

They recently invited several friends to join them in forming a flexible chamber cooperative which they named the *Vela Ensemble*. Their original Stansted debut had to be postponed, but we are now looking forward to hearing them; Siu and Alex will form a piano trio with American-born

cellist Bartholomew La Follette. Bartholomew has lived in England since the age of 13, studying first at the Yehudi Menuhin School and then the Guildhall School of Music and Drama. BRAIN TRAINING

Tight Shoulders and General Squeeze

Here is something simple to help tension in the head, neck and shoulders. I call it the general squeeze:

- 1. Lift your shoulders up high into your ears. If it does not make you dizzy, look up and give everything a good squeeze
- Now calmly let the shoulders sink back down and resume looking forwards
- 3. Really let those shoulders settle nice and broad around your armpits. Subtly tuck your chin in
- 4. Repeat.

This is usually extremely effective. It uses *Muscle Energy Technique*. When a muscle contracts firmly, and then relaxes, in the immediate aftermath, the muscle relaxes more than it was before the squeeze happened. This is particularly the case with all the muscles around the head, neck and shoulders. It is good to take advantage of the relaxation and stretch the muscle or, in this case, muscles. Simplest is to tip and turn the head to one side and/or the other. Try not to be too vigorous in stretching. Many muscles will reflexively tighten up if stretched too strongly to prevent themselves being torn off their ends. It is important to let the shoulders settle calmly. If the squeeze is suddenly released, so the shoulders plop back down, those pesky muscles will really tighten up to keep your arms in their sockets.

There are many muscles around the head, neck and shoulders; both front and the back they all party together, hence why squeezing and releasing the lot of them helps. Of course, only one or two may be playing up, but you would expire from boredom if I listed all of them and their actions!

The increased provision of comfortable seating was necessary for the first general meeting held at St Theresa's Parish Centre, when a record audience of 107 gathered to hear a personal account of one of the RAF's most daring World War II missions: the raid on Amiens Prison, often referred to as *Operation Jericho*. The following Saturday the first seminar of 2025 took place in the same venue.

Our next Saturday seminar on **8**th **March** is entitled *Rockets* and *Spaceflight*. The speaker, Professor Tony White, is an Emeritus Professor of Systems Engineering, Middlesex University and is a member of our u3a. The seminar will start with the history of rockets from their invention by the Chinese to the rocket pioneers in the 20th century, moving on to the rise of amateur rocket groups in the 1930s and the massive expansion during WWII. Tony will cover post-war delivery systems, the moon shots and manned spaceflights along with a comprehensive explanation of rocket propulsion.

A wonderful collection of short stories has been published by our Creative Writing group. *After the Twa Corbies and*



Other Stories contains a fascinating potpourri of styles and genres from surreal to the ridiculous. Loss, love, mystery, nostalgia and humour are all included. The limited edition of 100 copies was so popular that it sold out by last Christmas; however, the book is available in the library for those who were unable to purchase a copy. Having negotiated any difficulties in producing their first book, the

group is intending to publish a second in time for next Christmas. With even more stories, it promises to be just as sought after. Will there be a third? That remains to be seen!

It is with great sadness that we need to let you know that our dad, John Robinson, of Long Croft, then Cambridge Road, has passed away. He absolutely loved being part of village life, from spending hours on his allotment in Pennington Lane with us, to managing NatWest bank for so many years, originally at the airport, then in Lower Street. He used to attend the Parish Council meetings so he could keep abreast of developments in the village.

His great love was being an integral part of Stansted Football Club, especially his roles as chairman of both the Junior and Senior football teams; the day Stansted won the FA Vase in 1984 was a particularly historic one for him. He also loved watching the village cricket matches and was proud to be vice chairman of that committee, as well as chairman of the ground committee of the Sports Association. Village sport was a massive part of his life for so many years. We were so grateful he had those connections which he could rely on after the passing of our dear mum Ruth in 1989. After retiring from NatWest, he worked part time at the Jet garage and volunteered at Home Farm Trust, where he loved passing on his gardening advice to the residents each week.

