THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

Since the launch of the Society in 2014, its website has continued to evolve and expand as a resource for the local area. We encourage you to step through the website menu to get a feel for what is available. If you want to look something up, you might try either Parishes, What's On, Articles or Walks.

Parishes holds the key to many things. From either the map or the alphabetical listing, select an individual parish to find out a little about its history, the nearest walks or details for a pub or tearoom. Introductions include ideas for further reading and links to useful websites.

What's On lists future events in chronological order. Many entries have a link to further information. We are pleased to give publicity to any event that promotes local knowledge or culture, exploration or conservation.

Articles offers local insight into a wide range of topics.

Walks has general guidance and then three options: Station walks, Quiet lane walks and Other walks. Scroll down the list to find one that suits your need in terms of location and distance. Then click on the walk number to call it up. The first few paragraphs will describe distance, terrain and opportunities for refreshment. When you find a walk you like, print it to take with you. [Control, P] is a useful shortcut to start printing.

Feedback is a way of telling us of changes or something we have missed: perhaps a pub closure, bus route change, additional activity for What's On, or website links or phone numbers that no longer work. I hope these notes have been useful and may make your visits to the website more rewarding.

ANGLIA IN BLOOM

We welcomed the Anglia in Bloom judges on Wednesday 16th July. They started by viewing a 15-minute PowerPoint presentation in the Mountfitchet Exchange Building. Anglia in Bloom classifies any settlement with a population between 6,001 and 12,000 as a town so we started the presentation by stressing that we are proud of our rural heritage and despite all the residential development in the last 20 years taking us comfortably into this category, we still think of Stansted as a village. The presentation was very well received.

We started at the TouchPoint garden and spent some time talking to Keith Johnson and his team of volunteers. 



STANSTED PEOPLE

TOM GEE



Tom attended Bentfield Primary School and then he moved on to The Bishops' Stortford High School. This was a good match for Tom because it is a very strong sports school, especially for rugby, and Tom loves sport, particularly rugby, hockey, tennis, golf and swimming. Looking back, he reflected that the strength of the school is the emphasis on resilience and the importance of personal presentation. Tom's goal throughout school was to excel academically; with hard work and determination, he achieved his target and will soon be studying Biochemistry at Durham University. He is coming to the end of a gap year, and has recently returned from several months in Southeast Asia travelling with a group of school friends. He regards this trip as his best education.

The cultural impact of this trip on Tom and the group was huge. Bangkok was the launch pad for their travels and was an explosion on the senses: huge crowds on the intensely populated streets filled with traders, tourists, shoppers, and families living their lives bustling and jostling for space, while humid and stifling hot air made exploring this enrapturing and electrically charged city a wonderful and exciting challenge. From Bangkok they travelled down to southern Thailand, exploring the jungles and beaches. This area is geared heavily towards the tourist industry, but the warmth and kindness of the local people was evident throughout.

They moved to the rural north and then on to Laos, a country where there is no word for *leisure*. The people work relentlessly, perhaps in a daytime profession such as teaching and spending their evenings tending crops. Laos led on to Vietnam and then to Indonesia. Without doubt, the abiding impression of these countries, particularly the rural areas, is the high importance of social and family values. The people work incredibly hard for their families, as do people around the world, but their social structure, the high value placed upon family, friendship and community, seemed to Tom to make people happier than we are in the Western world where material wealth appears to take precedence over happiness. It was a message and lesson that Tom and his friends took home with them.

Another lesson Tom is keen to share with would-be travellers who plan to visit this part of Asia is the use of mopeds. These are the cheapest and easiest way to move around, but there are important factors to bear in mind. Mopeds generally available for hire are 125cc engines; however, most UK travel insurance

companies only cover 50cc engines as standard. It is imperative that the insurance covers the higher engine rating otherwise your medical insurance will not cover the medical expenses in the highly probable event of an accident. Everyone in the group, except Tom, had an accident.

