The month of Remembrance is upon us, celebrated in three ways: Guy Fawkes night, Remembrance Sunday and Armistice Day. We often forget how dreadful the Gunpowder Plot of 1605 was, as it tried to murder the King by blowing up the House of Lords during the State Opening of Parliament. LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT

As it gets colder, there is nothing like a roaring log fire on a chilly evening to keep you warm. The logs which we sell are from hardwood trees harvested as a by-product of coppicing. The cost is £120 a bag; please contact the Estate Office, email: hatfieldforest@nationaltrust.org.uk or call 870678 to place an order. We also have fresh venison for sale from the Estate Office. Why not try some diced venison in a casserole? It is delicious and healthy.



We are now only open Wednesday to Sunday 9.00am-2.30pm. We close the forest and car parks because over the wetter months, the ground conditions are very poor and can be badly impacted by large footfall. Our reduced opening hours reflect both the use of the forest in those months and our ongoing work to protect this special site. This change in season is also causing erosion of the historic woodland rides, so if you come across a diversion, please follow it and discover a new route. You cannot book a car parking space, so please check our website for further information.



IN MEMORIAM

PETER RONALD TRUNDLE

15th January 1938 - 23rd July 2025



Dad was born on Chapel Hill in 1938, the only child of Rose and Barney Trundle. They lived opposite what is now Stansted Free Church (formerly Stansted United Reformed Church), which Dad attended from the age of five. Aged 15 after finishing secondary education, Dad began a career in print that would continue for the next 50 years. He became a qualified Typographical Compositor and eventually joined the board of the Anchor Press as Director.

My parents met in Billericay at the wedding of a mutual friend. Dad was the unofficial photographer and Mum (Valerie) had been asked to sing. They knew each other for just three months before becoming engaged. Dad had a lovely voice, and they both enjoyed singing in a local music group called *Summer Wine*. Mum still lives in Bentfield Gardens in the house they shared for over 60 years of marriage. My brother Paul was born in 1966 and I followed not long after in 1968.

Dad had been a keen Scout, making many lifelong friends. He developed a love of cricket and football, both as a supporter and player. He was a competent artist, avid reader and film buff, and had a strong interest in languages, especially Italian. Dad was also a good cook, offering delicious dinners over the years at family get-togethers. He had a wonderful sense of humour, entertaining us for hours with stories and his famous funny walks. He was fortunate enough to see his grandchildren grow into adulthood and to welcome great grandchildren into the family.

Church life was very important to both my parents and Dad, along with Mum, received an award for children's work which spanned 40 years.

Dad suffered a stroke in March 2023. After numerous hospital visits and a few months return to home, he eventually needed specialist care and was moved to Elm View Care Home in Bishop's Stortford where he was well cared for. There was nothing more important to Dad than his family and we were with him when he passed peacefully on 23rd July. He is greatly missed by us all.

NHS flu and Covid vaccinations at Peacock Pharmacy
Appointments are now available at the pharmacy for free
NHS Flu and Covid vaccinations for those who are eligible.
Please note that the rules for Covid vaccinations have
changed this year to ensure that vaccinations are only
given to those who need them most. The minimum age for
adults has moved to 75 and over, unless you are resident in
a care home for older adults or are aged 6 months and over
and immunosuppressed.

Some confusion has arisen over this as the NHS website will allow under 75s to book an appointment for a Covid booster if they self-declare that they are eligible, and they are then turned away when they arrive for their appointment. If you are not sure if you are eligible, you can check by going to www.nhs.uk/vaccinations where you can also book your appointment. Alternatively you can call us on 816323; we have lots of time slots available. The pharmacy is next to the Peacock surgery in Castle Maltings and is open Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday 8.00am-6.30pm, Tuesday 7.00am-6.30pm and Saturday 9.00am-1.00pm.

RECYCLING



I thought it would be useful to give a reminder of items we currently **recycle**: foreign coins, old UK coins, original brand ink cartridges, used and unused British and foreign stamps, mobile phones, ipads, tablets and USB leads. It would be helpful if donations could be placed in a paper or plastic bag or envelope; please use a separate one for each category. Items can be put in the boxes outside the main blue door of the Free Church at the bottom of Chapel Hill. There is also a collecting box inside St John's church porch; alternatively please leave items in the porch of 7 Blythwood Gardens. Thank you.