In later years he enjoyed being chairman of the Mountfitchet Seniors Club and following that he loved the company of fellow pensioners at the Over 60s club and other residents at Norman Court. We used to hear all about his friends' stories from those weekly sessions. We would be most grateful if you could share this sad news as he knew so many people in the village and his wishes were to be remembered to every single one of them. He wanted to have a celebration of his life, rather than a wake, so absolutely anyone who would like to pay their respects or come and tell his family an amusing anecdote, is very welcome to pop into his home, 98 Cambridge Rd on Sunday 6th April from noon to 4.00pm. In addition to this, dad will be mentioned at the 9.30am Service in St John's Church that morning if anyone would like to attend. HATFIELD FOREST

This winter we have kept a small number of red poll cattle grazing the forest into the spring. The extension of our conventional grazing period is an attempt to counteract the rapidly encroaching scrub species that engulf the wood pasture. These are thriving due to the warmer autumns and winters we are now experiencing. Grazing into the winter also makes up for a lack of availability of appropriate cattle during spring and summer.



We have a new coppice site in Hangman's Coppice in the northwest of the forest. We have created a new scrub site bordering the Flitch Way on the northern boundary and are restoring a wood pasture habitat lost to years of encroachment of species such as hawthorn, blackthorn and bramble. We will be widely communicating the work in these highprofile areas to raise public awareness of our conservation efforts and bust that age-old question of why cut a tree down to preserve a forest? We have a new ranger and assistant ranger involved with various work parties in the wood pasture, marsh and coppices, as well as taking part in chainsaw and woodchipper training. If you are feeling chilly and have a wood burning stove or fire, please contact us to place your log or sawn timber orders and support our ongoing conservation work. You can find further information about the forest on our website.



Our speaker in February was Ken McDonald, who took us on a journey to many local churches in a talk entitled *Another peek inside some Hundred Parishes Churches*. Ken has been a member of the History Society since it was founded and is Secretary of The Hundred Parishes Society which covers over a hundred parishes stretching across approximately 450sq miles in Essex, Hertfordshire and Cambridgeshire His talk was illustrated by more than a hundred photos, taken inside 30 churches, including some that are rarely open to the public, such as Ugley, Great Waltham and Radwinter.

The parish church is often the oldest building in any settlement and some are a thousand years old. Over the centuries most have been endowed with all kinds of interesting features such as colourful wall decorations and stained glass windows. Corbels supporting roof timbers have been carved, as have elaborate screens that separate nave from chancel, while the reredos, the screen behind the altar, is often a feature of great beauty. Most churches contain fascinating memorials to the great and good from centuries ago. We saw dragons, usually at the wrong end of the sword of St George, and a variety of royal coats of arms. Angels peering down from ceilings may sometimes be hard to see, but can come to life with a decent zoom lens. After this most illuminating talk Ken answered several questions from the floor. Our next meeting, which will be given by David Morrison, is on Thursday 6th March at 7.30pm in Touchpoint. 

STANSTED PEOPLE

MELVIN CATON

Melvin's father ran a chain of grocery shops in the Essex/Herts/Cambs borders area including one in Stansted which he took over from Greens of Stansted on Cambridge Road in 1962. In spite of the fact that he was a very successful retailer, he discouraged Melvin and his brother Malcolm from getting into the grocery trade. Melvin was an academic lad, became a boarder in the Junior Boarding House (Grimwade) at Bishop's Stortford College and stayed on to study for A-levels. He remembers getting in trouble in 1966 when he and some pals skived off Speech Day duties in order to watch the World Cup final on black and white TV. He also recalls the occasion when the Queen Mother came to visit in 1968.



