# UGLEY WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

The speaker at our August meeting was the very enthusiastic Lynda Dale, no stranger to the pages of The Link. She explained that during lockdown she started to research and be fascinated by her graveyard neighbours. Her fascination had a practical purpose too, as she began clearing headstones which time and nature had overwhelmed; she managed to clear over 50 graves. Since then she and a group of dedicated volunteers and local scouts have cleared pathways and undergrowth, making it much safer and more pleasant for those visiting the churchyard.

Lynda has taken a large number of photos of the headstones and she showed us a few of them and explained some of the history behind the names. Two of those she mentioned were Albert Alabaster, a local police officer in the 1930s and Walter Leslie Payne, a Petty Officer in the Royal Navy who served on the Queen Elizabeth and HMS Valiant. Others were John Wilkins, groundsman for the Fuller Maitland family of Stansted Hall and Sir Thomas Jackson, the founder of HSBC Bank whose memorial is in the churchyard; his statue is in Statue Square in Hong Kong. Lynda hopes to organise a guided tour of the churchyard; I, for one, would certainly be interested. Her fascinating talk ended with a lively question and answer session, and our usual raffle and refreshments brought another entertaining afternoon to a close.

Our next meeting is on **Wednesday 15**<sup>th</sup> **October** at 2.00pm in Ugley Village Hall when the speaker will be Brian Carline who will be talking about gardening. Why not come along and hear what he has to say? You would be most welcome.

Our new season started on Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> September and the first meeting was very well attended. The new Chairman, Roger Barrett, introduced our speaker, Philip Hays, who gave a talk with slides on the once great but sadly no more, Hallingbury Place, initially home to the Morley family. They owned the estate from approximately 1300 until 1591 when it was sold to Jacob Houblon. The Morley family came from Norfolk, and were very prominent during the Tudor period and involved in the political events during the reigns of both Henry VII and Henry VIII. It is reported that Queen Elizabeth I stayed at the house on her journey to Tilbury where she gave her most famous speech at the time of the Spanish Armada.

The house was purchased and re-built by Jacob Houblon, who was part of the Archer-Houblon family. Jacob is credited with playing a significant role in the formation of the Bank of England. The estate had wonderful gardens extending some 3000 acres, encompassing farms, cottages and Hatfield Forest. The famous Ladywell Lake there was designed by Capability Brown. Much of the Houblon fortune came from the slave trade but they also had an interest in shipping. During WWI King George V reviewed some 30,000 troops there. However, by the 1920s the enormous cost of keeping an estate of this size was untenable and the contents of the house, cottages and farms were all sold off and sadly the structure was demolished in 1924. Hatfield Forest was given to the National Trust. Roger thanked Philip for a fascinating talk. The next meeting is on Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> October at 7.30pm in TouchPoint. The speaker will be Mike Howgate on The Da Vinci Code. Visitors are always welcome; entry £3. We look forward to seeing you.

#### IN MEMORIAM

#### JOHN HOLLIS 18<sup>th</sup> July 1931 to 20<sup>th</sup> April 2025



John was born in Enfield and his father was a Barclays Bank manager. John spent much of his early life with his grand-parents who owned and ran the Swan Public House in Rayne. He earned money pea-picking with German prisoners-of-war and he worked much harder than they did! He loved it when the Americans appeared on the scene as they were incredibly generous with gifts to all the local people.

John went to Daiglen School, followed by Bancroft's School in Woodford. He left Bancroft's reluctantly aged 16 as he wanted to stay on mainly to play rugby! He got a job for 18 months working for Lloyds of London at Hogg Robinson's, and then joined up for National Service at Colchester. He was selected to become an officer and was lucky enough to go to Eaton Hall in Cheshire. He became a second lieutenant in the Essex Regiment and was seconded to the Gold Coast, serving for two years in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Battalion of the Gold Coast Regiment of the Royal West African Frontier Force. After National Service he joined the Territorial Army and became a captain. John returned to the city for the rest of his career and became head of General Re-Insurance, an American company. He travelled very widely which he loved, but always kept in close touch with his friends from school and National Service, some of whom attended his funeral on 6<sup>th</sup> June.

