the weekend event. He spent time with all three of us, taking us on holidays or days out. He enjoyed the company of Dave and Karen, Ed and Lesley and myself and Michelle. He also enjoyed his relationships with his grand-daughter Jenna and great grandchildren Alfie, Phoebe, and Maisie whom he saw grow from babies. In his final years he came to live with us in Australia for nearly a year and enjoyed many adventures and the great outdoors, even camping at 92 years young!

He returned to the UK last year, and moved into Highfield Nursing Home in Saffron Walden, where he became reunited with a friend from the Football Club, John Robinson, who died in January. They kept each other going and would have a constant banter which reminded Ed of Statler and Waldorf from the Muppets Show. He was extremely well cared for by all the staff at Highfield and enjoyed many activities and outings. He favoured trips out to the Temeraire for his favourite curry and a pint of Doom Bar.

Dad maintained his faith when he could no longer get back to church in Stansted, keeping in touch with Mike, Marion and Alan with all the news. They brought him recordings of the church services and copies of *The Link*, and Rev'd Stuart Veitch took him communion. He had been Chairman of the Stansted Association of Christian Churches when *The Link* started in 1980, and he always loved reading it.

Dad was a loving and supportive father and grandad to all of us and we will miss him dearly.

In July the volunteers have to work hard to keep the gardens watered, dead-headed and trimmed. After an extremely dry spring, followed by some rain in early June, we hope that our well and water butts will be able to keep the flowers coming if it is dry. Another big July job is picking vegetables to sell to visitors and fruit to make into jam. The roses and lavender hedges are at their best in July, with lovely fragrance enjoyed by visitors and hopefully attracting butterflies. We have recently added to our collection of roses, so the borders in Peto's Italian Garden are punctuated by their bright colours and the walled kitchen garden beds are filled with softer hues, together with grasses. This year we have started the huge job of replacing the lavender hedge beside the Italian Garden. We like to use cuttings so that we know the plants are all of the same variety. We took many cuttings in June, so we can finish that job next year and start replacing some of the hedges in the kitchen garden.



Our open day on **Sunday 20**th **July** 11.00am-5.00pm is the day when we remember the cost of war. Many men from the area lost their lives in WWI and many more from the Great Dunmow airbase, which was adjacent to the gardens in WWII. We have memorial trees in the glade and there are moving memorials in the church at Little Easton. On the open day there will be 1940s songs performed by the *Lancashire Belle* and a range of exhibits related to those eras, as

well as local craft and produce stalls. The gardens are also open every Thursday 11.00am-3.00pm during July, with lots of games for families and of course homemade cakes and hot and cold drinks. Booking in advance saves £1 per adult and children are free. See our website for details.

AUBREY BUXTON NATURE RESERVE

Spring was very dry and we did not get decent amounts of rain until late May. It was possible to see trees reacting to this and doing their best to conserve water. A horse chestnut tree outside the Reserve dropped nearly all its fruit (conkers) when they were hardly developed and not much bigger than peas. In the Reserve we are lucky to have lots of water and the soil is still moist so our trees are generally doing well. We have been given 50 young trees, whips 30cm tall, of various native species; we have given a temporary home to these in our enclosure before we plant them out in the autumn.



There have been lots of successful birds' nests in the reserve and in late spring the trees were alive with the sound of fledglings calling to their parents. The numerous blue tit families in particular are keeping up a constant chatter. I have previously mentioned that we often see a grey wagtail in the Reserve but we had no

evidence as to whether they bred there. Now we do, as this spring we were delighted to see a young grey wagtail being fed by its parent.

We are in the process of planning some improvements to the paths. Several of them become excessively muddy in the winter, which forces people to take a wider line across our meadow areas. This compacts the soil and prevents the more delicate wild flowers like orchids from growing there. As part of this work we will be closing the southernmost entrance to the Reserve. All the entrances from the footpath alongside the field and from the car park will remain open.