Melvin obtained a BSc in Environmental Sciences from Salford University and an MSc in Management Studies at Loughborough University. In 1976, while Melvin was studying for his masters degree, his Dad had a heart attack and was no longer able to work; so Melvin did in fact return to the grocery business, and remained at the Stansted store until the lease ran out in 1981. He continued in the grocery trade in Great Shelford, married Maureen, had their first child, moved into their current house on West Road and first got elected to Uttlesford District Council (UDC), all in the early 80s.

He won a local district council by-election in 1983 as the SDP/Liberal Alliance candidate, when Peter Clark, the previous Liberal councillor stood down. He was one of the first SDP councillors elected in the country. When the two parties merged later, they became the Liberal Democrats. Melvin initially served on UDC for 15 years, including a period as the leader of the (then) LibDem group. At the 1995 elections, the LibDems became the biggest party on UDC. He stood down from the council in 1998; but got re-elected upon his retirement in 2019 and was again leader of the LibDems on UDC for a period until 2023. Melvin was elected to Essex County Council (ECC) in 1993 representing the Stansted division. In 1997 he fought the Saffron Walden seat at the General Election for the LibDems, and came second behind the Conservatives.

In 1998 Melvin made a career change and started work as a manager for St Alban's City Centre. He then worked for a com-

pany set up by Essex County Council to encourage businesses to use recycled materials in their products and processes, later taking on a similar job for the South East England Development Agency based in Chatham, Kent, doing a one-hour commute there and back. The Coalition Government wound up this agency in 2011. Melvin's final job was as a Town Centre Manager in Hertford, until he retired in 2016.

Melvin's father was a keen village cricketer and as a boy Melvin used to go and watch him play. He now thoroughly enjoys watching Essex County play cricket and is hoping to go to Sydney for the Ashes in 2026. He is a great traveller; in his youth he sailed a yacht from Antigua around the Caribbean, and hiked through Thailand, based at Chiangmai on the border with Myanmar. Another adventurous holiday was sailing a felucca down the Nile; he slept overnight on the beaches bordering the river. More recently he and Maureen have travelled to South Africa, and found Cape Town very impressive geographically. They took the funicular railway up Table Mountain, which was a totally fantastic and stunning experience. He and Maureen have visited Singapore and done the essential: they drank a Singapore Sling in Raffles! They loved seeing New England in the Autumn of 2001, but then went on to New York City and he can still recall the dreadful smell of cordite in the air, following the appalling attack on the city in September 2001.

Melvin still has a keen interest in local affairs, but he and Maureen also have an extensive and expanding bucket list of other places they wish to visit including New Orleans for the Jazz, Sri Lanka and the Far East including Vietnam and Cambodia.

IN THE GARDEN

Soil!

Not the most exciting subject, but good soil is essential for a great garden. Spend a pound on the hole and a penny on the plant so the old saying goes. You have probably got clay soil and although it is naturally very nutrient rich, it has poor structure. The soil particles are very small leading them to stick together very easily, hence its use for making bricks. If your soil is very compacted, you may find it is black and a bit smelly under the top inch or so; this means it is anaerobic (no oxygen and every living thing in the soil has died). For successful plant growth you need to dig over to a spade's depth adding lots of matter with bigger particles: well-rotted farmyard manure, compost, grit or general soil conditioner will all suffice. Stay off the soil if it is really wet as you will only compact it further.



Maybe the soil is very dry or very wet, but no need to despair as there are plants that will survive in either of those conditions (more on this in later issues) but they all need to get oxygen to their roots. If you are working with an existing bed with too many plants to dig over, then a healthy dose of mulch such as compost, bark chips or Strulch, which I use, will be worked in by the worms over time to improve the situation. Mulch is also very good at helping keep the moisture in and the weeds under control. There is no need at all to remove soil and import fresh topsoil, this brings its own problems like vine weevils and is an unsustainable practice. Happy digging!