My own grandson, Harry, had a treacherous moped crash that nearly ended his life. Hospital care systems there are very different to here. In Vietnam, it is the responsibility of the family to care for their loved ones in hospital. Tom and his two friends cared for my grandson around the clock for five days during the critical stage of his recovery, until his father arrived. They were all tremendous, dealing with a very traumatic situation with maturity and compassion. Finally, do not accept poor quality helmets. Moped companies will try to fob you off with ones that are cheap, inadequate and unsafe. You must insist on good quality helmets; do not accept anything less.

I asked Tom what were the high points of the trip, and he immediately recollected wonderful memories: hiking in the forested Laos hills and waking to the most glorious hazy sunrise; witnessing the entrancing yet deadly blue lava in Indonesia; playing with elephants in the river in a Thai elephant sanctuary; the almost transcendental experience of swimming with manta rays in Indonesia; and the most awe-inspiring and breathtaking four-day pillion passenger motor bike tour in North Vietnam around rough roads that curled and snaked around verdant jungle, hummocked-topped mountain ranges filled with either peach and gold sunrises or melting sunsets dropping on to valleys of flourishing valleys of rivers and paddy fields.

I would like to wish Tom all the very best at Durham University. He is a brave soul; biochemistry is not for the faint hearted, but clearly Tom is anything but faint hearted. He will have a choice of wonderful careers ahead of him, but in the meantime, after a summer of earning money for university, student life is soon to be enjoyed, and I have no doubt travelling will always form a big part of his life.

A big thank you to the volunteers who have dealt with the Himalayan balsam at the reserve once again this year. Over four work party sessions they have pulled up this invasive species to prevent it from spreading and taking over large areas of the reserve. This frequently involves working deep in amongst the nettles, thistles and brambles. We rely heavily on the volunteer group to maintain the nine Essex Wildlife Trust reserves in the Uttlesford area. As mentioned previously, we will be closing the southern entrance to the reserve from the beginning of September as we are repositioning and improving some of the paths. Every winter the paths deteriorate badly and mud forces people to walk further up the slope, damaging our meadows. IN THE GARDEN

Hydrangeas bring changing colour to modern and traditional gardens from summer through to leaf fall. They need moisture, good drainage and part shade. Care depends on the type of hydrangea that you have; identify when in bloom, then note the regime on its label.

Panicled hydrangeas have arching woody stems with pointed bloom clusters. Native to the Americas, bloom colour is sensitive to changes in temperature and light, maturing from vanilla or lime white to red-pink hues. They need 4-5 hours of sun and are relatively hardy. *Hydrangea arborescens* like *Annabelle* are similar but rounder headed. Panicled hydrangeas produce flowers on new growth; prune them down to 60cm in March. *Hydrangea quercifolia* is a larger panicled shrub with distinctive oak-shaped leaves; shelter from strong winds, keep moist and prune minimally in spring or autumn.



Macrophylla hydrangeas, those with large leaves, are native to Asia. Hortensia mopheads comprising masses of tiny flowers called florets are the most likely to change colour from red-pink to blue-purple when aluminium sulphate is added to alkaline soil. Lacecap macrophylla hydrangeas have tiny clusters of flowers in flatter blooms surrounded by showy florets. These are grouped by leaf type: serrata (toothed), aspera (furry) and macrophylla. Macrophylla flower buds form on their existing stems; wait until midspring to deadhead and prune the stems back to the first pair of strong buds, otherwise you will have no flowers!

Brightening a shady wall, the self-clinging *hydrangea petiolaris* has white flowers; unfortunately for Stansted, the evergreen climbing *hydrangea Seemannii* needs acid soil. Do not prune for the first 3-4 years. Thereafter, prune wayward stems back immediately after flowering, leaving enough flower buds for a good display next year. All oversized or shabby hydrangeas can be hard pruned in midspring; keep well nurtured for a much-revived display the following summer.

BRAIN TRAINING

The adolescent brain. What makes us human - Part Four Adolescence: a time of raging hormones, emotions, daftness. When will it finish? Adolescence does eventually end, but not until the mid-20s! Some even say it lasts until 30 years old. Goodness. What is going on? The brain is interconnected and the last part of the brain to connect is the prefrontal cortex, the home of executive function. Adults engage this part of the brain to put the brakes on unnecessary feelings and actions. Adolescents cannot do so yet.