Janet (Jan) and John married at St John's Church, Buckhurst Hill in June 1960. They moved to Little Fosters on Cambridge Road, where Jan still lives. John walked to Stansted station every day to commute to London, which he really enjoyed. They had three sons, Christopher (Chris), Andrew (Andy) and Timothy, who are married to Sarah, Neil and Becki; their grandchildren are Ruby, Joe, Matt and Poppy. John adored them all and always appreciated their huge support. He always loved Stansted and was fully involved in village life; he was a Parish Councillor, and treasurer for music@stansted, taking over from Jeremy Wagener, another great friend. Despite never embracing technology, his accounts were always meticulous. He was a member of the Local History Society, a trustee of the Sports Association and the Almshouses and a steward at the Windmill.

At the Bell and Feathers John met Peter Brown who invited him to play cricket at Manuden, which he loved. He also played squash and tennis, and rugby for the Old Bancroftians until he was 40, which unfortunately led to severe arthritis. Over the last 40 years John had five hip replacements, the first one in 1990 at Herts and Essex Hospital's York Ward, which closed that same year. On retirement John joined the Bowls Club. He loved playing and was very involved with every aspect of the social side. He always said it was the friendliest club he had ever known. They honoured him by making him president and refused to accept his resignation even when he could no longer visit the club.

John's other great love was fishing. He fished at Arncliffe, on the Spey in Scotland, on the Test in Hampshire and in Norway, again making many lifelong friends; but wading up to the chest in cold water is not good for arthritis! He also belonged to the Bishop's Stortford Angling Club and would fish on the Stort in Gipsy Lane at the crack of dawn before he came home to get ready to catch the train to London. On one occasion he challenged someone whom he thought was a trespasser on this private land. With his usual humour Charles Humphreys very politely told John that he actually owned the land. It did nothing to spoil their friendship! On retirement, 11 local friends formed the Mountfitchet Investment Club which had monthly meetings with lunch at The Cock. John served as chairman until it eventually closed.

Regrettably he had a most unfortunate experience in hospital during Covid which rendered him totally bedridden, so he spent the last years of his life in nursing homes, but he never complained. The great highlights of this time were the weekly visits from Julie, a wonderful physiotherapist, visits from David Morson and best of all, the faithful monthly visits of Colin Fairweather to give John Holy Communion and to share many happy afternoons. John had a very deep lifelong faith which we are sure sustained him. He was a sidesman at St John's and also worshipped at St Mary's, Farnham and Birchanger. He was so lucky that he retained a sharp brain until he died which made it so much better for us all.

John had two bowel cancer operations and a knee replacement, and was booked to have the other knee replaced but died before it was done. He recovered from skin cancer. To say he was a stoic would be an understatement; he was a quiet, modest man. He died on Easter Sunday aged nearly 94 and had been married for almost 65 years. We had all visited him, and when Andy said goodbye, John smiled and said Lights Out and died a few hours later. He had a wonderful, joyous funeral at St Mary's, conducted so very well by Colin, with St John's choir and Anne Brooks on the organ. As usual, Steve and Lynda Dale quietly and efficiently organised everything at the church. Sarah made the wonderful flower arrangements for the church and St Theresa's Parish Centre where the wake was held. The church was packed with John's family and friends. He is buried in the cemetery beside five other family members.

We hope our words convey John's great life-long love of Stansted and demonstrate that anybody who contributes to village life is hugely rewarded in every way.

#### **BRAIN TRAINING**

#### **Executive function and long-term pain**

So you have had the same pain in the knee or shoulder, or the same technical fault for a long time now. You have seen experts to help, and whilst the problem has improved somewhat, it is still there, which is so frustrating. Help is at hand in your own brain! How cool is that. Over time, regular movement becomes habitualised, and if a movement always causes pain, frustration or worry, the brain pays a great deal of attention to it: it is coming, brace yourself; and this builds what is called a neuro signature, meaning all parts of your being are now involved, physical, emotional, autonomic in preparation for the expected, unpleasant outcome.



To help undo this mess, we can use our executive function, the parts of the frontal lobe that inhibit unwanted feelings and actions. To engage it, sit down, maybe shut your eyes, and just imagine doing the movement. Do not move. Pay huge attention to what else is going on in your body as the critical moment approaches. Gripping is a common reaction, especially the breath, but also teeth or jaw, inner thighs, buttocks, another limb, the knees; the list is individual and usually more than one thing. Now let all that unnecessary nonsense go and imagine doing the movement again, but without the accompanying tensions. This will probably take a few goes. Once you have mastered that, have a go at doing the movement again, but now inhibiting those unhelpful extras. Sometimes this can be miraculous. It is certainly useful in reducing unnecessary pain, improving that difficult note for a musician, or the frustrating backhand for a tennis player.