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

In 1975 I saw a film called *Pilgrimage* which had a most profound effect on me at a sixth form retreat which I was helping to organise. It documented a decision by Jean Vanier to take a group of male patients out of the confines of their medical institution in Canada and give them a different experience on a pilgrimage to Lourdes. Vanier had been warned by a number of disapproving authorities that he would be held responsible for any problems that should arise. But Vanier's philosophy was that every individual was a child of God and deserved the opportunity and liberty to have a special experience of His special love for them. He wanted to give these men the freedom to express themselves and to be filled with wonder and self-affirmation in a *Christ experience*.

As I watched the film, I found it very humbling to see the unquestioning confidence that the men put in Vanier and his helpers. Especially notable was their deep appreciation and open affection towards the young volunteers from all nations who assisted them. Their open lovingness and complete trust in the goodness of others contrasted somewhat with the anxious countenances of some of the souvenir shop owners, so concerned that someone might steal or cheat from them when the men arrived so joyfully. It made me wonder, who are the disabled ones? I am still very emotional as I write about the men's final night. The enduring glow of their faces, peacefully and totally immersed in prayer and wonder, reflecting the physical light of the hundreds of candles in the grotto was unforgettable. For them and for us, and what we learnt from them and ourselves, revealed a little bit of what we mean by *God's Kingdom Come on Earth as it is in Heaven*.



In the morning children experienced what life was like as an evacuee in a classroom setting, using ink pens and being interrupted by air raid sirens. In the afternoon they set up village shops, run by the children, where they could spend their rations using actual old currency. The café did a roaring trade in spam and jam sandwiches.

Our youngest children also had a treat, in conjunction with *Starry Night*. They came back to school in the evening in pyjamas and dressing gowns for bedtime hour. The school was in darkness, so everyone had to use torches to help find their way about. In the corridors there was a trail of nocturnal animals to find, and classroom ceilings had transformed into a sea of stellar constellations, an aurora and projections of the moon. Best of all was possibly the hot chocolate and biscuit. Many thanks to all the staff who came back to school to make it such a magical event.

One of the main crops of our rich agricultural area is barley, the main ingredient of traditional ales and beer. In the past, much of the barley was malted locally before being taken to a nearby brewery to be combined with water, hops and yeast for fermenting into beer. Brewing was initially a domestic activity in the home for family consumption, on farms and estates for the landowner's family and workers, and in various institutions such as religious communities for those who lived in and visited them. As the demand for beer grew (safer to drink than 'fresh' water at the time) so did the industry: public houses having their own brewhouses, commercial beer producers working out of stand-alone breweries and then the development of industrial scale brewery complexes.







Little Hadham Stansted Felsted

Evidence of all these different types of beer producers is to be found within the Hundred Parishes in the form of place names such as Brewery Lane in Stansted, Brewery House in Little Hadham; Little Brewers, a cottage in Matching Green; Brewery Cottage in Sewards End and Brewers House in Dunmow. There are also surviving examples of the beerhouse from each of the various phases of the development of the industry. At Audley End House the estate's brewhouse survives although the internal features have been lost.

Hatfield Heath

An example of a public house brewery survives as The Old Brewery in Radwinter, now a private house. In Hatfield Heath the former stand-alone brewhouse was converted to a corn mill before becoming commercial offices. Three examples of brewhouses which were a part of industrial brewery complexes survive in Furneux Pelham, Wethersfield and Hartford End in Felsted. All three have been renovated and converted to private residential use.

We are into March already, which means it is time once again to welcome you all to our Annual Parish Meeting.

This event essentially serves as a forum for residents to engage directly with the Parish Council face-to-face without many of the rules that govern regular council meetings. Because of this the Annual Parish Meeting (APM) offers the chance to discuss any parish affairs you wish to raise. That is, if there is an area of village life that you feel is not being discussed at our meetings the rest of the year — this is your opportunity to bring it to the floor.

Also, at an APM you can demand a poll be taken on any question arising at the meeting. Technically, you would need the support of at least 10 other local electors, or one-third of electors at the meeting - whichever is fewer. But a poll means you could ask the Parish Council to consider taking action on a matter for which it has statutory control — for example how it manages the cemetery or deals with allotments.