However, the rest of their brain is working just fine, leading to wildly fluctuating moods, wanting new experiences, craving peer approval and being selfless and selfish. Here are some examples: in America, in the foothills of the Sierras, there is a cave system with a narrow, winding passage leading to a sheer drop, 60m deep. Many skeletons of adolescents dating back centuries were found at the bottom of this huge drop; this illustrates how wonderfully curious as well as crazily incautious adolescents can be.

An experiment put adolescent and adult test subjects into a brain scanner and had them play a ball game with two others. At first the ball was tossed equally between players, and then the ball was no longer thrown to the subject. Everybody's brain initially showed distress, but with adults, the frontal cortex kicked in, reasoning that this is only a silly ball game and not worth getting in a tizz about. The adolescents remained extremely upset. Sympathy and empathy. Adults can do both. We engage two slightly different parts of our brain, so we feel both sorry for someone's pain and feel it too. The adolescent brain can only empathise, which is far more intense, leading the adolescent to either change the world to help, or walk away completely, because it is all too much.

Almshouses

Three new almshouses to be built at High Lane development

A mid a national housing crisis, the arish Council Chair Maureen Caton in July was able to share with Councillors some good news for those looking for affordable homes locally — a site for three new almshouses has been found in the village!


The former almshouses on Church Road were sold off fter they had become unsuitable for the purpose in 2013. The £800,000 raised by their sale was left in the are of Legacy East Almshouse Partnership (LEAP), a specialist in the provision of almshouses. Until n w LEAP has struggled to find a suitable location or our replacements. However recently LEAP informed SMPC they had exchanged contracts with Troy Homes to build 3 such residences as part of their High Lane development.

Cllr Caton said: "LEAP had been considering investing the funds in almshouses elsewhere. This would have been a bitter pill as we have had almshouses in the village since the 1830s. So, it is excellent news to know we will be able to


continue o do so in the future."



Troy Homes are building 30 new dwellings on land east of High Lane. As part of this project, they will build 3 two-bedded almshouses by January 2026. The selection of app opriate candidates to occupy these will commence later this autumn. Look out for application d tails on our social media channels and future editions of The Link



Building new almshouses comes with some downsides for users of **FOOTPATH 19.** Essex County Council have issued a Temporary Prohibition O der, closing it from 9th September to 9th March. The six-month shut down of the footpath, which links Gall End to High Lane, is needed to ensure the safety of the public and workforce while work to the culvert and road surface in the area is completed. **HIGH LANE** itself will be closed between September 1st to 19th for essential mai tenance repairs by Affinity ater. Also this month, **CHURCH ROAD** (near the railway bridge) and **STATION ROAD** will close from 21st to 29th of September. This is to allow the carriageway in these areas to be resurfaced.



Solar Farm

SMPC object to solar panel farm near the airport

t the last Full Council before the start of the summer Arecess, Councillors considered their response to planning application U T/25/1742/FUL. Trilogy Logistics REIT Limited want permission to build and operate 41,500 solar panels on agricultural land at Parsonage Farm. The applicant says the large-scale renewable and low carbon energy scheme will power the business park currently being built on land next to Stansted Airport.

Following discussions at the meetin , Councillors voted (10 in favour and 2 abstentions) o object to the application. This was for two main reasons:

- The site is within the Metropolitan Green Belt
- There is no direct benefit o the community, as the energy produced will not be shared with Stansted

Greenbelt under pressure

The project is one of two other proposals targeting land o the south of Stansted. As detailed in last month's pages, Stansted Airport wishes to grow its future capacity to handle 51million passengers per year, up from the current 43 million limit, by modifying its runway and nearby road infrastructure.

The second potential appliation in this area is by City and Country Group. The developer plans to build homes on Green Belt land between Stansted and Birchanger. City and Country reason that the land set aside to stop the merger of nearby towns and villages is, in fact, "grey belt."

SMPC maintain that building 1,050 new homes at this spot is insensiti e and could result in Stansted, Birchanger and Bishop's Stortford merging. If all three projects get planning permission, the landscape south of the village could be changed forever the housing project would squeeze between the proposed solar farm, butt up o the business park and sit side by side with an expanding airport (see graphic).