BRAIN TRAINING

A simple Way of improving Working Memory. What makes us Human, part two

Working memory is not only the ability to retain information for a short space of time, but also to manipulate that information. This ability only too often degrades with time. The old adage, use it or lose it, was never more apt in this case. A very simple way of battering your brain back to youth is this: take a quantity of small pieces of paper and write a number on each piece, perhaps numbers one-nine. Fold each piece up and put them all in a pot. Jumble them about and pick three pieces out. Unfold them, learn the numbers, lay the numbers down and walk about for 10-20 seconds, then see if you remembered those numbers correctly.

To strengthen true working memory, do the same, but recall the numbers in either ascending or descending order, rather than the order of appearance. This exercise could also be done with Scrabble pieces and alphabetical order. Repeat a few times; if or when this is easy, increase the number of samples you pick out of the pot to four, to five, to six and so on. For the best result, you need to find the level that you can just do, so making the odd mistake is exactly the level to work at. The brain craves success, and if the level is too hard it will just give up, but if it is too easy minimal progress can be made. We need to give the brain a bit of a workout to get the improvement.



STANSTED PEOPLE

CATHERINE AND ALAN DEAN



Both our featured people this month are from the North; Catherine is from West Yorkshire and Alan from Lancashire. They met at Salford University where Catherine was studying Modern Languages and Alan Engineering. They were married in 1971 and moved to Stansted. In 1976 they moved into their house in Recreation Ground where they still live. Catherine then taught languages in Harlow, while Alan worked for Post Office (PO) Telecommunications in London. In fact, he started working for them when only 15 years old, installing telephone cables amongst other tasks, and they sponsored him for most of his university studies.

In 1979 the couple moved to Indonesia, with their two toddlers Christopher and Alice; Alan was now working for the US owned Indonesian Satellite Corporation (Indosat). They found living in such a different culture most fascinating, but occasionally a bit challenging, with the high heat and humidity. The young family lived in a house in a lakeside community, all with swimming pools, which helped to combat the heat. One thing they found difficult to get used to was the expectation that they employ an 'ayah' (nanny) for the children; trying to persuade her not to iron shoelaces was one amusing incident! Indonesia is predominantly Moslem; the Deans were glad to find a church nearby. They moved to Jakarta for a while, until Indosat was nationalised in 1981. Since the Indonesian team had a great deal of technical expertise, there was no need for Alan to stay any longer, and the family returned to Stansted in 1981 and their third child, Amy, was born soon afterwards.

Alan worked for British Aerospace in Stevenage for two years, before returning to BT, the new name for PO Telecommunications. He remained with them for 22 years until his retirement. When Amy was three, Catherine returned to part-time teaching, mainly as a supply teacher including at her first school, Burnt Mill in Harlow. She retired from teaching when her older daughter Alice had a baby; she looked after her granddaughter so that Alice could work.

An important aspect of the Deans' life is local politics. Catherine was a member of Uttlesford District Council (UDC) for 12 years, where she first represented Elsenham, then Elsenham and Henham, together with David Morson. The change was due to district ward changes. She was mainly involved in planning, and one of her achievements was to persuade the County Council to install new street lights in Mill Road, Elsenham. She chaired UDC from 2008-2009. She also spent 24 years on the local Parish Council (PC) from 1992, and did a short stint as chair. During this time, she was nominated by the Parish Council to be their representative on The Link Committee; when she stood down from the PC, the Link Committee invited Catherine to become a director, and she is now a valuable part of the Link team.

Alan was part of the PC for three years in the 1980s; he was elected to UDC in 1987 and remains there to this day. In his 38 years as a member of UDC, Alan has served as leader of the Council and on a whole range of committees, both locally and on regional bodies. He describes it as a mixed bag, and now anticipates retirement in a couple of years when Uttlesford will probably be merged with neighbouring councils to form a new and larger authority – for better or for worse! Upon returning from Indonesia, he joined the then Social Democratic Party, which eventually became the LibDems.