#### Stansted assets

Have you noticed the white Touchpoint vans in Stansted? Paul Chambers, founder of Touchpoint, has galvanised an energetic band of local volunteers to supply many different services to Stansted. At the u3a monthly meeting, he reminded, thanked and impressed everyone with the project's truly dynamic work. Touchpoint was initiated by Paul after he identified different needs in our community, alongside a wealth of untapped expertise and willingness to help. With astute and creative planning, Touchpoint now has 190 active volunteers, nine Food Share points across the neighbourhood, a community radio station, kids' teatimes, Sunday afternoon movies, bereavement counselling and a memory café. It counters isolation and other serious issues through compassion. Unsurprisingly, the u3a audience was highly attentive, some departing the meeting intending to join Touchpoint, all thankful such altruism is at work locally.





#### **RECYCLING**

#### Recycle your small electrical appliances

Did you know that the council will collect old electrical appliances such as irons, toasters, radios, hairdryers, cameras, electric toothbrushes etc free of charge from most doorsteps in Stansted? Just put any items in a separate bag and place on top of your bin, either black or green, on Fridays. See separate article below for further details.

A reminder that we can take your unwanted foreign coins (not notes) for recycling along with old UK coins, ink cartridges (**not** toners), stamps, mobile phones, ipads and tablets (**not** laptops). We do not need chargers but USB leads are useful. Please make sure all personal data has been erased; the easiest way to do this is by a *factory reset*. It would be helpful if donations could be placed in a paper or plastic bag or envelope; please use a separate one for each category. Items can be put in the boxes outside the main blue door of the Free Church at the bottom of Chapel Hill. There is also a collecting box inside St John's church porch; alternatively please leave items in the porch of 7 Blythwood Gardens. Thank you.

A reminder that we no longer accept blister packs or spectacles for recycling; please take spectacles to *Specsavers* in Bishop's Stortford, who have a box for them just behind the till. They do not want the cases. There are two organisations which refurbish laptops or printers and donate to schools and charities; both will collect from you free of charge. #### **RECYCLING SMALL ELECTRICAL ITEMS**

I suspect there will be some confusion over Uttlesford District Council (UDC)'s newly introduced service for the doorstep collection of unwanted small electrical items. The service is being provided in Stansted every week where UDC uses its larger bin collection vehicles. However, in some parts of Stansted, collections of waste and recycling materials are carried out by a smaller, hard-to-reach area van that does not yet have enough space for storing them. Currently these vehicles do not have cages fitted to store electrical items as part of the doorstep recycling. I am informed that options are being investigated over the next couple of months to see what solutions can be found for the smaller vehicles. The hard-toreach areas have narrower roads. Mine, Recreation Ground, is one of them. Others are: Water Lane, Brook Road, Cannons Court, Gall End Lane, Mill Hill/Fields/Side, Rochford Close, Station Road, Sunnyside, Woodfields/Terrace/Close/Mews, the Blythwood Gardens loop and a couple of properties at Poplar Hall.

link to a recycling locator. If you put a Stansted postcode in the search box, a number of retailer collection points is also shown as available drop-off points. I plan to report back as soon as possible.

#### STANSTED IN BLOOM

The presentation of the 2025 Anglia in Bloom awards took place on Thursday 4th September. Communities, schools, councils, and individuals from Bedfordshire, Essex, Cambridgeshire, Hertfordshire, Suffolk and Norfolk travelled to the Burgess Hall in St Ives to celebrate the very best in community gardening, horticultural excellence and environmental care across the East of England. They commented that the Aubrey Buxton nature reserve was a well-managed area which encouraged wildlife and nature at its best. They said that it was good to see lots of different community groups working towards a common goal and lovely to see the next generation involved.