The Parish Council Chair and head of the Finance & General Purposes committee will both be at the meeting to listen to your concerns, and to offer their insight into how they see 2025 shaping up.

This year, like last, the Annual Parish Meeting will be at the Mountfitchet Exchange library, located next door to TouchPoint at the top of Chapel Hill. We would ask you to arrive 30 minutes before the meeting to give yourself time to find a seat and enjoy some refreshments before things get under way. See you there!

Annual Report 2025-2026

It has been confirm d the elections the thad been expected for Essex County Council this year will be suspended. By the time of our Annual Parish Meeting on Manch 12th, we should understand more about the process of Local Government Reorganisation and the impact this change will bring. As it stands Essex County Council, Southend-on-Sea and Thurrock Councils have had their request to be part of the Devolutio Priority Programme approved.

Will three into one work?

The "Devolution Deal" will c eate a Mayoral Strategic Authority for Essex (via the election of a m yor who will have devolved powers from government) in May 2026. It is proposed the Mayor will be able to make strategic decisions, speak directly to government ministers, secure funding for local projects, att act investment and improve infrastructure. A directly elected Mayor will have signifi ant powers over strategic functions, e g. for economic development, housing, infrastructure and transport.

Key functions of a y newly created unitary authorities resulting f om devolution will include managing t ansport and concessionary fares, overseeing training for skills and driving economic growth, as well as having strategic control over planning and housing. For example, should Uttle ford be merged with neighbouring district authorities, such as Braintree and Harlow, collectie decisions will be able to be made across the three council boundaries.

By the time of our metin, hopefully with more clarity on the role of Parish Councils and following our own internal discussions, we can decide if there are any particular a eas we would like to significantly influence oing forward.



The sheer number of roadworks, closures and diversions in 2024 has been an undoubted source of frustration for residents.

Peter Holt, chief executi e of Uttle ford District Council, is our guest speaker at the Annual Parish Meeting. e look forward to Mr Holt's talk on Local Government Reorganisation. e hope he will be able to give us some further information on this d velopment and the expected impacts and costs of these changes — how to ensure our issues and needs are addressed and not lost to the interests of bigger players.

Last year boundary changes were approved that saw Stansted Mountfi chet linked with parishes in the west of the county up to Chrishall on the border with Cambridge. We need to understand how these changes will play out within the reorganisation of lo al authorities

House building and Stansted

The district council's Local Plan is now with the Secretary of State for independent examination. As I eported to the Parish Council, the number of houses Uttle ford are expected to develop over the life of the plan has already increased from 674 to 804 homes, an increase of 19%.

It is crucial our Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) fits with the trategy of the Local Plan. But we also need our views on where, why and how to build and develop housing with appropriate infrastructure remaining the golden thread in this crucial planning document.

Our NDP has been extensively revised following professional input from an advisor to parish councils on submittin neighbourhood plans to the planning inspectorate. This has been done to smooth the document's passage through the adoption p ocess. The sooner our plan is officiall approved, the less chance the village is open to speculati e development. With this in mind, the Parish Council aims submit its plan to Uttle ford early this summer. A public consultation on this egulation 14 ersion of the NDP should soon follow.

Threat to community policing

At the time of writing this eport, we are waiting o hear the fate of our Police Community Support Offic . This is in light of the announcement by the Essex Police, Fire & Crime Commissioner in February that all PCSOs are to be made redundant in Essex. Whether this will happen is uncertain. We have learned Essex Police are reconsidering the position of its 99 community support offic s after the government announced a further £100m in funding to support neighbourhood policing and the targeting of a tisocial behaviour.

A meeting has been held y Essex Police to discuss how this new funding could alter their stance. But as we go to press, we have had no confirm tion of the futu e of PCSOs. The Parish Council continues o part fund our PCSO. We do so because we believe they are an asset to our community's well-being. We would not support any decision to remove this post nor the funding available. We hope to update you positi ely at the Annual Parish Meeting

Action, not words, please!