Catherine has been involved with Christian Aid ever since returning to the UK. One important part of the work back then was to persuade supermarkets to sell Fairtrade goods; she was clearly highly successful at this, as all supermarkets sell them nowadays. She has supported various campaigns to MPs and has organised soup and bread fundraising lunches. Christian Aid no longer does house to house fundraising as people mostly give charitable donations online these days. She also helped to run Christmas Shoeboxes through the Churches Together in Stansted group. Alan is involved with Sustainable Stansted and loves gardening. Both are active members of Stansted Free Church.

Alan and Catherine are very well travelled; they have visited China, Peru, Russia and Scandinavia, for example. They are rail enthusiasts; their favourite train trip was through the Swiss Alps in the winter. They are lucky to have friends with a flat in Venice, so they have visited that incredible city 10 times. Their family keeps them very busy, with six grandchildren, ranging in age from 11 to 29.



Led by two of our Learning Support Assistants, Debbie Capp and Nicola Brown, they have worked tirelessly in their own time alongside family members, friends, parents, carers and staff to develop the site with paths, a grass area, shed, fencing and raised beds, including those of extra height to cater for our special educational needs (SEN) pupils with wheelchairs. POTHOLES, PITFALLS AND CLAIMS

Pothole Damage Claims, Proof and Pitfalls

Please be aware that I am writing this as a lay person and I have no legal standing. I am not responsible for any claims you make for damage to your vehicle from road defects such as potholes and drains. I believe that the following details are correct as I write in May 2025.

What is a Pothole?

It is a pot-shaped depression in a road surface which is deeper than 50mm and longer and wider than 100mm. Only if a pothole has been reported will you have the slightest chance of making a claim, on the basis that if they did not know about the pothole, they could not be liable.

If there is an incident, what information is required?

You need to report the position of the pothole. On the What3Words App find and send the words to yourself for later, or take a screen shot, or make note of your surroundings: gateway, house and road markings etc, anything which will confirm the spot for later use.

Measurements

You need to measure the depth, width and length; these measurements will be checked.

Photographs

When safe to do so, take a picture of the pothole or drain, as it gives the road conditions at that precise time. Avoid taking a photo in the dark if possible. You are only allowed five photos, so choose them carefully.

Receipt for Repairs

When a vehicle is repaired, ensure that the garage put on the receipt that it is compatible with pothole damage and a description of the repairs done.

Check if the pothole has been reported before by visiting www.essexhighways.org/track-it. Make a note of any enquiry number and notices as to when it was checked; it may say that an inspection is due soon or has been done, for instance and possibly re-checked or due for repair.

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

This year we commemorate the 80th Anniversary of the ending of WWII. Lower Street

Where the flower shop is now was Peggy's, a shop filled with goodies. There was also Mr Bunting selling fruit, vegetables and flowers. Next to him was Hicks' coal and seed merchants where my son worked on Saturday mornings, weighing up corn and feed for the week; he earned £1 an hour! Then there was Stringer's groceries and Peter Wright, gents' hairdresser. My boys loved going to him. Over the road where The Cork House now is was Mumford's wet fish shop, and Turner's grocery shop which is now a house. On the corner of High Lane was a café with a juke box which was well used. If I have missed some out perhaps someone can enlighten me. I miss those days as we had lovely shops then. In Station Road we had Mrs Torey, another grocery shop, Dick Johnson watch and clock repairs, and another small shop selling bread and food.

The Old Courthouse which has now been turned into flats was originally called the Central Hall. We had bingo there as well as jumble sales and whist drives. The hall was the centre of the village for functions; later it became Rocky's night club. Rochford's Nursery is now Forest Hall Park; it grew tomatoes and cucumbers in rows of greenhouses, and a little train came and collected them and took them to the packing shed. My husband's uncle worked there all his life starting at 14 until he retired at 65; my husband's family lived in the cottages opposite.

Eventually two of our English contingent powered through to the final, with their French teammates. Joe Allwright and his partner came in a close second, giving the Brits a dominant one-two finish on French turf.