We **do not recycle** toners, laptops, remanufactured ink cartridges, foreign or English bank notes, blister packs, spectacles, toothbrushes/heads and toothpaste tubes. Spectacles can be taken to *Specsavers* in Bishop's Stortford, who have a box for them just behind the till. They do not want the cases. There are two organisations which refurbish laptops or printers and donate to schools and charities; both will collect from you free of charge. With strong roots in Stansted, its purpose includes installing solar panels and batteries at public buildings such as schools, NHS buildings, churches and others in and around the village. The cats and kittens are placed with foster carers until we find them a suitable home. We neuter, vaccinate and microchip our cats so that all of them will be in good health when rehomed. We also include a Lost and Found section on our social platforms, hoping to reunite them with their home. Toe Beans is run by cat-loving volunteers, and we get updates and adorable photos from our foster carers.



A recent success story is of a kitten called Peach, pictured above, who had a bad start and came into our care just over a month ago. She was admitted to the vets several times due to various infections, but our efforts to care for her helped; she also benefited from support through a Toe Beans GoFundMe page. She is now well and ready for her forever home. Such situations are not rare, as many rescue cats need critical veterinary care which is expensive.

We are looking for help. You can support us in several ways: becoming a foster carer, financial support or food and litter gifts. FULLER'S ALMSHOUSES

The original Stansted almshouses were opened in 1882 to accommodate poor elderly women. My great-grandmothers were two of the first to be granted a single room; both had families with several children. What a relief when elderly Granny got her own home! Accommodation was a single room, no running water, no lavatory or wash basin. You drew water from the communal taps. Heating and cooking were by the kitchen range, an open fire. Lighting was oil lamps and candles, a Fire Officer's nightmare! Was there a communal privy? There were washhouses with coal fired boilers and mangles, with drying racks from the ceiling. Hopefully, their families helped out, especially with the ironing! Both died in 1910, Granny Blake aged 86 and Granny Cannon aged 96.

In the 1930s, one of my great aunts, Lottie Cannon, moved into her mother's old room. By then, electric light had been installed, but no other changes to the plumbing or heating had been made. There was still a curtained corner with a bucket and chamber pot; I know, I got in trouble for peeking! The photo below was taken in August 1949 on the occasion of Lottie's 100th birthday; it shows members of the Parish Council with Lottie. Lighting 100 candles caused the cake decoration to melt!

Aunt Lottie was not the last Fuller's Houses family member. During the war, cousin Kate French lost her home in the bombing raids, and her last surviving son and his wife died in a V2 rocket attack in 1944 in London. With no other family, cousin Kate was a third-generation resident of Fuller's Houses, before the Housing Associations converted them into single-occupancy flats.

Are there more families who can share these memories, from the days before care homes and sheltered accommodation? I can remember only one other resident in Fuller's Houses from the 1930s and 40s, but there are still four or five generations of our Cannon family in the village, and we have been here since 1800! I am too old to apply for a new almshouse; perhaps another family can begin a long line?

STANSTED ART AND CRAFT MARKET

Tribute to Arthur Law

I was sad to read of the death of Arthur Law; whilst I noted his interest in painting, it really went much further than that. When Martin Cowan was endeavouring to get the Stansted Art and Craft Market off the ground in the 70s, Arthur became his right-hand man; he had the job of recruiting artists. His brief was to encourage artists to bring their works to display, and hopefully to sell them, at the two-day market to be held at the then Youth Centre in Lower Street.

Such were his efforts that, at the first event, over 200 paintings were put on display and a number were sold. Added to this were a number of craft stalls. Over the years the number of items for display and sale rose to over 800 paintings, plus a wide variety of crafts at over 30 stalls. The Art and Craft Market continued until it was a feature of the year, but ultimately it had to leave the premises. Towards the end, over 900 people visited during the two days when it was open. It kept going in St John's Church for a few years before it had to finish. Over the years, more than £25,000 was raised for local charities and good causes. Arthur's part in this was invaluable.







In October, we welcomed Mike Howgate who gave a talk with slides on the Knights Templar. These were a mysterious powerful, influential, military and religious order which first came to prominence at the time of the first crusade in about 1096, and were known by their distinctive white mantles with red crosses and their superior martial prowess. They were formed into a distinct group by Hugues de-Payens in about 1119 with the specific task of protecting Christian pilgrims travelling to the Holy Land after the First Crusade. They were officially endorsed by the Catholic Church and were answerable to the Pope who granted them exemption from certain laws and local taxes.