We continue o battle with the on oing issues of our highways — potholes, road closures, HGV traffic. Thes remain unchanged and impact our daily life and, in some cases, livelihoods. Perhaps the reorganisation and devolution of lo al authorities will add ess this.

We continue o hold regular meetings with our Di trict and County Councillors, who take forward our concerns on highways matters and on issues such as the condition of Manor Road fl ts, which need to be made safely habitable.

Essex County Councillor Tom Cunningham, Cabinet Member for Highways, Infrastructure and Sustainable Transport, attended a Full Council meeting la t November. Unfortunately, rhetoric at the meeting has not been replicated with action and with clarity on a ay forward to solve the highway issues raised. The portfolio holder for highways is still (as ar as are aware) to arrange a meeting with the Manchester Airport Group to discuss diverting HGVs away from the village using its roads. This potential line of action ollowed the negati e outcome of a traffi survey measuring HGV use along Grove Hill.

County Councillor Ray Gooding has confirmed he has progressed the application o have the chicanes removed on Church Road and a new traffic fety scheme to be considered. We await a review through the Local Highways Panel and a design and scheme proposal.

There also has also been no feedback from Cllr Cunningham in relation o additional treet lighting f om the new Walpole Meadows development to the top of the village. He has responded via Cllr Gooding that he is unable to respond to the questions e have raised in relation o highways maintenance in Stansted over the last fi e years, as this information is not ecorded at this level. But he did commit to look at what capital projects are planned for the next fi e years and what major project spends there have been.

Cllr Gooding is to arrange a meeting with the E vironment Agency, ECC and Parish Council representati es in relation o safeguarding volunteers clearing the trash screen, and the maintenance that ECC are required to undertake.

Fighting for our green belt

In December, City and Country Group met with Councillors from Stansted and Birchanger to discuss their proposals to build 150 new homes on land between the two parishes. Both chairmen agreed that until the plans a e developed, we are unable to comment further. But currently, in principle, we would object to the house builder's plans. The encroachment on both villages and Bishop's Stortford would be unacceptable. Helpfully recent legislati e support means that development in "grey belt" still equires a signifi ant determinant to do so.

Bloor Homes will have held their public consultation on Phase 2 of the Walpole development (270 houses) by the time e meet. This site is one of two included in UDC's draft eg 19 Local Plan. Their application is i tended to be reviewed by Uttle ford District Council and not the Planning Inspectorate. In relation o High Lane where Bloor intend to build 57 homes, the developer is proposing to formalise the lay-by for resident parking and to apply for a road traffic der to reduce the speed limit to 30mph. They have suggested that marketing of the homes is o be promoted for Stansted residents in the fi st instance — with 5% being affordable bungalows.

14 plots close to hand over

The day when residents will have the keys to their longawaited allotment plot at Walpole Meadows draws nearer. Fourteen plots will soon be ready for new tenants, with

one having been set aside for community use. Although the developer had been keen to hand ownership of the allotments to the Parish Council, we have had to work hard with the Section 106 office — t the district council and Bloor Homes so the land is fit—or use prior to the exchange but this has now been completed. The Clerk and Open Spaces committee are in consultation with the Section 106 offi regarding the handover of the remaining public open spaces on the Walpole Meadows development.

Youth Club blooms

The Youth Club is now settled i to its new home on the old Peter Kirk School site. The club operates three nights a week. On average 25 young people attend each session — almost three times as may as before. The feedback from its young attendees is resoundingly positie. They enjoy the activities social interaction and funpovided by the club. The leader is working with a number of community organisations, no ably TouchPoint Radio, to spread the word of its success to the wider community. A Youth Club trip to our twin town of Rungis is planned for Easter weekend. This will allow some of Stansted's younger residents to meet their French peers. This trip is being supported by a £1,000 donation fom the Firework Event Group.