A team from City and Country will meet with SMPC's Planning Working group in September, with representati es from Birchanger Parish and Bishop's Stortford Town Councils also to be present. We will of course keep you updated on any decision.

Library to get a hearing loop

Budget surplus to be ploughed back into the community

ouncillors have agreed to spend a surplus from SMPC's ■2024/25 budget on improvements at the Recreatio Ground, TouchPoint and the Mountfi chet Exchange. Some of the money will go on extra sockets to re-site goal posts at the Recreation G ound. This will allow grass to regrow where it has been worn away at the existing oal areas. A bench is also to be repaired for the second time on th Rec, this time with ha dwood slats. Vandals broke the slats when they'd been fi st fi ed with soft ood. The surplus will also be invested in a hearing loop at the Mountfi chet Exchange's reception d sk, which is shared with library staff. The piece of tech helps individuals with hearing aids or cochlear implants by transmitting audio d ectly to the user's hearing device, cutting out back ound noise and improving clarity. The remaining money will be used to fix the front door at

extraction ystem. Cllr Peter Jones, chair of the Finance and General Purposes committee, said: "We had a larger surplus than expected at the end of the last financial ear. Councillors had deferred expenditure on these items until the size of the surplus was confirm d."

Paint found for Lower Street roundabout

Letter of complaint appears to stir Essex Highways into action

n official tter of complaint from the SMPC Chair, Cllr Maureen Caton, sent this summer to Kevin Bentley, the Leader of Essex County Council, concerning the consistent failure by the local authority to engage with the Parish Council on issues affecting the villa e's roads, seems to have done the trick.

Over the last year the Parish Council has repeatedly warned about the dangers posed to the public by the disappearance of road markings at crossings and roundabouts in Stansted. Our pleas for action h ve gone unanswered. Until n w. Within weeks of Councillors agreeing to fi e off a l tter of complaint, fresh white paint appeared on the roundabout at Lower Street!

The village should expect more paint to go on the crossings of Chapel Hill and Cambridge Road, according to the Cabinet Member for Highways, Infrastructure and Sustainable Transport at the County Council Tom Cunningham.

Cllr Cunningham wrote a letter to Cllr Caton informing her that a road marking crew would be returning to Stansted to repaint lines and markings "in due course". He also said that investigations ere underway into maintenance at the entrance to the culvert in Gall End Lane.







Walpole Meadows Orchard

ould you help develop our community orchard? Earlier this year the Parish Council took ownership of the orchard at Walpole Meadows. This area was designated as a orchard by the developer, but sadly comes to us with no established community group to sympatheti ally maintain it as an orchard. SMPC provides grass cutting and ssential t ee maintenance, but to properly maintain these fruit trees and to develop the area either for nature or as a cropping orchard would require ongoing volunteer support. 

BEES AND BUGS

This is a busy time of year for honeybees. Even though there are fewer flowers around right now, there is still a lot going on inside the hive. Bees are also working hard to defend the hive from invaders like wasps, so it is helpful that there is not too much traffic coming through the entrance. At this time of year, bees also have to deal with *varroa mites*. When varroa first appeared, bee colonies did not realize how many mites were outside the hive trying to get in and once inside, how quickly they would breed. Worse still, these mites eventually kill their hosts.

It is a bit like the fate suffered by Native Americans; those who welcomed the invaders ended up being destroyed. To get rid of the mites, bees had to take drastic action, similar to when Mugabe devalued land in Zimbabwe to drive out the food producers. The bees had to remove the idea of *ownership* within the hive and shift their behaviour completely. One strategy was to heat up the hive, so the bees could reproduce faster than the mites. It is uncomfortable for everyone, but it has to be done. Bees infected with varroa are banished from the colony for the greater good. These mites are parasites that suck the life juices out of bees. What really causes damage is that they develop *with* the bee larvae. When the bees emerge, they are often deformed.

Interestingly, wild colonies have adapted and are dealing with varroa quite well. However, beekeepers who rely on chemical treatments are now actually part of the problem. Beekeeping never needed big pharmaceutical companies; now that they are involved, they will not let go.