As the sun began to set over Rungis, we were presented with trophies, toasted with French wine, and applauded by an incredibly welcoming crowd. The atmosphere was electric. The camaraderie? Unmatched. The sense of achievement? Off the charts! The tournament ran for a full seven hours, with six games played in total, but the adrenaline kept us going. What began as a modest getaway turned into one of the most memorable sporting adventures ever, and we brought the silverware home!

With a third co-option po entially in the off-ing, this would bring the number of Parish Councillors to 15 and mean SMPC would have a full chamber for the first time sinc elections in M y 2023.

Mr Gardner is a chartered surveyor and has been a Stansted resident since July 2023. As a Parish Councillor he wants to help enhance the quality of life for people living here. In doing so he will be drawing upon his role as a chair of trustees for the Shoreditch Trust as well as an advisor to landowners in London, helping them to manage their endowments to benefit lo al communities Mr Ackerman has held a variety of roles for Network Rail and is a long-tim Stansted resident. He is interested in community safety, sustainable development and improving our open spaces. A third applicant wishing to join the Parish Council was to be invited to the Full Council in June before a decision on their co-option as decided.

Planners' dreams

2025 shaping up to be a busy year for planning

A scheme to flood a field off Forest Hall Road with solar panels is just one project that is raising eyebrows in the Council Chamber

here was plenty of planning cud to chew at the fi st Full Council of the civic year in May. In her report to Councillors at the meetin , SMPC Chair Maureen Caton highlighted not one, but three projects in and around Stansted that pose signifi ant questions or the village. The fi st of these is Columbia Threadneedle's application to site solar panels on what is considered high quality agricultural land off orest Hall Road. The solar farm didn't feature as part of Threadneedle's original plan to redevelop Stansted North. Concerns have been raised that glare from so many panels could constitue a safety risk for fliggts and for M11 motorists. The siting of 41,000 panels is also li ely to do little or views of the surrounding countryside. City & Country's plan to build up to 1,050 homes on green belt land is also on the Parish Council radar. If this goes ahead it threatens to merge Stansted, Birchanger and Stortford into one. An application has et to be made with Uttle ford's planning department. SMPC is working with Birchanger Parish Council to get an update from Uttle ford

Uttlesford Community Travel



From a small office on a ading estate on the outskirts of Dunmow operates one of the longest-running charities in Uttl ford. Set up by World-War-II RAF pilot and career civil servant Sir George Moseley, Uttle ford Community Travel has for 28 years ferried thousands of elderly, disabled or isolated people across the district to hospital appointments, social events, hairdressers,

school and shopping trips, and pretty much verything else besides.

In so doing it is difficul to imagine a local nonprofit th t has had a bigger impact on community life in Uttle ford over the period. Last year alone, UCT took over 18,175 on groups trips while its book-a-ride service tallied up to 9,138 trips. The charity's drivers clocked up over 152,739 miles — the equivalent of six times around the earth, as the charity's business manager Mick Bott tates proudly. "We started out with just one bus," he adds. "Now we have six minibuses and 28 cars being driven by volunteers across 54 parishes."

UCT runs to a simple

model. You sign up to either an individual or group membership. That gets you access to transport that is more reliable than a bus, cheaper than a taxi, and better suited to your needs if you are elderly or disabled and struggle to get about.

Helping Mr Bott eep the show on the road is the charity's director, Ian Shaw. "With a bus costing £88,000, the fundraising is never ending," he says. "The recent rise in national insu ance contributions will ffect us, but we can't raise prices like a business. Our clients just can't afford it."

In February, Stansted Mountfi chet Parish Council approved a £2,500 grant for Uttle ford Community Travel. "They do brilliant work in keeping people independent, healthy and combating lonelin ss," says Maureen Caton, SMPC chair. "The grant is money well spent."

SMPC has been working with insurers to source a post and the necessary equipment. The height of the pole is proving a problem, as there are few suppliers currently who are licensed to fit a eplacement of the right height. While this remains the case, SMPC is unable to sati fy requests for footage other than from cameras in Crafton Green car park.