The Food Share programme, community involvement and engagement with young people were identified as areas of particular achievement. In the virtual categories, which are judged from photographs and a 100word submission, our Social Club was given a gold award and declared as a very worthy winner in the public house category. The judges report said that the entry gives instant visual impact and is very inviting. The colour combinations are superb. Last but certainly not least we were delighted that Bentfield School was judged to be the Best Young People's Project, Under 12. Unfortunately, the autumn term had started at school so they could not be there to receive their award in person, but we were able to hand over their certificate and trophy at their allotment at Walpole Meadow on the following day.

#### SUSTAINABLE STANSTED

#### Stansted biodiversity study findings launched

The findings of the study of Stansted's natural resources were launched at our Community Nature Fair on 6<sup>th</sup> September. The release of these findings coincides with the publication of the Essex Local Nature Recovery Strategy, where land within and around Stansted has been identified as a strategic location for the creation and restoration of woodland and grassland. The study was led by a team of professional ecologists from MKA Ecology and much of the fieldwork was done by a small local group of trained Sustainable Stansted volunteers. The research found that key areas for biodiversity in the area are:

- The ancient woodlands in the north-east of the parish including Alsa Wood, Durrell's Wood and Aubrey Buxton
- The River Stort and Stansted brook and the surrounding areas
- Stansted Park with its range of veteran trees.

The report and accompanying residents' guide sets out a wide range of actions we can take, including:

- Protecting, enhancing and expanding areas of woodland and grassland
- Taking action within our woodland areas to protect notable plants such as English bluebells
- Creation of bee-lawns and more wildflower-rich grass-land
- Protecting and developing ponds to support species such as the greater-crested newt
- Improving hedgerow condition and areas of dense thorny scrub to protect and enhance populations of birds such as dunnocks, bullfinches, song thrushes and linnets
- Providing bird boxes to help to halt the national decline in swift population
- Taking action to promote biodiversity in our own gardens and allotments by providing water, lots of flower forage, sunny and shady areas, bare ground and areas of deadwood.

Our final opening of the year is on **Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> October** 1.30pm-5.30pm; entry: adults £3, children £1, under 5 free.



#### **NATURE WITHIN**

#### A new book that fosters the nature within us all

Nature Within is my debut book which is due to be released in November by Pelagic Publishing. I am a neurology doctor, nature enthusiast and Stansted resident. I believe that reconnecting with nature is the most important public health intervention of our time. To protect human health over the long-term, we first need to prevent the destruction of our environment and the countless species we share it with. My passion for nature grew out of a fascination for moths: their bold colours, their cryptic patterns and their immensely complex life cycles. I was awestruck by the alluring song of the veery bird in a Canadian woodland, which inspired me to think more deeply about the intimate connections between human health and the natural world. Nature Within is the result of all this.



I studied medicine at the University of Cambridge before completing neurology training and a PhD at King's College London. I now run a research group which cares for patients suffering from motor neurone disease. This taught me a lot about how to approach some of life's most complex problems. I am also a husband, father of twin daughters and a very makeshift marathoner. There is now no doubt that we are living in a time of ominous change for the environment and ecosystems we rely upon. However, at this book's heart is a relentless optimism that nature has already gifted the necessary tools to conserve the health of earthly life. We just need to reconnect.

Recently, I was privileged to watch two bats flying around my garden. They were so quick and acrobatic it was difficult to keep them in view. Bats and their roosts are legally protected so must not be disturbed. They are mammals, giving birth to live young. It reminded me of how lucky we are in The Hundred Parishes to have so many wild mammals in our mainly rural area.

There are several kinds of deer locally, mostly fallow, roe or muntjac. Larger herds are usually fallow deer which have palmate antlers, shaped like the palm of a hand. The smaller roe deer may be seen in smaller groups; they have a white rump and no visible tail. muntjac are smaller still and tend to be solitary; they have horns and tusks, downward-pointing canine teeth.



Out enjoying our latest walk, number 188 in the list of walks on our website, my wife and I surprised two hares who disappeared at great speed when they spotted us. They can run up to 45mph over short distances. We regularly see foxes in our garden, usually courtesy of our inexpensive night vision camera. In the spring, we enjoyed watching the young cubs playing. Foxes seem to be a more common sight now, even during daylight, and regularly venture into built up areas. The camera occasionally spots a badger, usually looking for peanuts.