The Templars became extremely wealthy by an accumulation of land holdings and international banking across Europe and the Middle East. This made them both financially powerful and politically significant. By the end of the 13th century their power began to decline, as the superior Muslim forces had seized much of the Holy Land, and the Templars' original purpose faded. On Friday 13th October 1307 Philip the Fair had all the Templars arrested on charges of heresy and blasphemy, for example. Most were executed although some confessed and were spared. After a further 20 years in prison the last head of the Templars, Grand Master Jacques de Molay, was burned at the stake. In the City of London, there is a Templars church which was founded in 1180 by the Knight Templars and is now owned by the Inner and Middle Temple Inns of Court, the Association of Barristers, and visitors can look round it at certain times. This church is unusual as it is of a round con-

Remembrance Service — 9th November

Road closure on Chapel Hill



his year's Remembrance Service will take place on Sunday, 9th November. Parishioners are invited to gather from 10.30am either at the Memorial Gardens or at Cra on Green car park.

The parade, led by service personnel from Carver Barracks, will make its way from the car park down Chapel Hill to the war memorial. Please note, this year to ensure the parade and service can take place safely and without disruption, Chapel Hill will be closed from 10.30-11.05am.

The service at the Memorial Gardens will be conducted by Rev Helen Flack from St John's Church. Following the service, refreshments will be served in St John's Church Hall, and all are warmly invited to join.

If you or your organisation would like to take part in laying a wreath, please contact SMPC in advance. We hope that many parishioners will come together for this important occasion, as we gather to remember and honour those who gave their lives from, and for, our community.

November Roadworks

Also, Essex County Council will be fixing street-lights along Cambridge Road on Nov 24, expect temporary lights to control the traffic north of the junction with Croasdaile Road.

Street-lights & flags Stance on flags under review

n September, the Stansted Mountfi chet Parish Council updated its statement clarifying its position on flags displayed on village lamp posts:

The Parish Council has recently reviewed its position regarding the St George's flags that have been erected on some of our street-lights.

This Parish Council is committed to serving an inclusive community for all its residents, regardless of nationality, background, or belief.

We, as a council, did not give permission for the placement of the flags and do not agree with any political statement they may portray.

Our community is built on the values of respect, unity, and mutual understanding, and we are proud to be part of, and promote, a welcoming and harmonious place to live.

Although we recognise the concerns raised, it is not technically possible for the Council to remove the flags at this time, as we have

been unable to find contractors to undertake this task. It must be stressed that we will not sanction their unlawful removal by members of the public for safety and insurance reasons.

Play equipment review

Budgeting for investment in play areas underway



ach autumn, the Parish Council reviews the budget for the year ahead, and one of the topics under consideration this year will be investment in the village play areas. The loss of the tree house and delays to repairs on the zip wire at the Recreation Ground caused real frustration over the summer.

Balancing the need for good play facilities with the pressures of the cost of living is not easy. Last year, £10,750 was set aside for maintenance, but we have no funds for capital costs. Quotes for a replacement tree house are around £50,000. Our Projects Officer is working hard to identi y potential grants, and the Open Spaces Committee has already met with equipment providers to explore options. It may be that replacement will be phased over a couple of financial years.

Once the 2026/27 budget is agreed, the Council will draw up a short-list of new equipment and consult with residents on their preferred choices.

Changes to local Police team line up

PC Sharma departs for new beat in Braintree

A reshuffle in personnel means Stansted has said goodbye to Police Constable Steve Sharma.

Part of the Uttlesford South Neighbourhood Policing Team, PC Sharma has been a familiar and friendly presence in the village for several years. His regular a endance at Street Beats outside the Co-op and at TouchPoint events will be greatly missed. We are sure residents will join us in wishing him well as he moves to his new post in Braintree.

Taking over locally is Acting Sergeant Trower. Residents will have the chance to meet him at this month's community engagement sessions at TouchPoint on 13th and 20th November.

At a recent meeting with Sergeant Claire Bailey and Police Community Support Officer (PCSO) Alex Stewart, the Parish Council was updated on several policing issues. These included:

- Ongoing investi ations into shoplifting in the village, particularly at the Co-op, where delays in incident reporting by regional managers have hindered progress. Officers urged residents to report all criminal behaviour directly via the 101 system.
- An appeal for volunteers to join the village SpeedWatch team

District and Parish Councillors have also been invited to join PCSO Stewart on a patrol of the village on 20 November. Essex Police see such patrols as a way to share information and strengthen links between officers, councillors, and residents.



As we go to print, we expect the Uttlesford District Council to confirm that SMPC a er 20th October can advertise two vacancies on the Parish Council left by the resignation of Cllr Tom Van de Bilt and the death of Cllr Peter Jones.

What does it take to be a Parish Councillor?