Requesting footage

Local councils are obligated to implement data protectio measures that align with the principles of the General Data Protection egulations (GDPR) and the D ta Protection Ac 2018. These legal requirements mean we are only able to share footage of reported accidents and incidents with the Police or insurance companies. Also, footage is stored on the CCTV system for 30 days only.

Roadworks in July

Roadworks heading the village's way this month include Lower Street/High Lane where the carriageway will be closed for three weeks from 7 July to August 1st, Stoney Common (closed by Network Rail) on 18 July from 10am-2pm. The work by Affini along Grove Hill is scheduled to end on July 3. Then there will be traffic li ts to allow Open Reach to work on the road from July 4-8. Please note SMPC is not responsible for the timing or approval of roadworks. Such decisions are made by Essex County Council and National Highways.



BEES AND BUGS

IN THE GARDEN

Herbs at Home

Every kitchen deserves homegrown herbs. Cultivated for thousands of years for many uses, such as medicinal and culinary, herbs are pollinator-friendly, and some can keep pests and diseases away from other plants. Herb gardens can range from formal Mediterranean spaces to a rockery, containers or windowsill pots. Sitting or walking near aromatic herbs calms the senses. Ideally, locate your herb garden somewhere with at least half a day of sun; herbs that share similar growing requirements can be planted together. Mediterranean herbs include oregano, thymes, sages, rosemary and lavenders. These enjoy full sun in gritty, free draining soil, the opposite of our heavy clay. Give them space when planting, otherwise they will compete for water and nutrients. Similarly, position the taller sage, rosemary and lavender behind lower-growing thymes, marjoram and oregano.



Leafier herbs need more moisture and shade. Mints and lemon balm are notoriously invasive; keep out of the ground and grow in separate containers. Umbellifers like angelica, chervil, cicely, dill, fennel, parsley and coriander can inhibit the growth of edible crops so are best kept away from vegetable beds. Some, especially fennel, can make attractive additions to ornamental beds. Grow umbellifers in rich, moist soil and part shade to prevent early bolting; running to seed turns the leaves bitter. Fresh basil is a versatile summer herb; it enjoys similar growing conditions to tomatoes, peppers and chillis, and its pungent aroma keeps them bug-free. The flowers of many herbs such as rosemary, calendula, borage and nasturtium are edible and can be added to salads or frozen in ice cubes to add to drinks.

Water your herbs throughout summer; this helps newly planted herbs to develop deeper roots for better drought tolerance. Picking regularly improves their shape and flavour. Online herb shops such as *Herbal Haven* in Rickling sell ready-to-plant herbs for home delivery.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

The topography, geology and fertile soils of the Hundred Parishes have combined to provide suitable conditions for farming. Currently, cereals cover about two-thirds of our arable fields with crops of winter or spring-sown barley, oats and wheat. Twenty percent of fields have been planted with vegetables or oil seed rape, which creates a lovely display as shown in the picture below; grasslands make up the remainder, providing forage for cattle, sheep or horses.



Inevitably the weather influences the success or otherwise of crops. This spring has been exceptionally warm, dry and sunny so there are concerns about a possible drought, reduced crop growth and lower yields. Some farmers started to irrigate vulnerable crops earlier than usual, and all are hoping for some more rainy days ahead, as plants need moisture to absorb the nutrients they require for growth. Healthy soils will retain more moisture; a number of farmers are planting cover crops beneath the main crop as this will help to reduce water run-off and leaching of nutrients. Leaving wildflower margins around fields encourages assorted predators that eat crop pests.

Many farmers diversify their activities to spread the risk: planting different crops, creating fishing lakes for anglers or converting barns for holiday lets or wedding venues. Some have been able to realise the potential of their south-facing fields, conveniently located over underlying chalk, to plant grape vines. Soils have been analysed, grapes carefully chosen, and now these winemakers are producing first-class sparkling English wines together with excellent red, white and rosé wines. Tours of some vineyards are an added attraction.

Walkers following routes from our website will appreciate the area's scenic beauty and rich agricultural heritage. Routes 127 and 161 pass vineyards and other unusual crops.