Anyone lucky enough to see hedgehogs in their garden should look after them as their numbers are in decline. They are nocturnal, so at dusk we should put out a shallow bowl of fresh water (not milk as it is bad for their digestion) and perhaps some dog or cat food. They may repay you by eating slugs and insects although our experience has been that they prefer commercial hedgehog food like *Spike's Dinner*. Enjoy them all.



t is with great sadness that we share the news that Peter Jones — advocate for the community, investment analyst, and much-loved father and friend — passed away peacefully last month a er a life dedicated to service and community spirit.





Council, twice as Chairman and for many years as Chair of the Finance Committee.

Even in his final year, despite ill-health, he remained active on six working groups, a testament to his commitment to the community.

Born in London within the sound of the Bow Bells, Peter won scholarships to Dulwich College and St John's, Oxford, where he developed a passion for politics. Professionally, he became a respected investment analyst, heading research departments in leading City stockbroking firms.

A er moving to Stansted in 1973 with his wife, Kaye, Peter played a central role in shaping village life — from helping to establish the Day Centre, Romeera Leisure Centre and Mountfi chet Exchange, representing the Parish Council at various Public Inquiries on Stansted Airport and improvements to the former Youth Centre, to co-founding Sustainable Stansted and guiding the Neighbourhood Development Plan.

Peter is survived by his daughter Sarah, his son Andrew, and many friends and colleagues who will remember him for his integrity, intellect, and generosity.

The original bequest provided homes for women over 60 facing hardship in later life. While this condition still applies, the new almshouses are also open to men over 60 who are struggling financially, with preference continuing to be given to women in similar circumstances.

Applicants should either live in Stansted Mountfi chet (no minimum residency period is required) or demonstrate strong family connections to the village.

#### **Final Say**

LEAP, in consultation with Uttlesford District Council's housing department, will make the final decision on beneficiaries. The Parish Council may suggest suitable candidates but does not have the final say. If future vacancies arise, there will be no waiting list. Instead LEAP will advertise them through *The Link*, the Parish Council website, and social media.

#### **Terms of Occupancy**

Please note that almshouses are not rent-free. Residents pay a weekly maintenance contribution set at a level that ensures eligibility for Housing Benefit. Occupants are also responsible for their own utility bills. There is no fixed tenancy term — residents may remain in their almshouse for life.

#### **How to Apply**

#### **Car Parking**

We have two car parks in Stansted. While Uttlesford District Council operate both Lower Street and Cra on Green, they only own the former, with Cra on Green belonging to Stansted Mountfi chet Parish Council.

Uttle ford's Lower Street car park shares its northern boundary with land owned by Mr Alan Goldsmith, forming part of the grounds of Mountfi chet Castle. The car park is heavily criticised locally as being confusing. It accommodates short and long stay parking spaces, a coach park, NHS and leased parking areas, all alongside the private parking areas operated by the Castle.

Complaints have been received from drivers who have purchased a ticket from the 'wrong' machine and have received a parking ticket. There has been long running discussions between the District Council and Mr Goldsmith regarding the boundaries in two specific areas of the Lower Street car park, and who has ownership of these. A full survey has been carried out by qualified surveyors to establish the land registry position.

Agreement has been reached that the District Council will take over the management of the car parking spaces of Mr Goldsmith. A profi -sharing agreement will be established.

#### **Local Government Reorganisation**



The reorganisation imposed on Uttlesford continu s to take up a lot of time. This is the biggest change to local authorities in our area for 50 years.

The Government wishes to see unitary councils established. These would deliver all local government services. Two-tie local government County Councils and District Councils would be abolished. Instead, we will see the creation of unitary councils.

The issue is the number of unitary councils for Essex. Should there be three as the County Council want or five as the majority of district councils want.

The Uttlesford District Council will at their meeting in September debate the business case for five unitary councils. This sees Uttlesford merge with Epping Forest and Harlow councils. The business case will be submitted to the Government. We are expecting a decision from the Minister next Spring.

Why does this ma er? The three unitary model would take

the local out of local government. It would mean the creatio of mega councils serving populations of half a million people or more. This could mean Uttlesford being part of a new unitary that would include Braintree and Colchester. There is no independent, up-to-date evidence to justi y councils of this size. Uttlesford is currently served by 39 District Councillors and 4 County Councillors. Reorganisation will significantly reduce their number. This, I fear, will weaken the link between councillors and voters.