Backing for TouchPoint

SMPC have now granted a licence to occupy to TouchPoint for the old Day Centre building and Crafton Green House. We are delighted with the benefits the trace provided to our community and the improvements made to the buildings through the organisation s successful grant applications. TouchPoint's occupation of these buildings has elieved the Parish Council of hefty business ates although we have continued o fund utility osts. TouchPoint has committed to try to repay the current year's utility osts at our year-end review. In turn the Parish Council will continue o monitor and review its spend in support of TouchPoint.

Search for cemetery land

We are continuing o search for cemetery land to enable parishioners to have the choice to be buried here in Stansted. In the same vein, we continue o speak to Legacy East Almshouse Partnership, endeavouring to progress the reinstatement of our almshouses and the safeguarding of the financial le acy remaining after the loss of those on Church Road.



ooking back over the past two years, it is small comfort that the infl tion ate at 3.7% remains well above the ideal target figu e of 2%.

We have done our best to lessen the load on our community in setting the arish Council precept. It has been kept to a rise of 4.49%. This equates to an increase of £6.26 per annum of our share for Band 'D' Council Tax in 2025/26 of £145.77. This compares to £139.51 last year.

Like all employers, the increase in the minimum wage and National Insu ance has affected all councils. Going out to tender for new three-year gardening and grass cuttin contracts was essential and the higher osts have had to be dealt with, but this has partly been balanced by the deferment of this year's £25,000 payment to the Foresthall Park Community Fund.

The budget includes £7,000 for IT security back-up and an amount of £4,000, which has been set aside as a 'surety fund' to protect Youth Club finances in ase Uttle ford District Council withdraws funding. These exceptional additions, along with the £10,000 or the Cemetery expansion, were the extras of note.

Energy costs

Overall, energy costs remain volatile, but e have been able to achieve a reduction in the ene gy costs for the Mountfi chet Exchange building on a short-term contract. Our brokers have advised that we defer merging our energy contracts until ebruary 2026. By having all our contracts to end at the same time will help us amal amate them to achieve a stronger bargaining position and ma e budgeting decisions more accurate. We shall, however, keep our streetlight energy contracts separate.

Streetlights

We are unsure what savings have been achieved since the conversion to LED and part-night lighting. St eetlight energy costs are not metered, and we have had to chase UK Power Networks time and time ain to obtain the necessary information o move forward. After over 12 months, we have now received a certification of our lig ting i ventory, and we are now awaiting onfirm tion f om our energy supplier.

Still on treetlights, a structural survey is due in June 2026. It is feared that we shall have to replace around 30 lamps along Chapel Hill and Lower Street. Corrosion at the base of some of them was highlighted in 2023. This has prompted the inspectors to return after three years, instead of the usual five.

Lighting manu acturers have been contacted to provide costings of the replacement columns and lanterns in good time for us to prepare a suitable strategy. By next year, we will have raised £45,000 towards the cost.

IT Security

Cyber Crime has become a red-hot potato and the Council has sought protection within the G vernment's "Cyber Essentials" p ogramme. The Parish Council has at last received certification the twe have the required IT Security competence level with the help of Genmar, a highly regarded IT Security and Business Support company.

Flood defence

The flood arning system was found to have failed this autumn, but the manufacturers are dealing with the problem and it should be back in place soon.

The two sets of pins in the Ugley Brook, along Gall End Lane, have taken a battering, but have been a worthwhile investment. The trash screen at the entrance to the culvert that runs under Lower Street has survived being overwhelmed by the closest of margins. Thankfully, at last we have received acknowledgement by Essex County Council that it is their responsibility to keep the area around it clear of vegetation. This will help our Flood ardens keep the screen free of debris. Iain Rankin and the team deserve our grateful thanks.

Library lease

Finally, we are still aiting six ears on for the lease of the Library area of the Mountfi chet Exchange to be signed. The procrastin tion of Ess x County Council is a scandal. It shows a serious degree of indifference by the County Council towards their dealings with Parish Councils. Will the creation of a different Unitary Authority make any difference? I wonder.