Parish Councillors are volunteers — no special qualifi ations are required. What ma ers most is being a good communicator, a team player, open-minded and having time to devote to the role — it's not all about a ending meetings! Help tackle hare coursing

Parish Cllr George Braeckman reports on Operation Galileo

At this time of year, hare coursing is increasingly common. It is important that anyone who sees suspected hare coursing should contact the police on 999, citing Operation Galileo and a empt to note any details about the activity.

What is hare coursing?

Hare coursing is an illegal activity where people use dogs, usually greyhounds, to chase, catch, and kill hares on farmer's land by trespassing. It's frequently done for online gambling. It is an offence to chase a hare with dogs and to trespass with a motor vehicle.

Why is it such a problem?

Hare coursers have strong links with organised crime. Those involved are frequently violent and should not be approached. Episodes can be over before there's a chance to respond. Criminals tear into a field, release their dogs, race a er the chase to film it, and speed off leaving lots of costly damage behind them.

Operation Galileo will see police forces co-ordinate resources —including the use of police helicopters— to clamp down on the problem. Find out more at:

Green energy at Crafton Green House?

Council explores solar option at 72 Chapel Hill

The Parish Council continues to invest in green energy projects to help tackle climate change and reduce costs in the village. Past initiati es have included installing a heat pump at the Mountfi chet Exchange and rolling out partnight LED street lighting. The next step could be solar panels at Cra on Green House (CGH).

In October, Cllr John O'Brien met with solar panel installers to survey the roof of CGH. The project is still at an early stage, but it could provide major benefits for both the SMPC and TouchPoint.

TouchPoint leases the premises at 72 Chapel Hill from the Parish Council. So, as TouchPoint's landlord, one of the most signifi ant ways we support the charity is by helping cover



costs tied to the former day centre and Cra on Green House. Last year these included £6,270 for window cleaning; £6,213 on refurbishments; and over £5,200 for fire inspections, water checks, plumbing and boiler repairs.

The largest recurring expense, however, is energy—£7,234 in 2024/25. Securing a grant for solar power installation would help reduce the utility bill and free up more cash either to help TouchPoint deliver its excellent services or to invest elsewhere in the village.

Tracy Mutch – a driving force behind Music in the Park, an annual event that raises thousands of pounds for Bentfield Primary School.

Local Plan Consultation

Signifi ance of Main Modifications for Stansted

At the end of October, Uttlesford District Council completed the latest consultation on its Local Plan. Residents, businesses, and local stakeholders were invited to comment on proposed Main Modifications (MM) suggested by Planning Inspectors. These included:

- Reducing housing targets from 6,076 homes to 4,638
- Revising housing allocations
- Greater emphasis on social rented housing
- More protection for heritage assets and ancient woodland
- Expanded open spaces in new developments. The Local Plan guides development in Uttlesford until 2041, shaping decisions on planning applications in Stansted and elsewhere.

Modifications and questions for the village

Flexibility for housing targets (MM2) raises the district-wide supply by 470 homes to 15,211. Could this mean more homes for Stansted if other areas fall short?

MM55 promises be er pedestrian and cycle routes, including a safe and att acti e path along Hornbeam Way and High Lane — but how will this be delivered?

MM21 restricts airport parking to the boundary, but will it prevent fly parking and temporary car parks around the village?

Stansted & the Local Plan

Key Settlement: Stansted remains one of Uttlesford's three largest and most sustainable settleme ts. The Plan aims to protect its historic character while supporting housing and infrastructure.

Transport: New active travel routes are planned for High Lane and Lower Street, with cycling and walking links to the airport and Bishop's Stor ord.

Housing & Development: Two sites are proposed — 270 homes at Walpole Meadows North and 55 homes east of High Lane. New schemes must deliver walking/cycling links, green infrastructure, open space, and biodiversity improvements. No new schooling is planned for, unlike at nearby Takeley.

Economy: Despite being the third largest centre, Stansted has limited growth potential due to its lack of a commercial core

Stansted Airport: Seen as a major economic asset, employing 12,000 and contributing £1 billion annually. The Plan supports airport-related growth while keeping new parking within the boundary

Next Steps

The Plan now moves to Independent Examination. Following

the Inspector's report, the District Council will take the final steps toward adoption, possibly as early as Spring 2026.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY STATION WALKS

On a fine September day, I caught an early train to Ware before tackling the longest walk on the society's website. Station Walk No 18 covers 17 miles (28 kilometres) between Ware Station and Stansted Mountfitchet Station. Although I walk regularly, it was some years since I last covered that distance in a day, so I carried a mobile phone just in case. An advantage of this route is that it heads north for several miles and then turns east, so for much of the way the sun is behind to give the best views.