#### **Local Plan**

Uttle ford is still without a Local Plan. It has been examined by Central Government Inspectors. We still await their report. The Planning Inspector's final report recommends whether the District Council can adopt the plan. Once adopted, the Local Plan will be used to make decisions on all planning applications.

In the meantime, we are subject to speculati e planning proposals. The Gorsefield Residential Studies Centre at Elsenham Road is owned by the London Borough of Tower Hamlets. However, the land surrounding the centre (21.1 acres) belongs to the London Borough of Islington. Islington Council has taken the decision to put up for sale its land. It is being posted as "an exceptional strategic development opportunity located in the affluat own of Stansted Mountfichet". The land is proposed to accommodate potentially 182 housing units. This is not a featured application in the Uttlesford Reg 19 Local Plan or the Draft Neighbourhood Plan and hopefully would not secure support in planning terms. It is also understood that the London Borough of Tower Hamlets at Gorsefield is to campaign against the proposals.

#### **Ward Members Initiative Grant-New Homes Bonus**

This scheme which awarded councillors £2,000 per annum to spend on good causes in their ward sadly came to an end this year. For 2024/25 I was pleased to support St. Mary's Church (towards the cost of replacement of the boiler), Uttle ford Community Travel, Stansted Millers, Touchpoint Christmas Kids Appeal and the Huw Johnson Club.



Essex Highways will be closing **LOWER STREET** from October 11th-18th a er the junction with Grove Hill for road improvements. Then Affinity Water will be closing High Lane (near Burchalls) from 20th October to 2nd November for infrastructure work. Network Rail need to carry out repairs to the railway bridge that will see **CHURCH ROAD** closed at this point from 18th-19th October.

#### IN THE GARDEN

Bulbs are a fabulous way of adding to your planting to ensure that you have colour all through the year in your garden. They do not cost much so you can afford to plant plenty of them. Bulbs have specific requirements, so give a little thought as to what you plant where. A great shady combo is *Leucojum aestivum* Gravetye Giant, like a giant snowdrop about 50cm tall, planted with Hellebores. *Camassia leichtlinii* Careulea also likes shade; it is a wisteria blue about 70cm tall. Daffodils are generally very shade tolerant whereas tulips need sun. Negrita and Pittsburgh are my favourite shades of purple tulips but there are so many colours to choose from. They should flower from early April until mid-May. I often plant a combination of two or three colours to cover the weeks and complement each other



After tulips there are the ever-popular alliums. Allium christophii is a showstopper with large silver-lilac flower heads; they look best planted in amongst grasses like Stipa tenuissima so that the leaves are hidden as they die back. Allium Purple Sensation is tall and deep purple; they do not last as long as christophii but come out sooner. Then on into the autumn with Nerine bowdenii flowering into November in its vivid shades of pink and white. Bulbs like good drainage; put half a handful of grit under each bulb unless you have really stony soil. Make sure you plant them deep enough, the bigger the bulb, the deeper they should go. Camassias are a very wet bulb; if you leave them sitting around before planting they go mouldy! Only plant snowdrops when they have leaves and do not let them dry out. Finally, only plant English bluebells Hyacinthoides non-scripta, as Spanish bluebells are highly invasive.

#### **FIRE STATIONS GALORE**

For a few years in the early 1960s, Stansted boasted three fire stations. The original station in Chapel Hill which opened in the late 1800s had been demolished to make way for a road widening scheme. The replacement was located at the top of Chapel Hill next to the Quaker Meeting House. It housed the village's fire engines, the second of which served dutifully from 1914 to 1927 and is enjoying a long retirement (more on that in a future edition). Where is the second station, I hear you ask? Allow me to explain. It was built in 1928, opposite the one which was demolished, and was in use until the current (third) station opened in 1960. Today, that old Fire Station is used by the Parish Council and is a building most residents will know, being next to the library on Chapel Hill.



The crew at Stansted Fire Station together with the Parish Council are exploring the possibility of making a nod to the past by painting the doors of the old Fire Station bright red and providing some information outside explaining its former use. That is where you come in! If anyone has any memories, photographs or stories about the old Fire Station or the firefighters who worked there, we would love to hear from you. This will help us better understand the building's history and enable us to capture these memories for future generations. Please email me any information you would like to share. We look forward to keeping you updated on our little project in future editions of The Link.