SMPC Community Grants

BIG GARDEN BIRDWATCH 2025

Taking part in the annual birdwatch at the end of January I saw roughly the same numbers and species of birds in my garden as I did in 2024. All my regular visitors turned up to enjoy a bath and peck the food provided. When submitting my results, it was interesting to see that in Essex the most sightings recorded were of the house sparrow, a bird rarely seen in my garden. Not sure if that is because they are so well camouflaged that I fail to spot them or if they are just

not interested in the menu on offer at my address. Obviously, some research needed before next year if I want to attract the sparrows!



The species that visits my garden the most is definitely the starling. It is a very entertaining bird to watch as it squawks and squabbles with all the other birds, particularly fellow starlings. Counting them is an absolute nightmare as they always descend on the bird table in large numbers. They crowd round the food like a gang of unruly teenagers, constantly on the move in an attempt to get a better position at the trough. Starlings are a joy to observe. In the spring iridescent patches of green and purple appear to brighten up their blackish plumage, making them as colourful as I expect their language is. They are also famous for their mass preroost gatherings known as a murmuration; a spectacular sight, forming ever-changing shapes in the sky and moving as one great entity.

Who needs sparrows when you can enjoy watching the antics of the fascinating starling?





Daffodils follow on from the snowdrops at the gardens and have a lovely long season. Did you know there are 80 wild species with only two native to the UK, and over 30,000 different varieties of cultivated daffodils on the *International Daffodil Register*? At the gardens we have planted *tête-a-tête* for their early show; they give a really vibrant splash of colour along the top of the Italian garden from late February.

They are followed by a host of naturalised varieties near the elephant statue and in the lime wood, as shown in the photograph below. Some of those were on the market in the early 1900s, so were probably planted when Peto redesigned the gardens and built the treehouse for the Countess of Warwick in 1902.



The memorial area in the glade was established with daffodils and hyacinths. We have also planted late flowering narcissi to complement *Camassia* in the mini orchard at the top of the kitchen garden; to brighten the tree cathedral in the glade and to add to the Japanese style garden near the platform with views onto the fishing lake.

The gardens are not routinely open to the public in March but if the weather is set fair we sometimes open on Thursdays in late March; we announce this on our Facebook, Instagram or website. So keep an eye out! Of course our gardeners, who keep everything looking so lovely, see the flowers as they emerge week by week.

We take on new volunteers all year round and will be holding a new session for them on **Thursday 20th March.** As well as gardeners we are pleased to welcome volunteers who like to help with maintenance work, catering and front of house roles. By the end of February we will have finished any coppicing activity so that going into spring we do not disturb wildlife, particularly nesting birds, with noisy chainsaws. The finished coppices may look like an area of destruction so it is worth explaining what is happening and why.

Multi stemmed hazel trees have been coppiced for hundreds of years to provide fire wood and building material. The straight and flexible stems that grow after coppicing were a valuable resource used for a variety of purposes. Where it grows, most villages would have had a managed hazel wood. Today our stems go to the Audley End estate for fencing and to gardeners for bean poles, whilst some of the thicker stems go to Morris dancers! Coppicing cuts the hazel back almost to ground level leaving a stool. The new growth from the stool creates a multi stem shrub rather than a single stem tree, creating a particular habitat that we want to maintain. Immediately after coppicing an area until the hazels have grown tall again, the floor of the wood is opened up to daylight allowing other plants to flourish. So by coppicing areas in rotation over the years we ensure that this cycle of growth and plant variety continues.



At Aubrey Buxton we cover the coppiced stools with interwoven branches to stop rabbits and deer eating the new hazel shoots as they appear. The remaining cut material is laid as a dead hedge which is excellent cover for small mammals and nesting sites for birds such as wrens. The photo above shows how this looks until the new shoots appear. Stools that were coppiced last year already have new growth up to four feet high!