After leaving Ware, the route is in lovely countryside, passing through eight of our hundred parishes: Wareside, Standon, Thundridge, Braughing and Albury in Hertfordshire and then Farnham, Manuden and Stansted Mountfitchet in Essex.

Through these parishes, only Standon and Stansted contributed much more than the occasional farmhouse. They, along with Gravesend in Albury, also offered opportunities for refreshment.

The route follows good paths and tracks, rising and falling between river valleys. It passes over the River Lea just after the start, spends several miles along the Rib valley, and crosses the Ash and the Stort.

The journey crosses the Greenwich Meridian, the original route of the Roman Stane Street and the former Buntingford railway line. It passes beside Barwick Ford, Standon Lordship (see photo), Patmore Heath and Stansted Windmill, and there are sightings of distant churches, water towers and more. However the best views are of unspoilt, rolling countryside and occasional wildlife.

I completed the walk, accompanied for the last six miles by my wife Janice, after having lunch in Gravesend. Altogether, a most enjoyable day, and the legs only ached a bit for the next few days! Having completed this challenge, I can return to the many shorter routes on our website.

BRAIN TRAINING

Executive function and navigating the unknown

Learning something new, be it a movement, driving somewhere new or moving house, takes concentration. We have to fully engage our executive function which is the most demanding part of our entire system. Being tired, stressed, dehydrated or hungry makes this much harder, along with getting older. Navigating into the unknown is extremely good for us. As we all know, use it or lose it. Trying to find Boople Lane in Middlechester is difficult and thus an extremely good reason to do it. Also the long-distance drive there is demanding, even if it is, hopefully, boring.



When we have to do something new and challenging, feeding the brain will really help. Do not be hungry. If need be, suck on sweets or munch on oatcakes to maintain blood sugar levels. Be well-hydrated at all times. Keep calm: music of any sort is stimulating; it is the way the brain processes it. Speech is calming, so listen to a story or a podcast. As you approach the difficult bit, focus on longer relaxed exhales.

If you decide to take up a new sport, bear these things in mind. Try to stay calm and do not arrive hungry or thirsty! Moving house is a well-known source of stress. After the potential horrors of selling, buying and removals you are in your new abode and absolutely nothing is the same. For a little while, we are constantly navigating the new within the house and the surrounding area. This is placing huge demands on our executive function, and this can be when dementia is first realised. The brain has been slowly declining, but because of the low demands on executive function, this has not been noticed. In the new home, this is suddenly very pronounced. The move did not bring on dementia, it uncovered it.

IN THE GARDEN

Allergy friendly gardening

Gardens are all about enjoyment; part of this pleasure is watching the birds, bees, butterflies and other insects that are attracted by what we plant. However, over 15% of Britain's population have asthma, over 50% of the population experience hayfever, and respiratory allergies are rising among children, young people and the elderly. Pets also experience plant allergies. Fortunately, we can easily avoid planting the worst culprits while continuing to nurture the wildlife.

Most pollen allergies are caused by wind-pollinated trees and plants; even rainy days can wash pollen closer to the ground, causing unexpected difficulties for some. Tree pollen allergies occur between mid-March and early June; the most common and severe symptoms are caused by birch. Conifers, alder, yew, lime, plane, oak and hazel can also be problematic. Hayfever sufferers are allergic to grass pollen, at its peak from mid-May to end-July. Consider planting sterile or low-pollen varieties of ornamental grasses. Mow the lawn regularly before it sets seed; artificial grass will collect pollen if not regularly cleaned. Avoid strimming during hayfever season. Many ferns, weeds and plants in the aster family (such as chrysanthemums, dandelions and marigolds) are wind pollinated and can cause allergies.



Toxins in many plants and seeds, including day lilies, euphorbias, hellebores, peonies, foxgloves, chrysanthemum and oleander, can irritate skin and cause respiratory issues; always wear gloves whenever gardening or flower arranging. Minimise mould sensitivity by covering compost heaps and using low-allergen mulch. Wash hands well and launder gardening clothes separately. The 80-90% of trees and plants pollinated by insects or birds tend to have brightly coloured, nectar rich flowers which are often scented; some have very little pollen. The Royal Horticultural Society (RHS), Allergy UK and The Royal College of Pathologists publish their recommendations for low allergen garden plants to help create a healthier garden for everyone to enjoy.
